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## BREEDING SEASON RECORDS OF VEERY IN CUMBERLAND COUNTY

The Veery (*Catharus fuscescens*), a "common summer resident at the high elevations of ... East Tennessee" (Nicholson 1997: 244), is a decidedly less common breeder elsewhere in the state. Breeding season records of Veery have been made at only five sites in the Cumberland Mountains: above 854 m on Cross Mountain, Campbell Co. (Nicholson 1997); Redoak Mountain, Campbell Co., TN (Knight 2001; Bulluck and Timpf 2005); above 854 m on Frozen Head Mountain, Morgan Co. (Nicholson 1997); Fork Mountain, Scott / Anderson counties (Bulluck and Timpf 2005); and Patterson Mountain, Anderson Co., TN (Knight 2001). Prior to 2005 there was just one breeding season Veery record from the Cumberland Plateau: two territorial birds were noted during June 1977 at an elevation of 470 m in the Savage Gulf, Grundy County (Robertson 1979). Consequently, the discovery of Veeries during the breeding seasons of 2005 and 2006 on Dorton Knob at the southern end of Brady Mountain in Cumberland Co., TN, is worthy of brief description.

Dorton Knob rises to an elevation of 908 m at its highest point. Timber harvesting occurred on the northeast slope of the knob near its higher elevations during 2005, but this event did not change the habitat sufficiently to exclude Veeries, and other high elevation forest breeders, from the site.

Joseph E. Mast made a visit to Dorton Knob 4 June 2005, following directions provided by Anthony Tate, who had heard an "unusual" song at that site in the

past. Although he found no evidence of Veeries on his first visit to Dorton Knob, Mast returned to the site 11 June 2005. On that date he heard four singing Veeries at a site on the northeast slope of the knob at an elevation of approximately 823 m. J. E. Mast and Anita F. Mast revisited the site 28 May 2006 and heard one singing Veery. On 6 June 2006, four singing Veeries were found at elevations of 823-884 m on the knob by J. E. Mast and Stephen J. Stedman during a 1-hour visit to the site near dusk. Two additional visits to the site were made during the 2006 breeding season; six Veeries (three singing and three calling) were noted 24 June 2006 by J. E. Mast and A. F. Mast, and five (one singing and four calling) were noted 1 July 2006 by J. E. Mast and S. J. Stedman during a 2-hour, mid-morning visit to the site, indicating prolonged presence and high probability of breeding at the site during 2006. However, no direct evidence of breeding was discovered during either year that visits were made to the site.

We are grateful to Anthony Tate for providing the initial information that led to the discovery of this small breeding population of Veeries in Cumberland County. We additionally note that Tate has heard vocalizations in a remote area of the Savage Gulf, Grundy County, that were identical to the vocalizations he heard on Dorton Knob. It would appear that there may well be a small but regular breeding population of Veeries at that site, as well as on Dorton Knob, based on Tate's and Robertson's (1979) observations. Therefore, continued monitoring of these sites during the breeding season remains important.

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## THE 2005 TENNESSEE CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT SUMMARY

The 2005 Tennessee Christmas Bird Count season produced 149 species (Table 1) plus two more found during count week (three days before and three days after the actual count date, but not on count day). This season 440 observers logged 1,490 party hours and found 866,031 individuals. This produces a ratio of 581 birds/party hour. A total of 7 species were represented by a lone individual. The weather throughout the state was about average, with most counts starting out near or a bit below freezing and warming up to the 40-50 degree range. The Cross Creeks CBC was the coldest at 13-30 degrees and Savannah was again the warmest at 71. The Savannah and Cade's Cove counts both experienced high winds, and a few counts had some light rain. There were 30 counts this year. Four Long-billed Dowitchers, found on the Reelfoot CBC, represented a new species for the Tennessee CBC. This brings the all-time species total for the Tennessee CBC to 258 (plus 6 count week species). A few notable species for this count season included White-winged Scoter, American Bittern, Dunlin, Short-eared Owl, Tree Swallow (first record in 14 years), Blue-gray Gnatcatcher (first record in 11 years), and Baltimore Oriole.

The following species were recorded in unusually high numbers for the Tennessee CBC: Greater White-fronted Goose (3<sup>rd</sup> highest), Snow Goose (2<sup>nd</sup> highest), Cackling Goose (record, but only second year recorded as a full species), Mute Swan (2<sup>nd</sup> highest and 10<sup>th</sup> year in row recorded on count), Bufflehead (3<sup>rd</sup> highest), Hooded Merganser (highest since 1955), Ruffed Grouse (highest since 1973), Common Loon (2<sup>nd</sup> highest), Horned Grebe (record), Eared Grebe (record), American White Pelican (record), Great Blue Heron (2<sup>nd</sup> highest), Black Vulture (2<sup>nd</sup> highest), Merlin (ties record), Peregrine Falcon (ties record of 1954), Virginia Rail (record), Sandhill Crane (2<sup>nd</sup> highest), Bonaparte's Gull (2<sup>nd</sup> highest), Ring-billed Gull (record; 20,000 more than previous high), Eurasian Collared-Dove (highest since it was first found on a Tennessee CBC in 1994, continuing its expansion into Tennessee), Great Horned Owl (3<sup>rd</sup> highest), Barred Owl (record), Red-bellied Woodpecker (record), Yellow-bellied Sapsucker (3<sup>rd</sup> highest), Hairy Woodpecker (2<sup>nd</sup> highest), Pileated Woodpecker (record), Eastern Phoebe (record), Carolina Chickadee (record), White-breasted Nuthatch (2<sup>nd</sup> highest), Brown-headed Nuthatch (3<sup>rd</sup> highest), Carolina Wren (2<sup>nd</sup> highest), House Wren (record), Winter Wren (record), Marsh Wren (3<sup>rd</sup> highest), Hermit Thrush (record), Gray Catbird (ties record), Brown Thrasher (record), Cedar Waxwing (2<sup>nd</sup> highest), Yellow-rumped Warbler (record), Eastern Towhee (record), Chipping Sparrow (record), Field Sparrow (2<sup>nd</sup> highest), Savannah Sparrow (3<sup>rd</sup> highest), LeConte's Sparrow (3<sup>rd</sup> highest), and Song Sparrow (3<sup>rd</sup> highest).

The following species were recorded in very low numbers for the Tennessee CBC: Northern Bobwhite (lowest since 1951 and second lowest ever; further evidence of this species' decline mostly due to habitat loss), Herring Gull, Loggerhead Shrike (lowest since 1944 and 3<sup>rd</sup> lowest ever, continuing a worrisome trend for this species in the eastern U.S.), and House Sparrow (lowest since 1958).

House Wren and Common Grackle were new species for this count, bringing the all-time species total for this CBC to 90. The compiler stated that these record numbers could be attributed to the excellent wild food crop this year. The record numbers for three owl species were attributed to calm conditions, clear skies with a nearly full moon and moderate temperatures on count day. Eurasian Collared-Dove was a new species for

this CBC, bringing the all-time species total to 130. 

## THE WINTER SEASON

1 DECEMBER 2005 - 28 FEBRUARY 2006

For the seventh time in the last ten years the state experienced a rather mild winter, at least for the most part. January was especially warm throughout Tennessee. Precipitation was near normal in most areas, but with very little snow away from the higher mountains. Presumably the mild conditions contributed to the presence of a lengthy list of lingering species. Among these, Lesser Yellowlegs were reported from three regions. A Caspian Tern in West Tennessee was the first mid-winter report in the state. An impressive number of Gray Catbirds was found, with nine of ten reports emanating from the two eastern regions; this total is well above the average of 1.7 catbird reports per winter statewide for the last decade.

Waterfowl numbers were generally unremarkable. However, a nice fallout of ducks, loons, and grebes occurred in early December in northeast Tennessee. Arctic-nesting geese continue to do well. Boreal irruptive passerines were scarce overall, although a few areas hosted modest numbers of Purple Finches.

A Golden-crowned Sparrow in Tipton County provided the first record for the state. Other rarities in the western region included Black-bellied Whistling-Duck, Yellow-billed Loon, Western Grebe, Little and Glaucous gulls, and Inca Dove. Elsewhere, a Common Ground-Dove and the lingering Black-throated Sparrow were notable in Middle Tennessee, while a Pacific Loon became the first for East Tennessee.

**WESTERN COASTAL PLAIN REGION** — This winter was relatively dry and mild in the region. There were a number of notable sightings. Two lingering Little Gulls and a Black-bellied Whistling-Duck were found at Reelfoot Lake, while four loon species as well as Red-necked and Western Grebes were observed on Kentucky Lake in Henry County. Two exceptional rarities were discovered at feeders: an Inca Dove in Fayette County (first seen in November) and a Golden-crowned Sparrow in Tipton County.

**HIGHLAND RIM AND BASIN REGION** — The three month winter period provided wild weather swings in the Nashville area. December was three degrees cooler and two inches drier than normal. However, January felt more like March than mid-winter, as the first month of 2006 averaged a whopping nine degrees above normal. It was also a rather wet month, with over six inches of precipitation, almost half of which came in a single 24 hour period. In contrast, both the temperature and precipitation in February were near normal. Although nearly eight inches of snow are expected during the winter, Nashville received just over 20 percent of that total.

CUMBERLAND PLATEAU / RIDGE & VALLEY REGION — While December and February had near normal temperatures, January was very mild. In the Tri-cities area the average daytime high for the month was 54 °F, which is ten degrees above normal. Precipitation for the period was near normal, although February was a bit dry in the Chattanooga area. Three light snowfalls (<2 inches) during February in the northeastern part of the region were the only measurable amounts there for the whole season, which is well below average.

After a lackluster fall for waterfowl, a cold front grounded record numbers of Red-breasted Mergansers and Horned Grebes at Boone Lake on 5 December. The highlight of the season was the variety and numbers of lingering "half-hardy" birds: American Bittern, Great Egret, Osprey, Lesser Yellowlegs, Spotted Sandpiper, Blue-headed Vireo, Gray Catbird (4 reports), Orange-crowned Warbler (6 reports), Vesper Sparrow, and Baltimore Oriole. The recent trend of increasing numbers of wintering House Wrens, Palm Warblers, and Chipping Sparrows continued, as well. Another recent trend which continued has been the arrival of Tree Swallows in mid to late February, primarily from the Knoxville area up to the Tri-cities area. Are these swallows coming through the mountains by way of the French Broad River valley? Other notable sightings this winter included Ross's Goose, Short-eared Owl, Fish Crow, and American Tree Sparrow.
