The migration of birds from the south, as was suggested in the last Bulletin, was not felt in any part of the Lake Region before February 24. From that date until well into April the advance of the "spring-line", estimated at 35° Fahrenheit, was constantly and uniformly retarded, with the following result,-checked vegetable growth and insect development, slow movement of migratory birds from the south, and a markedly "late spring; in contrast with the two preceding years, in which this season was abnormally early.

April opened on Easter Day with a temperature of eleven degrees, the lowest recorded for that month in fifty years, and there was little real warmth experienced before the twentieth. As a compensation for this prolonged period of general discontent, Ohio has at last the promise of a perfect fruit-year; not a bud up to this date - April 28 - has been frosted, and the danger-line has been passed.

The chief value of the present record lies in the large number of Water Birds reported by Messrs. Baker and Doolittle.

An outstanding ornithological event of this season is undoubtedly the invasion of Cedar Waxwings from the south, as noted by many observers throughout our region, - a movement not to be confounded with the occasional visits of the larger Bohemian Waxwings from the north. Cedarbirds, as they are known familiarly, in flocks of from ten to fifty or more, were first noticed on the Heights in early March, and have been seen almost daily since; they have come repeatedly to the Adelbert Campus, and on April 21 were seen as far west as Vermilion. Though resident to some extent most of these birds will pass to the north of us, where they breed exceptionally late, having first or second broods up to the end of August. When perched they sit close together and erect, and being thus easily approached they are distinguished readily by their grayish coloring, their rather prominent crests, and by a black band through the eye; their common note is a subdued whistle, hardly rising above a whisper; in flight they often open and close ranks, but seldom scatter, except when about to feed; they take fruits and berries of various kinds, but will snap up on occasion insects in the air, with the skill of a born flycatcher, and on April 22 many were seen eagerly picking out the fine stamens from the flowers of the maple and the elm.

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37. White-headed Eagle; nest-building at Vermilion March 13-15, and probably for a week earlier; incubation begun about March 20; two young hatched about April 17; incubation period about 28 days, with probably error of not more than two or three days.
38. Mockingbird; March 19, Creedon's Pond, Painesville, where it was identified positively, at close range, by Messrs. Baker and Doolittle; had been in the vicinity for at least a month; singing besides its own notes those of the Brown Thrasher, Catbird, and Cardinal; extremely rare in this district, but sometimes mistaken for the Brown Thrasher or Thrush, but aside from its song readily distinguished from the latter by its whitish breast, without markings, white outer tail feathers and the white of the primary coverts; observed in the same place on April 8 and 16.
