OBSERVATIONS ON THE BARN OWL IN WEST TENNESSEE, 1985-2013

The Barn Owl (*Tyto alba*) is considered rare in Tennessee. It was first designated a species "In Need of Management" in 1976 (Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency 1976), and has since continued to be designated a species of Greatest Conservation Need (Tennessee Heritage Program 2009, Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency 2005). Barn Owls inhabit open or partly open country throughout their range and often occur in close proximity to humans and human structures, such as barns and silos (American Ornithologists' Union 1983).

Despite being a bird of open country and often near human habitation, the population status of Barn Owls is difficult to assess. Barn Owls are elusive and nocturnal birds of prey. To better understand the population status, the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency distributed fliers around the state requesting information on sightings the 1980's. The scarcity of reports submitted to the agency confirmed the rare status given this species. In 1986, 13 Barn Owls were seen at the Mid-South Raptor Center (formerly at the Memphis Zoo), a facility devoted to the rehabilitation and release of birds of prey. Since that time Barn Owl numbers have fluctuated. I provide here a few anecdotal comments on the status of Barn Owls in west Tennessee and parts of north Mississippi, based on 28 years of working with these and other raptor species between 1985 and 2013.

Barn Owls differ from other owl species in that they will often nest year-round if weather conditions are favorable. The life span of the Barn Owl is relatively short, usually 3 years or less, but birds are sexually active at one year of age, and their clutch sizes can be impressive. While most owls have a clutch size of 2 to 4 and generally have a single or perhaps two clutches per breeding season, Barn Owls can have clutches of up to 10 chicks and can have three clutches per year (Marti et al. 2005). By comparison, Great Horned Owls (*Bubo virginianus*) may live for 20 years and have a single clutch of two young per year.

Since record keeping began in 1985, Barn Owl chicks have been documented in every month of the year. For example, one clutch of 7 young was rescued on Christmas Eve.

Several different clutches or individual "branchlings" (a juvenile bird that has left the nest but is still not completely independent or able to fly) were brought to the Center in early to mid-January over the years. A possible explanation for these early clutches may be due to the reasonably mild winters west Tennessee has experienced in recent years. Harsh winter weather over consecutive days can cause notable Barn Owl mortality (Marti et al 2005), therefore it still seems likely that many of these winter clutches did not survive.

Nesting locations vary considerably. The Barn Owl nests in tree cavities in natural settings, but the vast majority of active nests I've observed over the past 28 years have been in some type of human structure. The most unusual nest location was in the rear of an inactive helicopter on a two-story platform used by the Memphis Police Department Swat Team to practice repelling. This clutch had 5 chicks. Another unusual nest was a clutch of 4 chicks discovered in the barrel of an abandoned cement mixer in the middle of a junk yard. The yard was full of junk cars and trucks, old school buses, and assorted larger vehicles, so there was probably an abundance of rodents to feed the nestlings. Another active nest was in a busy airplane hanger at the Memphis International Airport.

Repeated use of nesting locations has been notable as well as has the ready use of wooden nesting boxes. There have been active nests on the grounds of Agricenter International in east Memphis for at least 15 years. One nest site at the Wolf River Wildlife Management Area, Fayette County, Tennessee, has been active for at least 20 years, and in a nest box since 2001. One nest has been used in an abandoned cotton gin near Wapanocca NWR, Crittenden County, Arkansas, for a number of years, and another was found in an abandoned steel mill near President's Island in south Memphis, Shelby County, Tennessee. Many nests are in residential areas including one in a clock tower and another in the steeple of an active church in midtown Memphis.

Barn Owls were thought to be highly dependent on pasture lands to be able to survive, but it would seem that the owl is much better able to adapt to changing conditions than was first thought. Even those nests found in highly industrialized areas of Memphis (Figure 1) had signs of many different mammal and bird species used to feed the young. A majority of active nests observed in recent years have been found in urban settings, and while there are certainly many rural nests in west Tennessee, it is obvious that the bird can adapt when necessary.

While it is thought that the Barn Owl is relatively rare in the west Tennessee area, my observations since 1985 seem to question this designation. From 1985 through 2013, a total of 297 individual birds have come through the Center. The highest numbers were in 1995 and again in 1998 when 29 individual birds were treated for each of those years. Since 2000 the number of birds seen has been in the single digits up to 2013 when 13 birds were seen (Martin 2012). The average number of birds coming through the Center is 10 per year. Many years the Barn Owl was the most common raptor seen at the center. Almost all of these birds came from locations in west Tennessee although a few have come from areas in north Mississippi. Many large clutches accounted for elevated numbers in some years, but individual birds also made up a large percentage of birds seen each year.

Some studies of the owl indicate the population is limited by the weather and more specifically the amount of snowfall seen in any given year (Marti et al. 2005). A possible

explanation of the high number of Barn Owls seen in west Tennessee may result from climate of the area. One raptor rehabilitation center near St. Louis carried out a Barn Owl reintroduction program for a number of years, and over 150 birds were released in areas in and around St. Louis. Over the years the number of sightings increased and several birds utilized nest boxes put up by the center. While some winters had extreme cold they were generally dry with little or no snow. The birds seemed to tolerate cold temperature. However, extremely heavy snowfall occurred one year with accumulation of 30 centimeters and covered the ground for several weeks. In the spring, no owls were brought to the center. It seems that while they can tolerate cold temperature, they will starve if the snow cover lasts more than a few days. In west Tennessee the past several years were largely snow free, and the owls overwintered well, even hatching young in the winter months.

My observations at the Center indicate that for the past 28 years the status of the Barn Owl in west Tennessee has been stable, and in some instances increased. While this is not a scientific study, the number of birds seen during that time may be a reflection of the overall population health. At the Center the number of Barn Owls treated over the years has remained strong relative to other species. I am hopeful Barn Owls will continue to thrive in the west Tennessee area.

FIRST RECORD OF LONG-BILLED MURRELET IN TENNESSEE

Jeff Wilson, Bob Foehring and I observed a Long-billed Murrelet (*Brachyramphus perdix*) during the Reelfoot Christmas Bird Count on 14 December 2002. The bird was located about 200 meters out from White's Landing on Reelfoot Lake, Lake County, Tennessee. Jeff was the first to sight the bird; Bob and I observed it soon afterwards. None of us spoke about field marks or identification of the species until all of us could view the bird.

My first impression was a small black and white bird diving repeatedly in the open water of the lake that was noticeably smaller than the Ruddy Ducks (*Oxyura jamaicensis*), Piedbilled Grebes (*Podilymbus podiceps*), and Horned Grebes (*Podiceps auritus*) seen nearby. This small bird was dark on the back and nape, with white from the throat down the chest. At about 200 meters through the scope, the straight border between the dark and light areas on the sides of the neck gave the bird a look not unlike that of a Pacific Loon (*Gavia pacifica*) in winter plumage. The size of the bird, however, was much smaller than any loon species and the head was more wedge-shaped, also unlike a loon. The silvery water reflection and distance did not permit me to see the exact location of the white at the water line, but the bird appeared to me to be sitting fairly low in the water.

Bob's first impression was that the bird was an Alcid, and was possibly a Marbled Murrelet (*Brachyramphus marmoratus*), a species that he has observed often in the Pacific Northwest. Long-billed Murrelet was split from Marbled Murrelet in 1997 based on evidence based on allozyme data (Friesen et al 1996). Field identification is possible based on plumage characteristics (Mlodinow 1997). We discussed the field marks that we had seen and agreed that these were consistent with Long-billed Murrelet.

Access from the southeast shoreline provided a closer view, so we set up our scopes on the boardwalk at the Reelfoot Lake State Park Ellington Visitor Center. Jeff re-located the bird looking to the north, this time at approximately 100 meters. I noted a small black and white bird steadily swimming to the right. At this closer distance I saw a faint hint of the white arcs around the eye. The size, shape, and markings were all consistent with those of a Long-billed Murrelet. I had the bird in view this time for about 30 seconds but the view was perfect. Once again, my first impression was a small alcid, dark above, and light below. The bill was relatively large for such a small bird - stout, dark and pointed. The nape was dark and the dark made a conspicuous line from the bill, under the eye, and down the side of the neck.

There was no white on the back of the neck of this bird, as is characteristic of Marbled Murrelet which gives it a "white collared" look. It dove once for a couple of seconds while I had it in view. As it dove it gave a little wing flick. Once it came back to the surface the neck looked short, giving a different appearance to the bird. It then quickly raised its head again, stretched its neck and swam out of sight. I detected lighter markings on the sides above the

wings and on the hind part of the back, but I could not detect the exact pattern of the white. The bird sat relatively low in the water when swimming. When it dove, it dove forward with the head, like a diving duck. As it dove forward, I could also see white under tail coverts. Jeff immediately pulled out an index card and made a sketch, and Bob and I agreed on what each of us had seen (Figure 1).

The size, shape, general impression and plumage details that I noted in all views of this bird were those of a Long-billed Murrelet. At no time did any of us ever see anything to indicate that the bird was anything other than a Long-billed Murrelet.

On 15 December, several people gathered to look for the bird, but the weather conditions had worsened considerably. Jeff observed a distant bird moving to the east that was small, short necked, and dark and light patterned, but the choppy waters and distance prevented positive identification. Others had similar observations by boat, but no positive identification was possible. None of these sightings were definitive, but indicate that the bird was likely still in the area.

Long-billed Murrelets breed in Japan through the Sea of Okhotsk to the Kamchatka peninsula, Russia; as of January 1997, there were 36 records of Long-billed Murrelets in North America and five from the southeastern United States. This is the first recorded occurrence of a Long-billed Murrelet in Tennessee. The Tennessee Bird Records Committee accepted this record in December 2014. A Long-billed Murrelet was also observed on 15 December 2002, swimming off the beach at Fort Macon State Park in North Carolina during the Morehead City Christmas Bird Count (Davis 2003).

Editor's note: Please note the publication of this issue was after the Tennessee Bird Records Committee decision to accept and thus is included here.



ROUND TABLE NOTE

WINTER RECORD OF PAINTED BUNTING IN KNOXVILLE, TENNESSEE - A male Painted Bunting (*Passerina ciris*) was present at our backyard millet feeder from 27 January thru 14 February 2014. The bird was a frequent visitor to our feeder, often several times a day. He was very wary when he first came to the feeders, only coming when other similar sized birds were feeding. He flew off quickly when a larger bird came to the feeder or if a human came near. Over a few weeks, he became more confident and would come to the feeder when other birds were not present. We never witnessed the bunting feeding on the ground, only at the tube feeder.

The Painted Bunting is a rare bird any time of the year in east Tennessee, but even more so in the winter months. One other winter record exists for Knox County in 2007, also a single adult male at a feeder (The Migrant 78(2):83. These two Knox County records are the only winter records for the state. Several members of Knoxville TOS also were able to view the Painted Bunting.

THE 2013 TENNESSEE CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

The 2013 Tennessee Christmas Bird Count (CBC) season is the 83rd compilation in Tennessee, with 30 counts reporting data. Nearly 500 participants found 153 species this year. The weather across the state was mixed as usual, with about half the counts experiencing rain and most dealing with windy conditions. Temperatures ranged from a bracing 18° F at Jackson and Reelfoot to a balmy 75° F on the Columbia count.

The very cold winter temperatures further north likely were responsible for many record numbers for species such as waterfowl, Northern Harrier and Short-eared Owl, but this was not an irruption year for winter passerines. Only 17 Red-breasted Nuthatches and one Pine Siskin were reported for the state. Say's Phoebe and Yellow Warbler were both new species for the Tennessee CBC compilation. This brought the all-time total of species found on Tennessee CBC's to 264 (plus 6 more count week only species). Seen for only the second time in count history are Pacific Loon, Prairie Falcon and Northern Rough-winged Swallow (both records in the last three years).



THE WINTER SEASON

1 December 2013 - 28 February 2014

Although the winter season began with moderate temperatures in December, the scene changed abruptly in the new year. A series of arctic blasts in January brought the coldest temperatures to the state in nearly 25 years. Conditions weren't as severe in February, but still cold. Although precipitation totals in January and February were at or below normal, many areas saw more than the usual amount of snow or ice.

The severe cold caused ice cover on the Great Lakes to reach historic proportions, forcing an exodus of diving ducks that normally winter there. Some of these reached Tennessee. While birders seemed to focus most on the unusually high numbers of White-winged Scoters and Long-tailed Ducks (see Table 1), the numbers of Canvasbacks, Greater Scaup, Common Goldeneyes, and Common and Red-breasted Mergansers were also much greater than normal. White-winged Scoters were not only more widely distributed than normal, they occurred in unprecedented numbers. Simply adding the high count for each site provides a total exceeding 300 individuals. The high count for a single site was of 100 at Chickamauga Lake near the dam, and the actual number over the entire lake was probably higher. This greatly surpassed the previous high count in the state of 28 at the same site on 30 December 1981 (Migrant 53:47). Numbers of the other two scoters seemed to be near normal, probably because they do not winter on the Great Lakes in numbers comparable to White-winged. Typically most scoters seen in the state are females or immatures, but numerous adult male scoters were reported in this flight. In addition to diving ducks, there were nine reports of Tundra Swans scattered across all four regions. The four species of arctic nesting geese that winter in Tennessee were also in good numbers. Other notable waterfowl included a Trumpeter Swan and Eurasian Wigeon in the western region. Possibly associated with the Great Lakes freeze-up, Red-throated Loons were reported from eight sites scattered around all four regions.

While waterfowl garnered much of the attention this season, alert birders detected much more. Rare raptors included Northern Goshawk and Ferruginous Hawk in the western region, with individual Prairie Falcons in two regions. Research into Golden Eagle distribution continued, and sightings came from all regions. Gull watchers picked out several rarities. Although not quite the rare attraction it once was, Lesser Black-backed Gull was found in all four regions. Short-eared Owls also appeared in all four regions. Notable were first state winter records of Black-necked Stilt and Northern Parula. Passerine highlights included Say's Phoebe, Chestnut-collared Longspur and Spotted Towhee in the western region, Smith's Longspurs in middle Tennessee, and "Oregon" Junco and Painted Bunting in the east. Boreal irruptives were virtually absent this winter, evidence again that food governs their movements rather than weather conditions.

WESTERN COASTAL PLAIN REGION - - The winter of 2013 - 2014 will be remembered as one of the coldest in recent memory. Temperatures and precipitation in December were within historical norms, but, January and February brought a series of arctic blasts and much snow and ice. January produced temperatures which averaged 5 degrees below normal. Three ice storms and a snowstorm between 19 January and 11 February were responsible for the loss of many trees while many others had significant loss of limbs.

Irruptive species were virtually absent from the region, with only a few reports of Red-breasted Nuthatch and Purple Finch. Regional highlights included Eurasian Wigeon, Golden Eagle, Northern Goshawk, Prairie Falcon, Spotted Towhee and Harris's Sparrow.

HIGHLAND RIM AND BASIN REGION - - Middle Tennessee had a moderate December, but January and February were unusually cold. Several extreme cold fronts passed through bringing sub-zero temperatures. An epic freeze of the Great Lakes also resulted in a major invasion of White-winged Scoters and Long-tailed Ducks, with a few reports of

the other two scoters. Red-throated and Pacific loons were reported more frequently this winter, which may be a result of greater observer awareness. The extreme cold in January killed or forced the departure of most, if not all, wintering hummingbirds. One 5+ year old female Rufous Hummingbird was found dead at her winter residence in Brentwood. Numerous Golden Eagles were observed on TWRA baits sites in Franklin County; at least ten different individuals were documented via trail cameras or were tracked in the area. Smith's Longspurs were reported again at Fort Campbell. A second winter record Yellow Warbler was seen and heard in Nashville.

CUMBERLAND PLATEAU / RIDGE and VALLEY REGION - - This winter opened with wet and relatively mild conditions in December. Precipitation was 5 centimeters above normal for the month, continuing the trend for the year. Indeed, 2013 was the second wettest year on record in northeast Tennessee. The following month was quite cold with a series of arctic blasts. The Tri-cities area experienced three nights of sub-zero temperatures and several more nights with single digit lows. Some daytime highs remained below freezing. As such, January was the coldest month since December 1989. Precipitation was below average in January. February was cold, but not so brutal, with near normal precipitation. The season's heaviest snowfall was 17 – 25 centimeters in mid-February.

Waterfowl numbers and diversity were a highlight of the season, including an unprecedented influx of White-winged Scoters. Although this species occurs in small numbers nearly annually in the region, it was found at 14 sites this winter, mostly after mid-January, and peaked with a staggering count of 100 at Chickamauga Lake. Long-tailed Ducks also are nearly annual visitors to the region, but reports from seven sites was likely unprecedented for a single season as well. While these two species received the most attention, numbers of other diving ducks also were much higher than normal, including Canvasback, Greater Scaup, Common Goldeneye, and Common and Red-breasted Merganser. These species made a facultative migration away from their Great Lakes wintering sites due to historic ice cover amounts, which exceeded 90%. This was the most ice cover on the Great Lakes in 25-30 years. Significant ice cover was noted on some regional lakes, too, particularly on Boone Lake.

A Prairie Falcon observed on the Hiwassee CBC was the first for East Tennessee. Other regional rarities included Pacific Loon, Little and Lesser Black-backed Gulls, "Oregon" Junco and Painted Bunting. Lingering half-hardy birds included Northern Rough-winged Swallow, White-eyed and Blue-headed Vireo, Gray Catbird and Summer Tanager. Boreal irruptives were scarce. Despite the cold, a few regular early migrants appeared in February (e.g., Osprey, Greater Yellowlegs, Tree Swallow).

EASTERN MOUNTAIN REGION - - December was wet and rather mild. Precipitation was 7.6 centimeters above normal while temperatures were 3 degrees above normal. January was dry and cold. Precipitation was 3.8 centimeters below normal and temperatures averaged 6.7 degrees below normal. There were three days in January that had low temperatures below zero in the lowland areas and several more days with similar lows in the higher mountains. The coldest was 17 degrees below zero at Mt. Le Conte in Great Smokey Mountains National Park on 7 January. Temperature and precipitation were nearer to normal in February.

In general, it was a good season for waterfowl. Although arriving late and in low numbers, Eared Grebes were present at South Holston Lake for the twentieth consecutive year. Four Short-eared Owls that over-wintered in Cades Cove attracted many birders. Other

highlights included Golden Eagles, a Lesser Black-backed Gull, and an unexpectedly late Northern Parula. Winter irruptive finches were in very low numbers.

INSTRUCTIONS TO AUTHORS

The Migrant records observations and studies of birds in Tennessee and adjacent areas. SUBMISSIONS: The original and two copies of the manuscript should be sent to the Editor: Bob Ford, 808 Hatchie, Brownsville, TN 38012 editorthemigrant@gmail.com. Manuscripts that have been published in other journals should not be submitted.

MATERIAL: The subject matter should relate to some phase of Tennessee ornithology. It should be original, factual, concise and scientifically accurate.

STYLE: Both articles and short notes are solicited; recent issues of *The Migrant* should be used as a guide in the preparation of manuscripts. Where more detail is needed, reference should be made to *Scientific Style and Format*, eighth edition, by the Council of Science Editors, councilscienceeditors.org.

COPY: Manuscripts should be double-spaced with adequate margins for editorial notations and emailed in Word.docx. Tables and figures should be prepared in a separate file with appropriate headings; see *Scientific Style and Format* for examples of appropriate form for tables. Photographs intended for reproduction should be at least 300 dpi or sharp with good contrast on glossy white paper. Weights, measurements, and distances should be in metric units. Dates should be in "continental" form (e.g., 16 March 1997). Use the 24-hour clock (e.g., 0500 or 1900).

NOMENCLATURE: The scientific name of a species should be given after the first use of the full common name in the text. The scientific name should be italicized and in parentheses. Names should follow the *A. O. U. Check-list of North American Birds* (seventh edition, 1998, or supplements).

TITLE: The title should be concise, specific and descriptive.

ABSTRACT: Manuscripts of five or more pages should include an abstract. The abstract should be less then 5% of the length of the manuscript. It should include a brief explanation of why the research was done, the major results, and why the results are important.

LITERATURE CITED: List all literature citations in a "Literature Cited" section at the end of the text. Text citations should include the author and year.

IDENTIFICATION: Manuscripts including reports of rare or unusual species or of species at atypical times should include: date and time, light and weather conditions, exact location, habitat, optical equipment, distance, behavior of bird, comparison with other similar species, characteristic markings, experience of observer, other observers verifying the identification and reference works consulted.

REPRINTS: Reprints are available to authors on request. Billing to authors will be through the TOS treasurer. Request for reprints must be made well in advance of printing.
