
### JUNCO SYMPOSIUM

Pvt. Smith writes:

"It may be quite a surprise to learn that I have been in the Army since the 28th of September. However, all is not as bad as it may seem. I took 6 weeks of basic training at Fort Dix, N. J. and then was assigned to the U.S. Army Veterinary Corps as a Meat and Milk Inspector. At present I am stationed at the Boston Army Base and living out on subsistance. I have a room at the above address."

### MORE FROM THE NORTH

Mr. Maurice G. Street, whose note on banding in Saskatchewan appeared in a recent issue of the News has sent in more about his banding. He writes:

"Have not as yet received word as to where the White-throated Sparrow was banded. I sent in the return card with several others when I reported the Hawks and Owls to the Service. So I may receive word most anytime.

"Have just been advised by the Fish & Wildlife Service that two of the Hawks and Owls that I banded last summer have been shot. The Great Horned Owl was killed about 12 miles from the nest where banded.

"Of 20 Red-tails, banded as nestlings since 1945, I have had 7 recoveries. These recoveries have been from Saskatchewan and the States of Wisconsin, Iowa, Missouri and Kansas. This is a very high percentage of returns and is evidence that a great slaughter of our beneficial Hawks, from guns in the hands of thoughtless hunters or others that are ignorant as to the good that these hawks do, is going on. In addition to recoveries of my banded Red-tails, Billy Matthews, now also banding at Nipawin (received his permit last May) banded a single Red-tail, and this one was shot in southern Manitoba. That makes 8 of 21."
