202701 and 202702. I also took a picture of them on a stick held by the boy. A week later, June 19th, I returned and took a close-up of them. This is a late date to find such young Barred Owls, but the pictures make it a positive record.—A. W. Higgins, Rock, Massachusetts.

A Common Tern Recovery.—Mr. John A. Gillespie, of Glencl len, Pennsylvania, writes that one of his nesting Common Terns (Sterna hirundo) banded August 23, 1925, at Anglesen, New Jersey, was shot on May 16, 1926, on the island of Trinidad, near Caribe, Venezuela.—The capture was reported by the American Consul on this island through the United States Department of State.
