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A PIED-BILLED GREBE NEST AND COMMON MOORHEN BROOD PLATFORM NEAR REELFOOT LAKE, TENNESSEE

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INTRODUCTION

Pied-billed Grebes (*Podilymbus podiceps*) and Common Moorhens (*Gallinula chloropus*) are wetland-dependent birds that construct nests in dense emergent or aquatic vegetation near open water (Bannor and Kiviat 2002, Muller and Storer 1999). Both species were considered common in Reelfoot Lake giant cutgrass (*Zizaniopsis miliacea*) marshes in the past (Crook 1935, Ganier 1933; Pickering 1937, 1941; Simpson 1939, Spofford 1941, Whittemore 1937). Submersed aquatic vegetation (SAV) may also have been important because Common Moorhens fed on SAV, primarily coontail (*Ceratophyllum demersum*). Similarly, Pied-billed Grebes were seen more frequently in areas with dense SAV (Crook 1935, Simpson 1939), possibly because of increased prey abundance or decreased motorized boat traffic.

Artificial water-level stabilization has allowed marshes on Reelfoot Lake to succeed to dense stands of the shrub swamp loosestrife (*Decodon verticillatus*). Populations of SAV fluctuate with grass carp (*Ctenopharyngodon idella*) populations, which were introduced in the 1980s (Henson 1990). Boat traffic has increased on many parts of Reelfoot Lake since the stabilization of water levels and the decline of SAV populations. It is unclear if these factors have affected Pied-billed Grebes or Common Moorhens on Reelfoot Lake. Since these changes have occurred, bird watchers have reported Pied-billed Grebes on Reelfoot Lake, and at least two

Common Moorhen nests have been found there (Pitts 1985, Nicholson 1997), but their numbers are fewer than when giant cutgrass dominated Reelfoot Lake marshes (Winstead 2004). Pied-billed Grebes are now thought to be a "rare summer resident" with a stable population in Tennessee (Nicholson 1997), and Common Moorhens are considered "deemed in need of management" by the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency (T.D.E.C. 2004).

We investigated the current status of Pied-billed Grebes and Common Moorhens on Reelfoot Lake and Black Bayou Waterfowl Refuge as part of a larger study of breeding bird and vegetation communities (Winstead and King 2006 a,b). Here we report the results of Pied-billed Grebe and Common Moorhen surveys and nest searches.

STUDY AREA

Reelfoot Lake and Black Bayou Waterfowl Refuge are located in Lake and Obion Counties within the Lower Mississippi River Alluvial Valley in northwest Tennessee. Water levels on the 6,300 ha Reelfoot Lake fluctuated historically (Davis 1937), but levels have been artificially stabilized since 1942 (Henson 1990). Swamp loosestrife marshes interspersed with baldcypress (*Taxodium distichum*) and maple (*Acer* spp.) saplings occupy some shorelines with limited amounts of giant cutgrass, cow lily (*Nuphar luteum*), and denseflower knotweed (*Polygonum densiflorum*) often growing along open-water edges (Winstead 2004).

The study marsh on Black Bayou was 21 ha. Black Bayou water levels were allowed to fluctuate, with lower levels during the end of the growing season. The Black Bayou study marsh was a giant cutgrass hemi-marsh, a marsh with an equal interspersion of open water and vegetation, although there were some small patches of open water, black willows (*Salix nigra*) and American lotus (*Nelumbo lutea*). Reelfoot Lake and Black Bayou were chosen as study sites because of the perceived decline of some bird species (Nicholson 1997) and documented vegetation changes that have occurred on Reelfoot Lake since water-level stabilization. Furthermore, the vegetation composition on Black Bayou is similar to past communities on Reelfoot Lake.

METHODS

We conducted call-broadcast surveys for secretive marshbirds (Conway 2002) and searched for their nests on Reelfoot Lake and Black Bayou during May-July 2003. Surveys consisted of five-minute passive and nine-minute call-broadcast phases. The call-broadcast phase included 30 seconds of calls, followed by 30 seconds of silence for each target species, which included Least Bittern, Sora, Virginia Rail, King Rail, American Bittern, Common Moorhen, Purple Gallinule, American Coot, and Pied-billed Grebe. We located 45 call-broadcast survey stations throughout Upper Blue, Buck and Blue basins on Reelfoot Lake and conducted 135 call-broadcast surveys at these stations. Wading through Reelfoot Lake marshes to search for nests was impractical because of deep, unconsolidated substrates and the amount of area to cover; therefore most open-water edges of shoreline with emergent marsh on Reelfoot Lake (approximately 18 km) were searched for nests from a GO-DEVIL boat. The use of a GO-DEVIL engine allowed access to almost every part of Reelfoot Lake, including many areas inaccessible to most boats. We located 3 call-broadcast survey stations covering the 21 ha study marsh on Black Bayou, and conducted 9

call broadcast surveys there. We waded through the entire marsh to search for nests on Black Bayou.

RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

We spent hundreds of hours assessing the breeding bird and plant communities on Reelfoot Lake and Black Bayou (Winstead 2004), and we are confident we have thoroughly surveyed the secretive marshbird community. No Pied-billed Grebes were observed on Reelfoot Lake. One Common Moorhen was observed on Reelfoot Lake during one of the 135 call-broadcast surveys and another was observed while traversing the lake between survey stations. There were 11 Pied-billed Grebe and four Common Moorhen encounters during six and three call-broadcast surveys, respectively, of nine call-broadcast surveys conducted on Black Bayou. Nest searching revealed one Pied-billed Grebe nest and one Common Moorhen brood platform on Black Bayou. Both were in Lake County, Tennessee. No nests were found on Reelfoot Lake.

The Pied-billed Grebe nest was found 31 May 2003 surrounded by giant cutgrass interspersed with equal amounts of open water. The six eggs were partially covered with nest material, which is commonly done when adults leave the nest (Muller and Storer 1999). The nest was floating on the water surface and was composed of decaying giant cutgrass inflorescence stalks and leaves (many heavily fraved), mud, and at least one American lotus (Nelumbo lutea) seedpod. The nest was anchored to several giant cutgrass plants, some of which were clipped at the water surface. One giant cutgrass plant was growing from the center of the nest, adjacent to the eggs. New material was added to the nest by the second visit on 6 June. Water depth at the nest was 35 cm, and vegetation height was 1.5 m. The nest was 15 m from the nearest open-water pool > 3 m diameter. The eggs are thought to have successfully hatched between visits on 6 June and 20 June because the nest was abandoned on the last visit, and several very small shell fragments were present. After eggs hatch, adults break up shells and either eat them or dispose of them within the nest (Muller and Storer 1999). If the eggs were predated, they would likely be missing or the shells would not have been broken so finely.

The Common Moorhen brood platform was found 31 May 2003 surrounded by giant cutgrass interspersed with equal amounts of open water and a few black willow (*Salix nigra*) saplings. The platform was made of giant cutgrass and anchored to a black willow sapling. A ramp was present and made by bending adjacent giant cutgrass plants to the water surface from the platform. It was identified as a Common Moorhen brood platform because Common Moorhens build ramps on nests and platforms (Bannor and Kiviat 2002), and a Common Moorhen juvenal plumage feather was found on the ramp. It was not believed to be a nest because a nest cup was not present and Common Moorhen nests are often constructed of dead vegetation (Bannor and Kiviat 2002). This platform's construction material was still green. If this was a nest, a cup should have been present and the nest material would have dried during the time needed for chicks to attain juvenal plumage.

Evidence was found of Common Moorhens breeding on Reelfoot Lake in the 1980s under presumably similar vegetation conditions (Pitts 1985, Nicholson 1997). It is possible that our nest searching methods prevented us from finding all nests.

However, throughout the 2003 breeding season Pied-billed Grebes and Common Moorhens were frequently detected during call-broadcast surveys on Black Bayou; no Pied-billed Grebes and only two Common Moorhens were detected on Reelfoot Lake. Common Moorhens prefer sites with grass-like emergent vegetation and dense SAV (Bannor and Kiviat 2002), and Pied-billed Grebe nests may be destroyed by waves created by motorized boat traffic (Muller and Storer 1999). The replacement of giant cutgrass by the shrub swamp loosestrife, the reduction of SAV, and an increase in motorized boat traffic may have made Reelfoot Lake less suitable for these species than in the past.

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FIRST WINTER RECORD OF BOBOLINK IN TENNESSEE

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During the Cookeville Christmas Bird Count (CBC) 20 December 2003, an adult basic-plumaged Bobolink (*Dolichonyx oryzivorus*) was observed in Putnam County. The bird was observed for approximately 30 minutes in a marshy area situated in the southwest corner of a large agricultural field adjacent to the access road to Ironwood Golf Course, located 6-7 km northwest of Cookeville, Putnam County. The marshy area consisted of a small (c. 0.4 ha), shallow (< 1 m deep) body of water surrounded by an overgrown fringe consisting of mixed grasses, sedges, and other herbaceous species. The marsh was bordered on one side by a small brook overgrown with willow (*Salix* spp.), alder (*Alnus* spp.), and other woody perennials; on another side by the paved access road; and on two sides by the agricultural field. Weather conditions during the observation of the Bobolink included clear skies, fairly calm wind (c. Beaufort 0-1), and temperature in the range of 20-25° F.

The Bobolink was first observed by Kenneth L. Morgan, who called it to the attention of the other two party members, Ginger K. Ensor and Michael J. Hawkins. Ensor kept track of the bird's movement from an elevated position on the road, while Hawkins and Morgan pursued the bird around opposite sides of the small marsh. Ensor then joined the effort to view the bird. The Bobolink never left the marshy area, but it was quite adept at concealing itself in the knee-to-waist high vegetation. Most of the observations occurred as the bird flew from one part of the marsh to another, as it usually landed out of sight in vegetation. Features observed during these flights included the overall buffy yellow color, especially on the breast; dark streaking on the back and sides; dark crown stripes; dark remiges; and dark, short, pointed, ragged rectrices.

At one point Hawkins obtained a very good 2-minute view of the bird from a distance of 2-3 m as it moved through the grass. Hawkins observed these features: a marked delineation between the streaks on the back and the unstreaked, buffy yellow on the nape, pale lores, dark eyeline, pinkish mandibles and tarsi, and markedly pointed or "ragged" rectrices.

After concluding these lengthy efforts to observe this bird, the party members compared observations and consulted various field guides, including Sibley (2000), Peterson (1985), and Scott (1988). Hawkins, having had the best look at the bird, felt confident it was a basic-plumaged Bobolink. Morgan and Ensor were not as certain of the identification, believing that there might be other possibilities— in particular, Dickcissel (*Spiza americana*)—and that corroboration would be needed on a later date. The party members left the site, reported the Bobolink, and submitted a rare bird documentation form at the compilation that evening.

On 21 December 2003, Hawkins returned to the marsh accompanied by Stephen J. Stedman, Cookeville CBC compiler. At approximately 0800 CST the bird was relocated, photographed (identifiable but low quality) by Hawkins, and positively identified as an adult basic-plumaged Bobolink. On 25 December 2003 S. J. Stedman returned to the site with Barbara H. Stedman, and both observers viewed the Bobolink; the former was able to obtain clearly identifiable images of the Bobolink (Stedman 2004). The last known sighting of the Bobolink occurred 28 December 2003 when Douglas A. Downs (pers. com.) observed it at the same site. Searches on several dates during January 2004 (S. J. Stedman pers. com.) produced no further Bobolink observations.

A review of pertinent literature revealed no previous winter record of Bobolink in Tennessee (Robinson 1990; winter season reports 1990-2003 in *Migrant*). In confirmation of this finding, a search of Tennessee CBC data at the national CBC website revealed no CBC records of Bobolink for Tennessee.

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REPORT OF THE TENNESSEE BIRD RECORDS COMMITTEE

This report summarizes the actions taken by the Tennessee Bird Records Committee (TBRC) of the Tennessee Ornithological Society (TOS) from the winter 2003 through 2004 timeframe. Some records were voted on by different individuals, as there is typically at least one member rotating off every year, with someone else coming on. Committee members and alternate that voted on these records were: Jay Desgrollier, K Dean Edwards, John Henderson, Rick Knight, Nell Moore (Alternate), Dick Preston, Rob Peeples, Chris Sloan, and Michael Todd (Secretary).

Acceptance criteria is as follows: A species is placed on the confirmed list based upon either (a) extant, verified specimen, photograph, or sound recording, each accompanied by written details, or (b) satisfactory written documentation of three independent sight records, or three independent observers of the same bird. Without these levels of documentation a species is placed on the Provisional list based on one or two sight records with satisfactory written documentation. Acceptance to either list requires either a unanimous vote in favor, or at most with one dissenting vote, out of 6 votes cast.

This report contains ten records, nine of which were accepted, and publication of one past record.

RECORDS ACCEPTED

Neotropic Cormorant (*Phalacrocorax brasilianus*): Written documentation by Ken Leggett and Glen Criswell of a bird on 7 June 2004, at White Lake Refuge in Dyer Co.

Vote: 5-1

This species is on the Official State List already, listed as casual with this being the 4th record that the TBRC has reviewed and passed. There are other records which haven't been submitted.

Great White Heron (Ardea herodias occidentalis): Written documentation and photographs by Steven J. Stedman of a bird present from 21 September to 11 November 2002 in both DeKalb and Putnam Co.

Vote: 6-0

This is the 2nd record for this Great Blue Heron subspecies for Tennessee. This subspecies is very rare north of Florida.

White-faced Ibis (*Plegadis chihi*): Written documentation and photograph from Ron Hoff and Dollyann Myers of fourteen of these birds on 5 June 2003 along the Great River Rd. in Dyer Co.

Vote: 6-0

This species is already on the Official State List, listed as accidental. This is the 3rd record that has been reviewed and passed by the TBRC. There are other records which haven't been submitted.

Black-necked Stilt (*Himantopus mexicanus*): Written documentation and photographs of two adults seen by Judy C. Fuson and Carol D. Williams, on 8 May 2004 in DeKalb Co.

Vote: 6-0

This species is regular in west Tennessee, but quite rare towards the eastern end of the State

Curlew Sandpiper (*Calidris ferruginia*): Written documentation by Terry Witt of a juvenile bird seen on 4 October 2004 at Britton Ford in Henry Co.

Vote: 5-1

This species is already on the Official State List as accidental. This is only the 2nd record for Tennessee.

Gull-billed Tern (Sterna nilotica): Written documentation by Michael Todd of an adult bird seen on 24 May 2004 along the Great River Rd in Dyer Co.

Vote: 6-0

This is the 1st record of this species for Tennessee. It is placed in the Provisional section of the State List as it was a single observer observation.

Sooty Tern (Sterna fuscata): Written documentation by Kevin Calhoon of an adult on 17 September 2004 at Nickajack Dam in Marion Co.

Vote: 6-0

This species is on the Official State List, and is accidental in the State.

Calliope Hummingbird (*Stellula calliope*): Written documentation of an adult male seen by Jo and Scott McMillan on 29 October 2003 in Louisville, Tennessee; Blount Co.

Vote: 6-0

This species is on the Official State List, listed as casual. This is the 4th record for this species in Tennessee.

Townsend's Warbler (*Dendroica townsendi*): Written documentation by Rick Knight of an adult male seen on 13 January 2004 at Wilbur Lake in Carter Co.

Vote: 5-0

This species is on the Official State List, listed as accidental. This is the 3rd sight record of this species for Tennessee, which moves it off the Provisional list.

In addition, it has been brought to my attention that we have at least one record on the books that apparently never made it into *The Migrant*. The following record thus hasn't shown up in record-form in *The Migrant*:

Lazuli Bunting (Passerina amoena): Written documentation of a female seen by Jeff Wilson and Mark Greene, on 3-4 May 1996, at the EARTH Complex, Shelby Co.

Vote: 6-0

This is the 1st record of this species in the State, with it being placed in the Provisional Category.

RECORDS NOT ACCEPTED

Sharp-tailed Sandpiper (Calidris acuminata): written documentation of an adult by Virginia Reynolds and Linda Zimpel on 9 September 2004 at Ensley Bottoms in Shelby Co.

Vote: 0-6


There is one previous record of this species for Tennessee. This record wasn't accepted because all similar species couldn't be eliminated from the descriptions.

THE SPRING SEASON

1 MARCH - 31 MAY 2005

This was a dry, cool spring for most of the state. The majority of observers declared the migration to have been "fairly typical" or "about average." Some trends were apparent. Reports of late waterfowl were numerous, especially from West Tennessee. Raptors received little mention, although a Golden Eagle in southern Middle Tennessee, a new Bald Eagle nest site in upper East Tennessee, and reports of Merlins and Peregrine Falcons from three regions apiece were noteworthy. Shorebird accounts were generally limited to reports of the less common migrants. Expansion of the Eurasian Collared-Dove population continues, as should monitoring of it. The passerine flight appeared to be near normal for recent years, although early dates were set for several species in Middle Tennessee. Alder Flycatchers were noted in all four regions, perhaps for the first time ever. A Bell's Vireo returned to Lake County. Fish Crows at two sites in the Ridge and Valley add to the small number of reports there. Bewick's Wrens in Sumner and Rutherford counties indicate that the species is still barely holding on in that region. Rarities reported include Thaver's and Iceland gulls, Harris's Sparrow, and Yellowheaded Blackbird in West Tennessee, Pacific Loon, Brant, and Whooping Crane in Middle Tennessee, plus Purple Gallinule and Western Kingbird in East Tennessee.

WESTERN COASTAL PLAIN REGION — Rainfall amounts for the region were quite low this spring. This year's migration was fairly typical. Among the most notable sightings of the period were a Harris's Sparrow and a Yellow-headed Blackbird, both seen by many observers at Shelby Farms. Alder and Willow flycatchers were reported from two locations. Western Kingbirds and Scissor-tailed Flycatchers nested again in Shelby County.

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HIGHLAND RIM AND BASIN REGION — As is often the case, the three months of spring in the Nashville area produced a variety of weather. Of the three months, March was the coolest, being 2.5 degrees below average. April and May were near normal, one degree above and one degree below average, respectively. Although temperatures did not range far from their norms, precipitation was a different story. Rainfall during March was about an inch below normal, but April was very wet with nearly seven inches of rain, almost 60% above average. This was balanced by the following month, which with barely over one inch of precipitation was one of the driest Mays on record.

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CUMBERLAND PLATEAU/RIDGE & VALLEY REGION — Temperatures considerably milder than normal occurred during late March and the first three weeks of April. As a result, tree leaf-out was a bit earlier than average. A cold snap on 23-24 April brought a light snowfall (1-2 in.) to northeast Tennessee and ushered in two weeks of "dogwood winter". The passage of a cold front precipitated a nice fallout of migrants on 29 April through 1 May from Knoxville to the Tri-cities area. The overall migration was about average in Chattanooga.

The best finds of the season were a Western Kingbird and a Purple Gallinule. Other notables included Ross's Goose, American White Pelican, Laughing Gull, Alder Flycatcher, and Brewer's Blackbird. Several unusual shorebirds were seen. Fish Crows and Common Ravens appeared in different ends of the region. Significant breeding reports included Double-crested Cormorant, Least Bittern, Yellow-crowned Night-Heron, Bald Eagle, Peregrine Falcon, and Virginia Rail.
