## BIRD CALENDAR 1920-21 17th YEAR

This notice should have appeared a week earlier, for during the past few days the first spring birds have been noticed in the suburbs and outermost sections of the Cleveland District. The winter, now passing, in sharp contrast to that of the preceding years, has closely resembled that of 1918-19, the mildest of which we have definite records.

Members of the Faculty and the Student-body, as well as others who are interested in Birds are invited to contribute to this record, which will include (1) all Winter Resident and Visitors which have been heard or seen since December 1, 1920, and (2) all the regular Migrants noticed in the Cleveland District.

Birds in the field are identified by their size, form, color and markings, by their song, flight, and general habits. Reports should include the Name, Date, Place, and approximate number of individuals seen at a given time. Accuracy in such reports is the great desideratum. Aid in determining the names of unidentified birds will be given gladly.

Reports may be handed or sent to Professor Hulme, of the College for Women, or the undersigned at the Biological Laboratory.
