

## CLEVELAND BIRD CALENDAR

# Edited by Arthur B. Williams Issued June 23, 1950

Records in this issue include the complete reports of the Sunday morning Bird Walks conducted by the Cleveland Museum of Natural History on April 16, 23, 30, May 7, 14 and 21, 1950. These covered the region at 13 different points, including Elyria on the west, Hinckley on the south, Punderson Lake on the east and Black Brook on the northeast. Adding 2 extra walks held at Gordon Park May 28 and June 4, and 3 walks at the Holden Arboretum April 23, May 7 and 14, this made a total of 77 different excursions for the observation of birds during the 1950 spring migration season.

This coverage is the best we have ever had. The importance of its contribution to our knowledge of the birds of this region is reflected directly in the wealth of data shown in the following pages. Our hearty thanks go to all those whose enthusiastic volunteer leadership has made this possible.

Incidentally, the list of 74 contributors to this issue is the largest number ever, and is somewhat of a record in itself.

"THE BIRDS OF CLEVELAND" is the short title chosen for our Check List of Birds of the Cleveland Region. Copies should be ready for distribution early in July. The price is \$2.00 (plus 6¢ sales tax in Ohio). Anyone at all interested in the study of birds in the Cleveland area will want, and should have, this book. 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
## SUMMARY OF WEATHER CONDITIONS

 $\underline{\text{March}}$  - A cold, disagreeable month with frequent rain or snow. Lowest temperature of the winter was  $6^{\circ}$  on the 3rd. Snowfall about twice normal.

April - The wettest April in 80 years of records. Rain fell on all but 6 days. It was also the coldest April in 24 years, with temperatures below normal on two thirds of the days. An all time low of 20° was recorded on the 13th and 14th.

 $\underline{\text{May}}$  - Dry in the first half of the month, but with abundant rainfall during the latter half. The combination of April and early May weather produced a delayed spring.

In the diagram below each spoke of the wheel, from center to circumference, represents 3 inches of water. The dotted line connects the points which show "normal" or average precipitation for each month. The solid line connects points showing the actual precipitation for the months of 1949-1950 indicated. Figures are records of U. S. Weather Bureau located at the Cleveland Airport.



### INTERESTING OR UNUSUAL RECORDS

- Eared Grebe One seen April 6 near Mecca by R. W. Hill (See Field Notes, p.11).

  Snowy Egret One seen May 7 at Aurora Pond by R. W. Hill; one seen May 14

  at Abram's Lake by H. C. Dobbins.
- <u>Little Blue Heron</u> One seen May 30 in marsh along Route 532 one half mile north of Cuyahoga Falls by C. F. Gibbs.
- American Brant One seen by Frank Phelps near Marblehead May 14 (See Field Notes, p. 12).
- European Widgeon Two seen April 17 on Corning Lake by W. E. Scheele.
- Iceland Gull One seen March 4 at Avon by James F. Akers.
- Snowy Owl March reports include 8 records of individual owls seen along the lake shore, some of which are undoubtedly duplicates. One was observed eating a merganser.
- Great Gray Owl One seen March 25 on breakwater at East 71st Street by M. C. Gilfillan (See Field Notes, p. 12).
- Golden-winged Warbler An unusual number of records (14 in all) ranging from May 6 to May 14, and including Brecksville, Rocky River, Elyria, Gordon Park, North Akron, Aurora, Hinckley and Black Brook.
- <u>Evening Grosbeak</u> Scattering records through March, April and May Chardon, Painesville, Aurora, Kent, Chesterland.
- Pine Siskin Although only 1 bird was reported seen in our region (March 5), a flock of 80 was reported at Pymatuning April 2 by J. E. Lieftinck.

  Lark Sparrow One seen May 7 on Gordon Park Bird Walk. Reported by B. P. Bole, Jr.

#### NESTING RECORDS

- Great Blue Heron Novelty, May 21, 57 birds in colony C. T. Downer.
- Mallard Marsh ½ mile north of Cuyahoga Falls, May 30, female with 13 young C. F. Gibbs.
- Blue-winged Teal Abram's Lake, May 21, nest with 5 broken eggs Walter Hoyles
- <u>Wood Duck</u> <u>Hinckley</u>, May 30, about 30 feet up in old pileated woodpecker hole in beech tree, 9 eggs. Nesting material, down and dead bees (active hive of bees about 6' above duck's nest) Rollin Dike, Edward MacArthurthur.
- Cooper's Hawk Aurora, May 9, adult flew from same nest 40' up in white ash occupied in 1949; May 21, adult flew from nest Carl F. Hamann.
- Red-shouldered Hawk Aurora, April 1, bird on nest 40' up in crotch of beech;

  April 20, adult on nest, leeward side of which covered with pieces of down;

  April 27, adult flushed from nest; May 19, young visible over rim of nest

   Carl F. Hamann.
  - North Chagrin, April 9, nest of dead twigs in crotch of beech tree 30' up, female broke off 14-inch dead branch of beech tree and added it to nest -Donald L. Newman.
  - Silver Lake, April 9, 16, 23, bird on nest; April 24, nest abandoned; 6th consecutive year for this nest; May 21, nest located 1/4 mile from abandoned nest above; May 30, bird on nest C. F. Gibbs.

#### REPORT ON PURPLE MARTIN NESTING CENSUS

The effort to determine the approximate number of active purple martin colonies within 30 miles of the Cleveland Public Square aroused considerable public interest. Through radio broadcasts, announcements in suburban and Cleveland newspapers, and the cooperation of many individuals, a large number of reports were received.

When tabulated, as of June 19, these showed a total of 147 martin houses with a nesting population of 1621 pairs of birds. To these we may add 58 houses with 645 pairs of birds reported last year and not covered by the reports of this year. This gives us a total of 205 houses with 2266 pairs of nesting martins.

It is significant that the entire region is well represented in this sample coverage. While most martin colonies are reported from Cleveland, the outlying suburbs east, west and south are well supplied with nesting colonies. Outstanding is the village of Chardon, with 13 houses occupied by 173 pairs of birds.

It is the Editor's opinion that these figures may represent only 1/4 or 1/5 of the actual martin population of the region. In other words, we probably have 800 to 1000 martin houses here, with 8000 to 10,000 pairs of birds occupying them every year.

Incidentally, a great deal of valuable information about purple martins was obtained, which can be included in a study of their nesting habits.

To all who assisted in this project goes our hearty thanks for their interest and cooperation.

#### FIELD NOTES

Eared Grebe - "When riding from Greene to Mecca April 6, 1950, I saw this grebe in the water only 15 to 20 feet from the car (the water here was only 3 feet from the roadway). It swam along parallel to the road. I had Peterson in my hand. The bird was just as shown on page 6 for eared grebe in winter plumage. The description on pages 3 and 4 fitted exactly." - R. W. Hill.

While the above observation was made just east of our regional limits, it is of interest to us because of two previous records of the Eared Grebe on Corning Lake at the Holden Arboretum - Ed.

American Bittern Visits Museum of Natural History - Carl Hamann, looking out of the window of Dr. Williams' office about 10 o'clock on the morning of May 5, spied an American Bittern sitting in a lilac bush in the space between the two buildings at 2717 Euclid Avenue. The bird did not move from this perch until 3:30 in the afternoon.

Meanwhile he became an object of interest to all Museum visitors, including Harold T. Clark, Museum Trustee, and a class of 38 sixth grade children from John Burroughs School. Many automobiles, coming and going, passed within 10 feet of the bird. The wind, at times, mussed up his feathers considerably, but he seemed to be able to shake them all back into place again without trouble.

We think our visitor may have been traveling all night, and being tired, dropped into the first green bush that he saw at daylight for a good long rest - Arthur B. Williams.

- Pacing a Whistling Swan -"Just before noon today (May 1) I happened to see a Whistling Swan in flight. I was driving west on Lake Shore Boulevard, a little to the west of Lost Nation Road, when I overtook this huge white bird flying sedately ahead of me about 100 feet up. There couldn't be much mistake about him; but for his all-white color he looked like a great blue heron going backwards. He veered over to the shore line and followed it along. When I kept steadily abreast my speed was only 20 m.p.h. and several times, by going only 30, I got ahead of him and pulled off the road to stop and watch him go by. We went along about a mile together. He was a fine sight." Theodore Hall.
- Brant Reported at Sandusky Bay "A Brant was seen May 14, 1950, by Jack Smith and myself on the south side of the Marblehead Peninsula in a large marshy pond near Cooke's Dock. One of the Toledo Club members had reported it earlier in the day but it had not been accepted. When our wholly independent report came in, great interest was immediately shown, and probably 100 members of the Toledo Club went to see it during the afternoon." Frank M. Phelps
- Goshawk Killed by Hen B. P. Bole, Jr. is responsible for the following account of a goshawk episode in the village of Bratenahl during the winter of 1920 or 1921. At the time he was interested in raising a flock of barred Plymouth Rock chickens.

While watching the chickens one day, the hawk suddenly "appeared out of nowhere" and struck one of the hens. Instantly another hen and a rooster, standing nearby, attacked the hawk. The hen, a big one weighing about 10 pounds, clamped her beak on the back of the hawk's head while the two rolled over and over on the ground. When the hen and the hawk were separated the hawk was dead, having had the back portion of its skull crushed by the hen's beak.

This, incidentally, adds another goshawk record to our list for the Cleveland region - Ed.

Great Gray Owl on Cleveland Breakwater - Mr. M. C. Gilfillan, District Game Management Agent, District 3, Northeastern Ohio, says that on March 25, 1950, while studying the ducks along the Lake Erie shore near East 71st Street, Cleveland, his attention was attracted to a large, dark owl sitting on the breakwater. With 7 x 35 binoculars he was able to study the bird closely for about 15 minutes in bright sunlight. He has no doubt but that the bird was a great gray owl - Strix nebulosa nebulosa.

This he determines on the basis of (1) size. The bird was a "giant" in size as compared with the size of a canvasback duck in flight close by. (2) The color was exceedingly dark - in fact, it seemed almost black. (3) The facial discs were large and strongly marked with concentric circles. It could not be confused with a snowy owl, even of the darkest markings.

The only record of the great gray owl near the Cleveland region is of one shot at Huntsburg, Geauga County, about 1858. It is normally a bird of the evergreen forests of Canada, but in winter sometimes visits the northern limits of the United States and should be occasionally recorded from northern Ohio.

Flight Song of Acadian Flycatcher - "On May 27, 1950 Mary Oliver and I were listening to an Acadian flycatcher near the Nature Trail at North Chagrin. We kept hearing another song which we did not know, but finally discovered it was the Acadian singing as he flew from one side of the ravine to the other. Sometimes he continued with a few notes and fluttering wings after he had reached his perch. This song sounded a little like the whinneying note of the woodcock as he starts his sky dance. Chapman describes it as resembling 'the soft murmuring of whistling wings'" - Vera Carrothers

First Report of Nest of Least Flycatcher Discovered in the Cleveland Region - Although for some years past it has been apparent to students of birds in this region that the Least Flycatcher was a probable rare breeding species here, no actual finding of a nest has apparently ever been reported.

This spring, Dr. C. T. Downer, leading a group of Sunday Morning Bird Walkers from Gates Mills on May 21, discovered a small flycatcher on her nest in an apple tree. His identification of the bird as a Least Flycatcher was concurred in by Charles A. Toutasse, a member of the group.

Later, on May 30, Dr. Downer very kindly showed this nest to me. The location was on the H. Black farm near Chesterland, in Geauga County. The nest was in a medium-sized apple tree, in a small apple orchard, about 30 feet from the ground. It was built in a stout three-way crotch on one of the ascending side branches of the tree, and so situated as to make close inspection impossible.

It could be seen, however, that the nest was well snugged down in the crotch; composed of fluffy plant materials; and was in the form of a deep cup. It was plainly not the nest of the wood pewee, alder or Acadian flycatcher, with all of which I am familiar.

The bird was on her nest, and we found it difficult to get her to fly. Dr. Downer climbed to within 6 feet of the nest without getting her off. When she did fly in response to vigorous shaking of the limb, she seemed neither disturbed nor anxious. First, in the nest tree she busied herself preening her feathers, and later in a nearby small tree, she did a little flycatching near the ground. I got some good looks at her through my 7x35 binoculars, and have no doubt she was a least flycatcher, although during the entire time of our visit the bird was silent.

In view of the fact that this is our first reported nest of this species here, Dr. Downer expects to collect the nest after the young have left it - Arthur B. Williams.

Albino Robins - We have had 5 reports of partial albino robins this spring - all from sections east of Cleveland. This is in line with reports of similar conditions in recent years, seeming to indicate that an albinistic strain may have become established among the robin population in the eastern section of our region - Ed.
