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FIRST CONFIRMED NEST OF COOPER'S HAWKS IN NORTHWEST TENNESSEE

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A pair of adult Cooper's Hawks (*Accipiter cooperii*) nested in the front yard of my home in Weakley County, Tennessee, in 2003. The nest was centered in the crown of a red maple (*Acer rubrum*) 13.6 m above the ground. The nest tree was 19.5 m tall and had a diameter at breast height of 26 cm. It was located at the south edge of a 6 m x 74 m rectangular block of closely spaced, 27-year-old Virginia pines (*Pinus virginiana*) that had been invaded by several species of deciduous trees, including the nest tree. This block of trees separated the east side of my yard from a hay field. Large tracts of deciduous woodland were located immediately to the south and 82 m to the east of the nest site. The base of the nest tree was 6.1 m from a driveway and 42.1 m from the front of my house. Coordinates of the nest tree are 41° 29′ 49″ N, 84° 56′ 15″ W.

Throughout the winter of 2002-2003 I occasionally observed Cooper's Hawks in the yard. In March I frequently heard the calls of Cooper's Hawks, mostly near what I eventually learned was their nest site. On 6 April I discovered the nest, which was virtually complete, with an adult Cooper's Hawk perched beside it. I do not know the history of the nest; it may have been recently constructed, but it could have been present for a year or more. Two other nests of similar size and composition were present within 10 m of the nest used in 2003. Both of these nests were in Virginia pines.

Following my initial sighting, I saw or heard one or both of the hawks at or near the nest almost daily through mid-July, except for 15-28 June when I was away from home and could not check the nest. Each morning I walked almost under the nest on the way to and from my mailbox for the newspaper. If a hawk was on the nest, it did not flush when I walked by. Vehicles in the driveway did not cause the hawks to flush. On one occasion during incubation, the female flew directly over me (not more than 5 m above my head) as she came off of the nest in response to the calls of the male, which I suspect delivered a food item to her. A few minutes later she returned to the nest, again flying over me. In general, the hawks did not ignore me when I was near the nest, but they displayed neither aggression nor fear toward my two beagle hounds or me.

After the maple tree leaves grew to full size, they almost totally blocked my view of the nest. Due to the small diameter of the nest tree and the location of the nest high in the tree, I was reluctant to climb it, partly out of fear of damaging the tree and nest and partly out of concern for my own safety. Consequently, I was not able to determine clutch size, how many eggs hatched, or the number of young that fledged. However, I was able to learn approximate dates for some of the nest-ing activities. On 11 April the hawks made at least six trips to the nest between 1700 and 1900; I suspect they were completing the construction of the nest and on 31 May I discovered pieces of another Cooper's Hawk eggshell. Since incubation typically requires about 30 to 36 days (Rosenfield and Bielefeldt, 1993), I estimate that: (1) the eggs were laid in the last half of April, which is the peak time for egg laying by Cooper's Hawks in Tennessee (Nicholson 1997); (2) hatching occurred near the end of May; and, (3) the young fledged in early to mid-July, when I began hearing one or more fledglings in the trees near the nest.

The only evidence I found of possible Cooper's Hawk predation on local birds was two piles of Mourning Dove (*Zenaida macroura*) feathers in my yard. As many as 50 Mourning Doves regularly fed on the ground in the yard; since the Cooper's Hawks frequently perched in trees near the site where the doves fed, I suspect that the hawks may have taken more than two of the doves. I did not find any regurgitated hawk pellets near the nest; however, my searches were hindered by a dense cover of dead leaves and undergrowth beneath the perches that the adults most frequently used.

Numerous species of birds foraged and nested near the Cooper's Hawk nest. A pair of Prothonotary Warblers (*Protonotaria citrea*) used a nestbox directly beneath the hawk nest. I never observed any interactions between the Cooper's Hawks and the warblers. On two occasions the loud, scolding calls of Blue Jays (*Cyanocitta cristata*) near the nest indicated that they had discovered one of the hawks, but the jays quickly moved away. A pair of Red-tailed Hawks (*Buteo jamaicensis*) nested 219 m north of the Cooper's Hawks' nest. The two species of hawks rarely interacted, but on one occasion I observed a Red-tailed Hawk chasing a Cooper's Hawk through the yard.

The literature on Cooper's Hawks contains several records of nests in middle Tennessee and east Tennessee, but confirmed nests in west Tennessee are rare (Nicholson 1997). McWhirter (2000) published the best documentation of a west Tennessee nest. Cooper's Hawks used this Shelby County site for three consecutive years (2000-2002), and the hawks apparently nested nearby in 2003 (Susan McWhirter, personal communication). In her review of the literature, McWhirter (2000) found references to only three other west Tennessee nests of Cooper's Hawks, two in Shelby County (Coffey 1945, Coffey 1950) and one in Henderson County (Waldron 1986). I have found more recent information on seven other west Tennessee nests. Lake (2002) discovered four Cooper's Hawks nests in Fayette County during the 2000 and 2001 nesting seasons, and Jeff Wilson (personal communication) observed three Cooper's Hawks nests in Shelby County during the 2004 nesting season.

While this is my first record of a Cooper's Hawk nest in Weakley County, I suspect that a pair had been nesting in the vicinity of the 2003 nest for at least three years prior to 2003. During the 2000 and 2001 nesting seasons I repeatedly heard the calls of Cooper's Hawks near my house. In July of 2002 I saw a fledg-ling Cooper's Hawk about 100 m from the site of the 2003 nest. Although Cooper's Hawks did not use the 2003 nest site in 2004, I did see and hear Cooper's Hawks in my yard during the 2004 nesting season.

In recent years I have also observed Cooper's Hawks several times during the nesting season elsewhere in Weakley County as well as in Obion and Henry Counties. This increase in the number of sightings during the nesting season is consistent with both the Tennessee and national trends of more Cooper's Hawk reports, apparently due to a population increase in recent years (Nicholson 1997, Rosenfield and Bielefeldt 1993). Based on the number of reported sightings, plus Mengel's (1965) observation that some nesting Cooper's Hawks are quiet and easily overlooked, I suspect that Cooper's Hawks may now nest in most, if not all, counties in Tennessee.

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FIRST KNOX COUNTY RECORD: BROWN-HEADED NUTHATCH

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In late Fall of 2002 a friend of Steve and Gail Clendenen told them about a strange bird coming to her feeder in Hickory Woods subdivision in western Knox County. The lady thought it might be a Brown-headed Nuthatch (*Sitta pusilla*). On a chilly 15 December 2002 I went to the area early in the morning and found the target bird — one lone Brown-headed Nuthatch! Hickory Woods is an upscale subdivision with many pines in and around the relatively small lots.

A few days later Steve and Gail Clendenen confirmed my findings when they observed a single Brown-headed Nuthatch foraging in pines in the same location.

There was a record of Brown-headed Nuthatch reported on a 1914 Knoxville Christmas Count, but it was not substantiated and the identification was questionable (Trabue 1965). Given that, this is the first confirmed Knox County record of this species. Steve and Gail Clendenen observed two Brown-headed Nuthatches in the same general area on the Knox County Christmas Count 4 January 2003 (Hoff 2004).

This is a continuance of the species range expansion in the state. I well remember when, in 1968, the first sighting of a Brown-headed Nuthatch in the state of Tennessee was reported from the Chattanooga area (Bashan 1969). The first nesting record for the state followed in 1977, also in Hamilton County (Haney 1981).

In March of 1993 J.B. Owen asked me to go to the Watts Bar Lake area near Rockwood, Tennessee (Roane County) to check a bird coming to a feeder. John Upchurch and I went to investigate and found the bird was a Brown-headed Nuthatch. Fledglings were later discovered near the Kingston Steam Plant in 1995, which is also in Roane County (Nicholson 1997).

The northeastward range expansion in Tennessee continued as Elizabeth M. Schilling discovered them in August 1996 in the Melton Hill Dam Campground in north Loudon County (Roy et al. 2001). This is east of the steam plant and only about 7 air miles from the area in the Hickory Woods subdivision where I later confirmed the birds in Knox County. Some suggest the nuthatch's expansion will be limited to the range of native Loblolly Pine (*Pinus taeda*) (Nicholson 1997). A discussion of Brown-headed Nuthatch range expansion in Tennessee can be found in Haney (1981) and Tanner (1988) and more recently in Roy et al. (2001) and Stedman and Walden (2003).

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IN MEMORIAM: BARBARA WAYMAN FINNEY

Barbara Wayman Finney died at the age of 66 on 7 April 2004 in Knoxville, Tennessee. Barbara contributed to the Tennessee Ornithological Society (TOS) in many ways during nearly 30 years of membership, serving as President from 1989 until 1991.

Born 13 February 1938 in Kingsport, Barbara graduated from high school in Knoxville, attended the University of Tennessee, and married James "Jim" Imboden Finney, Jr. from Columbia, TN. Barbara and Jim lived in Columbia for many years. It was while living in Columbia that Barbara became interested in birds.



Barbara was a founding member of the Columbia TOS Chapter that was reorganized in 1975 by the late George R. Mayfield, Jr., M.D. and the late Daniel R. Gray, Jr., M.D. George and his wife Cleo were Barbara's good friends and birding companions. George, as he did with so many novice and experienced birders, passed along his enthusiasm and great knowledge of Tennessee's birds to Barbara.

Barbara soon had her own following with her weekly nature column, "Out the Window," published in Columbia's *The Daily Herald*. She served the Columbia TOS chapter as Publicity Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer. She was Vice-President in 1979 before moving to Knoxville in 1980 where she and Jim operated Fidelity Sales Corporation, a family business started by Barbara's father.

Barbara soon shared her many talents with the Knoxville TOS Chapter. She was elected to serve as Secretary in 1982 and President in 1984. During her term as President of the Knoxville Chapter, Barbara worked with the late Louise Fuller and other chapter members for the eventual establishment of House Mountain State Natural Area. She planned the very successful 1986 joint meeting in Gatlinburg between TOS and the Wilson Ornithological Society.

Barbara was elected State Secretary in 1983 and served as State President from 1989 until 1991. She also shared her financial skills and knowledge by serving on the TOS State Finance Committee and by serving as State Treasurer during 1995. During her term as state President, TOS celebrated its 75th Anniversary in 1990. Work on the Breeding Bird Atlas Project neared completion, and TOS contracted with the University of Tennessee Press for the publication of *An Atlas of the Breeding Birds of Tennessee*. TOS embarked on the Tennessee Migratory Bird Project and established the TOS Distinguished Service Awards. Barbara's husband, Jim, served as editor of the state newsletter, *The Tennessee Warbler*, when Barbara was President. Barbara traveled extensively, always accompanied by binoculars, field guide, and a camera. Florida's Captiva and Sanibel Islands were annual winter birding destinations for many years. An accomplished photographer, Barbara rarely missed a daily drive through Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge to check out the birds and look for photo opportunities.

In recent years, Barbara enjoyed the birds and cultural attractions in France, Italy, Austria, Hungary and Newfoundland. She was always looking forward to the next trip and the next opportunity to see new birds and places.

Barbara served other organizations as ably as she served TOS. She was Elder and Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Knoxville's Westminster Presbyterian Church and past President of both Knoxville's Blount Mansion Association and Columbia's James K. Polk Memorial Association.

The Tennessee Ornithological Society and its members benefited greatly from Barbara's dedicated service. The TOS Distinguished Service Award, given to Barbara posthumously, was accepted by her daughter, Virginia F. Ellis, at the November 3, 2004 meeting of the Knoxville Chapter. Those who knew Barbara will remember her for her conscientiousness, perseverance, unselfish sharing of her time and many talents, and high standards for excellence in everything she undertook.

Barbara and Jim Finney are buried at Wilkes Cemetery in Culleoka, TN. They are survived by three children: daughter Virginia F. Ellis of Knoxville; sons James "Buddy" I. Finney III and his wife Faser of Richmond, VA and John Wayman Finney and his wife Sandra of Culleoka, TN.

2004 TENNESSEE NORTH AMERICAN MIGRATION COUNT

RON HOFF, STATE COMPILER 282 Hackworth Lane Clinton, TN 37716

This was the eighth consecutive year for the spring North American Migration Count. Twenty counties were censused, and observers recorded 214 species and 54,415 individuals (Table 1). This was one species shy of the all-time record (215) for this count in Tennessee. The weather was generally mild throughout the state with no significant rainfall or high winds. Temperatures ranged from 45-90° F. Greater White-fronted Goose, Canvasback, Tundra Swan, and American Golden-Plover were new species for the count, bringing the all-time count total up to 258 species. The following species represented all-time high totals for this count: Snow Goose, Canada Goose, Hooded Merganser, Pied-billed Grebe, Anhinga, Snowy Egret, Little Blue Heron, Cattle Egret, Black Vulture, Osprey, Bald Eagle Northern Harrier, Red-shouldered Hawk, Lesser Yellowlegs, Solitary Sandpiper, Pectoral Sandpiper, Stilt Sandpiper, Long-billed Dowitcher, Eurasian Collared-Dove, Barn Owl, Barred Owl, Chuck-will's-widow, Red-bellied Woodpecker, Downy Woodpecker, Hairy Woodpecker, Pileated Woodpecker, Eastern Wood-Pewee, Eastern Phoebe, Yellow-throated Vireo, Warbling Vireo, Purple Martin, Tree Swallow, Cliff Swallow, Tufted Titmouse, Carolina Wren, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, Gray-cheeked Thrush, Hermit Thrush, American Pipit, Tennessee Warbler, Northern Parula, Yellow-throated Warbler, Louisiana Waterthrush, Hooded Warbler, Summer Tanager, Scarlet Tanager, Field Sparrow, White-crowned Sparrow, Blue Grosbeak, Orchard Oriole and Baltimore Oriole. The following species were recorded in the lowest all-time totals for this count: Double-crested Cormorant, Caspian Tern, Least Tern, Black Tern, Eastern Screech Owl, Chimney Swift, Veery, Yellow Warbler, Chestnut-sided Warbler, Magnolia Warbler, and Black-throated Blue Warbler. Winter Wren, Golden-crowned Kinglet, Golden-winged Warbler, and Darkeyed Junco were missed for the first time ever on this count and Brown Creeper was missed for the first time in 6 years.

Anderson County – 0500-2100. Weather: light fog in a.m., then mostly sunny; 54-87° F. Black-crowned Night-Heron, Sharp-shinned Hawk, Greater Yellowlegs, Gray-cheeked Thrush, and White-crowned Sparrow were all new species for this count, bringing the all-time total for this count to 150. Canada Goose, Osprey, Barred Owl, Great Horned Owl, Carolina Wren, Scarlet Tanager, and Field Sparrow all represented new count high totals. A Wilson's Warbler was also an unusual find. Club); Friendsville; Great Smoky Mountains National Park (Abram's Creek campground, Cades Cove, Foothills Parkway, Schoolhouse Gap trail, Tremont); Kyker Bottoms; Louisville (Louisville Point Park); Maryville (Maryville College woods, Maryville greenbelt); Northeast Blount County; Rockford; and Townsend. Notable sightings included American Bittern, Yellow-crowned Night-Heron, American Coot, Black-billed Cuckoo, Common Raven, Brown-headed Nuthatch, Hermit Thrush, American Pipit, Canada and Swainson's Warblers, and Grasshopper Sparrow. 2004 SPRING FIELD DAYS

RON HOFF, STATE COMPILER 282 Hackworth Lane Clinton, TN 37716

This report summarizes the traditional spring bird counts that are typically run on dates other than the North American Migration Count date or include more than one county in their count area. This year observers tallied 196 species and 37,193 individuals (Table 1). The weather was generally mild with temperatures ranging from 57-89° F. Most counts had some precipitation. A Bachman's Sparrow in White County was probably the most unusual species found. This was the inaugural year for the White County count. Other highlights included Redhead, Golden Eagle, Least and Scissor-tailed Flycatchers, Brown-headed Nuthatch (seen bringing food to a nest in Knoxville), Bewick's Wren, and Connecticut and Mourning Warblers.

Columbia – 30 April & 1 May: 0700-1530 (both days). Weather: cloudy, scattered showers, and winds S, 5-15 mph; 62-74° F. Species of interest included American Bittern, Sora, Short-billed Dowitcher, Barn Owl, 5 Loggerhead Shrikes, Wilson's Warbler, LeConte's Sparrow, and 415 Bobolinks. The total species count average for the last 20 years has been 144. The all-time high count was 157 species in 1992. 

THE SPRING SEASON

1 MARCH - 31 MAY 2004

Mild temperatures and slightly above normal rainfall prevailed across the state this spring. While the overview of this season's migration was regarded as unremarkable by some observers, the volume of reports belies that somewhat. Several rare to uncommon species were reported statewide. Yellow-billed Loon, Whitefaced Ibis, California Gull, Gull-billed Tern, and Vermilion Flycatcher highlighted the season in the western region. Tricolored Heron, Black-necked Stilt, and Marbled Godwit were notable in Middle Tennessee. Mississippi Kite, Black-necked Stilt, and Fish Crow were significant sightings in the Ridge and Valley. A new state high count for Red-necked Grebe was established in the mountain region A few noteworthy breeding records are sprinkled through the regional reports, such as Blue-winged Teal, Hooded Merganser (two regions), Double-crested Cormorant, Peregrine Falcon (two regions), and Virginia Rail. A species that deserves closer monitoring in the state is the Loggerhead Shrike, which had single breeding instances reported from three regions.

WESTERN COASTAL PLAIN REGION — While the first half of the period was quite dry, there were many rainy days in late April. Early May also received more than its usual amount of rainfall. This unfavorable weather during the peak of migration may have been one, though not necessarily the only, factor in creating the sense felt by several observers that this season's migration was rather poor. Among the noteworthy species lingering into March from the winter season were the California Gull and *two* Yellow-billed Loons at Pace Point, plus the Vermilion Flycatcher at Hatchie. The spring did bring such rare species as a wellstudied White-faced Ibis in Dyer County and a well-documented Common Ground-Dove in Shelby County. Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrows were noted in Henry County, while a Bell's Vireo returned to its previous nesting location in Lake County. Unusual species appearing in multiple locations included Whimbrel, Hudsonian Godwit and Scissor-tailed Flycatcher in two locations each, along with Anhinga, Western Kingbird and Painted Bunting each noted at three locations. The season's most exciting find, however, was certainly the Gull-billed Tern in Dyer County. As a sight record by one observer, it will be a new species to add to the state's provisional list, pending TBRC acceptance.

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HIGHLAND RIM AND BASIN REGION — In general the three month spring period for the region was warm and wet. The mean temperature in Nashville was above average for each of the three months, with May having the greatest deviation, a substantial 4.6 degrees above normal, making it feel more like summer. While March had a normal amount of precipitation, in both April and May rainfall was more than two inches above average. Several storm systems lasting two to three days resulted in flooding of the Harpeth River and other streams and small rivers in the area.

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CUMBERLAND PLATEAU / RIDGE & VALLEY REGION - Temperatures from late March into April were warmer than average, while the remainder of the season was near normal. Rainfall varied from over four inches deficient at Chattanooga to just above average in the Tri-cities area. Some observers described the overall migration as below average. In Chattanooga, the passerine flight "started late and peaked early, around 28-31 April."

A pair of Black-necked Stilts at Rankin Bottoms provided the region's second record. Fish Crows were reported twice, including far north at Kingston Steam Plant. Other notable sightings included Snowy Egret (four reports), Mississippi Kite, King Rail, and Henslow's Sparrow (two reports). A pair of Scissor-tailed Flycatchers returned to a Marion County nest site. Blue-winged Teal nested for the first time in Hamilton County. Nesting Red-shouldered Hawks at Kingsport were noteworthy for northeast Tennessee, where the species is unexpectedly rare.

Precipitation was about normal for the period. The most amazing occurrence this spring was the influx of Red-necked Grebes at South Holston Lake. A one day total of 15 was seen, providing a new high count for the state.

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MATERIAL: The subject matter should relate to some phase of Tennessee ornithology. It should be original, factual, concise, and scientifically accurate.

STYLE: Both articles and short notes are solicited; recent issues of *The Migrant* should be used as a guide in the preparation of manuscripts. Where more detail is needed, reference should be made to the *CBE Style Manual*; this book is available at many public libraries and from the Council of Biology Editors, Inc., 111 East Wacker Drive, Suite 3200, Chicago, IL 60601-4298.

COPY: Manuscripts should be typed *double-spaced* on 8.5 x 11" paper with adequate margins for editorial notations. Tables and figures should be prepared on separate sheets with appropriate headings; see *CBE Style Manual* for examples of appropriate form for tables. Photographs intended for reproduction should be sharp with good contrast on glossy white paper; black-and-white photographs will usually reproduce better than color photographs. Weights, measurements, and distances should be in metric units. Dates should be in "continental" form (e.g., 16 March 1997). Use the 24-hour clock (e.g., 0500 or 1900).

NOMENCLATURE: The scientific name of a species should be given after the first use of the full common name in the text. The scientific name should be underlined and in parentheses. Names should follow the *A. O. U. Check-list of North American Birds* (seventh edition, 1998, or supplements).

TITLE: The title should be concise, specific, and descriptive.

ABSTRACT: Manuscripts of five or more typed pages should include an abstract. The abstract should be less then 5% of the length of the manuscript. It should include a brief explanation of why the research was done, the major results, and why the results are important.

LITERATURE CITED: List all literature citations in a "Literature Cited" section at the end of the text. Text citations should include the author and year.

IDENTIFICATION: Manuscripts including reports of rare or unusual species or of species at atypical times should include: date and time, light and weather conditions, exact location, habitat, optical equipment, distance, behavior of bird, comparison with other similar species, characteristic markings, experience of observer, other observers verifying the identification, and reference works consulted.

REPRINTS: Reprints are available to authors on request. Billing to authors will be through the TOS Treasurer. Request for reprints must be made well in advance of printing.

SEASON REPORTS: Observations that are to be considered for publication in "The Season" section should be mailed to the appropriate Regional Compiler. Consult a recent issue of *The Migrant* for the name and address of the compiler.

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
