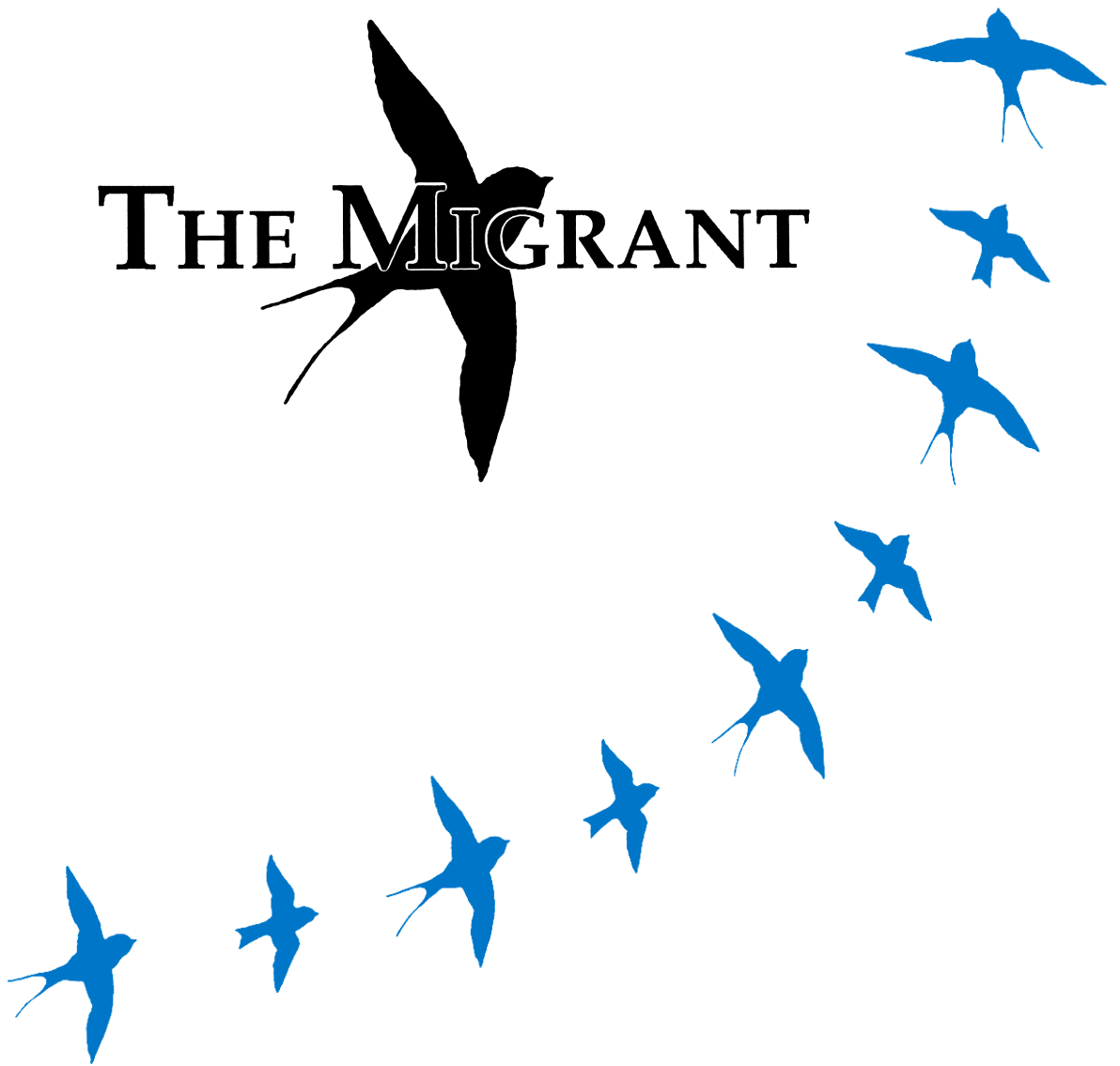

MASSIVE INVASION OF RED-NECKED GREBES INTO EASTERN TENNESSEE

The Red-necked Grebe (*Podiceps grisegena*) is a Holarctic species whose North American population breeds primarily in Alaska and Canada. They winter along the Pacific and Atlantic coasts southward to California and Virginia, respectively, and on portions of the Great Lakes (Brinkley 2007, Sibley 2014). They also occur as casual migrants or winter visitors further south coastally and in the interior of the continent.

In Tennessee Red-necked Grebes are rare migrants and winter visitors. Robinson (1990) listed just 14 records in the state occurring from 1920 through 1988. Sightings have increased subsequently with an additional 54 records from 1989 through 2013, mostly in fall or winter (Season reports in *The Migrant*). In particular, there has been a significant increase since the winter of 1993 – 1994; the species has occurred in 17 of the last 21 winters with one to five records per winter of occurrence. Since 1989 the majority of records (72%) have come from five well-birded sites: Reelfoot Lake, Kentucky Lake (i.e., Paris Landing to Britton Ford), Chickamauga Lake, Boone Lake, and South Holston Lake. Robinson (1990) stated that all records up to that time were of one or two birds except for a count of six during 12-27 February 1988 at Chickamauga Lake. Although the number of records has increased since that publication, the number of birds per sighting has remained low, at one to three, with an exceptional count of 15 Red-necked Grebes on 10 March 2004 at South Holston Lake (Lewis 2004).

An invasion of Red-necked Grebes in unprecedented numbers occurred in the eastern half of Tennessee during March 2014 and continued into April. The first reports came on the morning of 4 March after a strong winter storm with widespread rain and snow swept eastward through the center of the nation on the previous day and overnight.

This storm caused a fallout of Red-necked Grebes, along with moderate numbers of ducks and Horned Grebes (*Podiceps auritus*). Reports of Red-necked Grebes from seven sites on 4 March were followed by reports from an additional five sites on the following day. Eventually the species was reported from 34 sites in 26 counties, with the greatest concentration in northeast Tennessee. Two high counts were particularly noteworthy: 180 at Boone Lake on 19 March and 173 at South Holston Lake on 3 April, both more than ten times greater than the state high count prior to this invasion. Small numbers were found in the state as far south as Polk, Hamilton and Marion counties and as far west as Clay, Jackson, Warren and Franklin counties. Addition of the highest count per site provides a total of 497 Red-necked Grebes in the state (Table 1), which seems a reasonable tally of the overall number involved. While it is possible that some birds moved between sites and could have been counted again, it's also likely that others went unseen on bodies of water that were not checked. The total number found during this invasion is remarkable and exceeds the combined total of all previous records in the state.

Some Red-necked Grebes in this invasion were in full breeding plumage, or nearly so (Figure 1), a plumage rarely seen in Tennessee. Several were heard calling on 7 March and later dates at Boone Lake (pers. obs.), giving both a "series of strident, staccato piping calls" (Brinkley 2007:68) and, to a lesser extent, a "low, grunting note" (Sibley 2014:61). This may be the first report of vocalizations by this species in the state. Also at Boone Lake, one pair engaged in a brief side-by-side courtship display on 19 March (pers. obs.). On numerous occasions the grebes on Boone Lake and South Holston Lake were seen to catch small silvery fish, apparently shad (*Dorosoma* sp.). Some grebes lingered for two to four weeks or more, perhaps because of the ample prey base. The last sighting was of one at Boone Lake on 1 May. There were only four previous Tennessee records in May (on 1, 1, 2, and 6-16 May) and no summer records.

What caused this invasion? The first wave was certainly grounded by the storm passage; but, which way were they headed and from where? Evidence indicates that this incursion was a facultative movement away from the Great Lakes due to historic freeze-up conditions which peaked at 92% ice cover by early March. This was the most ice cover on the Great Lakes in about 30 years according to The Weather Channel. Thus, grebes attempting to overwinter on the Great Lakes were forced to seek open water to the south. In similar fashion, large numbers of diving ducks, particularly White-winged Scoters (*Melanitta fusca*) and Long-tailed Ducks (*Clangula hyemalis*), also had departed the Great Lakes due to the ice buildup, although they began arriving in Tennessee by mid-January. These diving ducks likely fed in shallower near-shore waters which iced over earlier, while the grebes could still catch fish in the remaining open water further offshore until it, too, iced over.

There had been four reports of Red-necked Grebe in Tennessee earlier in 2014: one in Gibson County in mid-January and three singles in the Chattanooga area from mid-January to mid-February (some of which may have lingered into March), all well away from the main March fallout area. Were these precursors of the March invasion or just normal winter occurrences?

Kaufman (1994) discussed another massive fallout of Red-necked Grebes in the East and Midwest which occurred in February 1994 that also was attributed to icing of the Great

Lakes. The majority of grebes involved in that event were found to the north or east of Tennessee, with just four reports totaling six Red-necked Grebes in Tennessee from Knox, Sullivan, and Carter counties (Knight 1994, Lewis 1994).

ROUND TABLE NOTE

LEUCISTIC RED-TAILED HAWK FOUND IN LAWRENCE COUNTY - On 15 May, 2014, a Red-tailed Hawk (*Buteo jamaicensis*) was found unable to fly on a farm in Lawrence County near David Crockett State Park. The bird was initially thought to be an albino or possibly a Krider's (*B.j. krideri*), but closer study found the bird to be leucistic. Leucism is a term that describes a condition that is a result of defects in pigment cell differentiation and/or migration of feathers during development. This defect results in either the entire surface (if all pigment cells do not develop) or patches of body surface (if only a portion of cells are undeveloped) lack the cells capable of making pigment. Some animals have localized or incomplete pigmentation resulting in irregular patches of white on an animal that otherwise has normal coloring and patterning. This partial leucism is known as "pied" or "piebald". This hawk was almost completely white except for a few normally red tail feathers. Even the talons were white. Unlike albino animals the eyes of this bird were normal color.

This leucistic Red-tailed Hawk was transferred to the Mid-South Raptor Center by a ranger from the state park (Figure 1). An examination found a severely broken wing. The bird was quite thin and had probably been down for a number of days or longer. The wing was wrapped and the bird given fluids. The bird survived for several days but never showed signs of recovery and died soon after.

The plans are to have the bird mounted and put on display in the visitor's center at David Crockett State Park. The farmer on whose property the bird was found said that he had observed the bird on a regular basis for a number of years and had never seen another bird that looked like this bird. This condition is rare; this hawk was the first leucistic raptor I have seen in almost 30 years of rehab work.

THE 2015 TENNESSEE CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT SUMMARY

The 2015 Tennessee Christmas Bird Count (CBC) season was the 72nd consecutive compilation of CBC's in Tennessee and the 85th overall (no count was reported for 1943). Thirty-three counts reported data this season; 160 species were recorded. Weather across the state was mixed. Temperatures ranged from a chilly 19° F at Roan Mountain to a balmy 77° F at Bristol (highest temperature in count history).

Snowy Egret (previously count week only), Least Flycatcher, and Ash-throated Flycatcher are all new species for the Tennessee CBC compilation. This brings the all-time total of species found on Tennessee CBC's to 268 (plus four more count week only species). The Reelfoot count set a new state high total for a CBC this year with 123 species. Other count highlights include Black-bellied Whistling-Duck (3rd record), Pacific Loon (3rd record), Western Grebe (6th record), Osprey, Thayer's Gull (2nd record), Great Black-backed Gull (5th record), Common Ground-Dove (2nd record), and Yellow-throated Warbler (2nd record).

The following species were recorded in record or unusually high numbers: Greater White-fronted Goose, Gadwall, Bufflehead, Common Goldeneye, Ruddy Duck, Red-throated Loon, Pacific Loon, American White Pelican, Great Egret, Turkey Vulture, Bald Eagle, Red-shouldered Hawk, Killdeer, Bonaparte's Gull, Herring Gull, Lesser Black-backed Gull, Forster's Tern, Blue-headed Vireo, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, Orange-crowned Warbler, and Vesper Sparrow. The following species were recorded in record or unusually low numbers: American Black Duck, Sandhill Crane, and House Sparrow.

BOOK REVIEW

The Genius of Birds - Jennifer Ackerman, 2016. Penguin Press, Westminster, London. 340 pages.

In her entertaining and thought-provoking book, Jennifer Ackerman presents and discusses ornithological research that has taken place over the last several decades. There has been a virtual explosion of new ornithological knowledge.

Because of their small brains, birds have been considered to have limited cognitive ability. “Bird brain”, “silly goose”, and “lame duck” are just a few examples of how this assumption has influenced our language. The truth is that since humans and birds shared an ancestor around 300 million years ago, both have been developing different neurological systems. Because humans have much bigger brains, scientists had long thought bigger brains were better. Birds have smaller brains, but their neurological systems are much more densely packed with neurons, enabling them to learn.

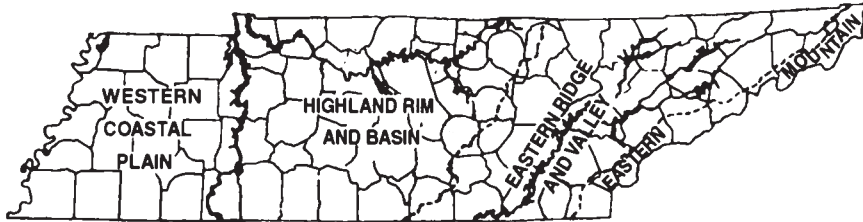
Modern research has discovered what many of us who have observed birds for years have known through casual observation: birds can demonstrate intelligent behavior, but perhaps not to the extent that some species discussed in this book can. Corvids and parrots are considered to be the Einsteins of the bird world. Before his death at the age of 31, an African grey parrot demonstrated astounding intellectual acuity. Not only could he comprehend words, but he could talk back using them in a way that made sense. Many have heard of and seen on TV the feats of New Caledonian crows who have mastered the art of toolmaking. New Caledonian crows have learned how to make hooks from a leaf that enable them to snare grubs from tree cavities. The only mammal that has developed this ability is man.

The book is divided into chapters which cover, in turn, technical ability, social behavior, vocalization, aesthetic ability, spacial and temporal cognizance, and the ability to adapt to new situations. One interesting fact is that bird and human babies learn how to vocalize the same way, even though they have been separated evolutionally for millions of years. The book targets the general reader. Scientific terms are clearly defined and there is an appendix containing notes if the reader wishes to delve further into any one of the cited experiments. One finishes the book in a state of awe concerning the genius of birds.

THE FALL SEASON

1 August - 30 November 2015

Weather conditions were warmer than normal statewide, especially in November, and somewhat wetter than normal in most regions. Perhaps as a consequence of the mild temperatures, waterfowl numbers seemed low, although good numbers were appropriately tallied at Duck River Unit. Two Mottled Ducks in Dyer County were quite rare. Notable were a Tundra Swan and Black Scoter in East Tennessee. Two sightings of Common Mergansers from the Big South Fork were highly suggestive of breeding. Eared Grebe occurred for the 22nd consecutive autumn at South Holston Lake. A Neotropic Cormorant in West Tennessee continued an increasing trend for this rare visitor.

The shorebird flight was impressive, particularly in West and Middle Tennessee, with 34 species found across the state. Shorebird highlights included Red Knot, Ruff, Hudsonian and Marbled Godwits, and Red-necked Phalarope. Gulls, too, were well represented with nine species including Black-legged Kittiwake, Little Gull, and Thayer's Gull. A Least Tern in East Tennessee was a rare find.

Of particular note among passerines were a Say's Phoebe and a Cave Swallow in West Tennessee. The rare recessive hybrid Lawrence's Warbler was reported from two regions. Notable sparrows included American Tree and Clay-colored from two regions each, along with a Nelson's from Middle Tennessee. Boreal irruptives were scarce overall, with only a few scattered sightings of Purple Finches and Pine Siskins, while Red-breasted Nuthatches were virtually nonexistent away from breeding sites in the higher mountains.

The totals for two East Tennessee hawkwatches are presented in Table 1; data for Soddy Mountain in Hamilton County was compiled by Jimmy Wilkerson and data for Big Bald Mountain in Unicoi County was compiled by Mark Hopey.

WESTERN COASTAL PLAIN REGION - - The fall season was marked by significantly higher than average temperatures. Only August saw below average temperatures, lower by one degree. September and October averaged two degrees above normal, while November was five degrees warmer than historic averages. Rainfall across the region was generally consistent with normal totals.

Selecting the "best" bird of the season was particularly difficult. Among the many contenders were a pair of Mottled Ducks in Dyer County, a Cave Swallow and a Ruff in

Memphis, and a Black-legged Kittiwake at Pickwick Dam in Hardin County. Across the region, the annual influx of winter residents seemed slow to arrive. Usually early birds, like White-throated Sparrow, Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, and Hermit Thrush, were notable for their paucity even by mid-October. Reports of irruptive species, such as Pine Siskin, Purple Finch, and Red-breasted Nuthatch, were almost nonexistent.

Highlights in August included the first Rutherford County record of Black-necked Stilt, plus a Red-necked Phalarope at Duck River Unit and a Rufous Hummingbird at Tullahoma. Later rarities included a Yellow Rail at Duck River Unit and a Hudsonian Godwit in Franklin County.

CUMBERLAND PLATEAU / RIDGE and VALLEY REGION - - August was slightly cooler than normal, but the remainder of the season saw above average temperatures. November was the third warmest on record in the Tri-cities area and was 5.1 degrees warmer than average at Chattanooga. Rainfall was above average each month except September, with nearly twice the normal amount in both August and October.

A cooperative adult male Black Scoter on Melton Hill Lake was a treat for many observers. A group of eight female-type Common Mergansers on the Big South Fork in late September was certainly suggestive of successful breeding. Common Gallinules appeared at four sites. Multiple reports were received for American Avocet, Willet, Ruddy Turnstone, and Buff-breasted Sandpiper, indicating a good shorebird flight. Chickamauga Lake produced another Little Gull, this one an adult. Merlin and Peregrine Falcon continue to be seen in good numbers. Shrikes continue to be disturbingly scarce. A stunning Lawrence's Warbler was photographed in Knoxville; this recessive hybrid is seldom encountered. A Clay-colored Sparrow and three reports of Lark Sparrow were notable for East Tennessee.

EASTERN MOUNTAIN REGION - - Temperatures were above average for the period as a whole and for each month within the period. November was especially warm with temperatures about five degrees above average. Precipitation, too, was above normal during autumn. August was particularly wet with six inches of rainfall, which was 2.5 inches above normal. The first frost of the season was noted on 14 September on the summits of Roan Mountain and Mount Le Conte.

Highlights of the hawkwatch at Big Bald Mountain in Unicoi County included three Golden Eagles and 23 Merlins (see Table 1, above). A Common Gallinule at the weir downstream from South Holston Dam was unusual in the region and late. Two separate sightings of Franklin's Gull at South Holston Lake were rare finds. Other highlights included Tundra Swan, a lingering Common Merganser, American Avocet, and Connecticut Warbler.

Banding operations in the region produced good numbers and diversity of captures. A raptor banding station was operated at Big Bald Mountain in addition to the banding of passerines. Swainson's Warbler is very rarely observed or netted in the fall, so one banded at

Whigg Meadow was a definite highlight. Below are summaries for each station.

MATERIAL: The subject matter should relate to some phase of Tennessee ornithology. It should be original, factual, concise and scientifically accurate.

STYLE: Both articles and short notes are solicited; recent issues of *The Migrant* should be used as a guide in the preparation of manuscripts. Where more detail is needed, reference should be made to *Scientific Style and Format*, eighth edition, by the Council of Science Editors, councilscienceeditors.org.

COPY: Manuscripts should be double-spaced with adequate margins for editorial notations and emailed in Word.docx. Tables and figures should be prepared in a separate file with appropriate headings; see *Scientific Style and Format* for examples of appropriate form for tables. Photographs intended for reproduction should be at least 300 dpi or sharp with good contrast on glossy white paper. Weights, measurements, and distances should be in metric units. Dates should be in "continental" form (e.g., 16 March 1997). Use the 24-hour clock (e.g., 0500 or 1900).

NOMENCLATURE: The scientific name of a species should be given after the first use of the full common name in the text. The scientific name should be italicized and in parentheses. Names should follow the *A. O. U. Check-list of North American Birds* (seventh edition, 1998, or supplements).

TITLE: The title should be concise, specific and descriptive.

ABSTRACT: Manuscripts of five or more pages should include an abstract. The abstract should be less than 5% of the length of the manuscript. It should include a brief explanation of why the research was done, the major results, and why the results are important.

LITERATURE CITED: List all literature citations in a "Literature Cited" section at the end of the text. Text citations should include the author and year.

IDENTIFICATION: Manuscripts including reports of rare or unusual species or of species at atypical times should include: date and time, light and weather conditions, exact location, habitat, optical equipment, distance, behavior of bird, comparison with other similar species, characteristic markings, experience of observer, other observers verifying the identification and reference works consulted.

REPRINTS: Reprints are available to authors on request. Billing to authors will be through the TOS treasurer. Request for reprints must be made well in advance of printing.

SEASON REPORTS: Observations that are to be considered for publication in "The Season" section should be mailed to the appropriate Regional Compiler. Consult a recent issue of *The Migrant* for the name and address of the compiler.
