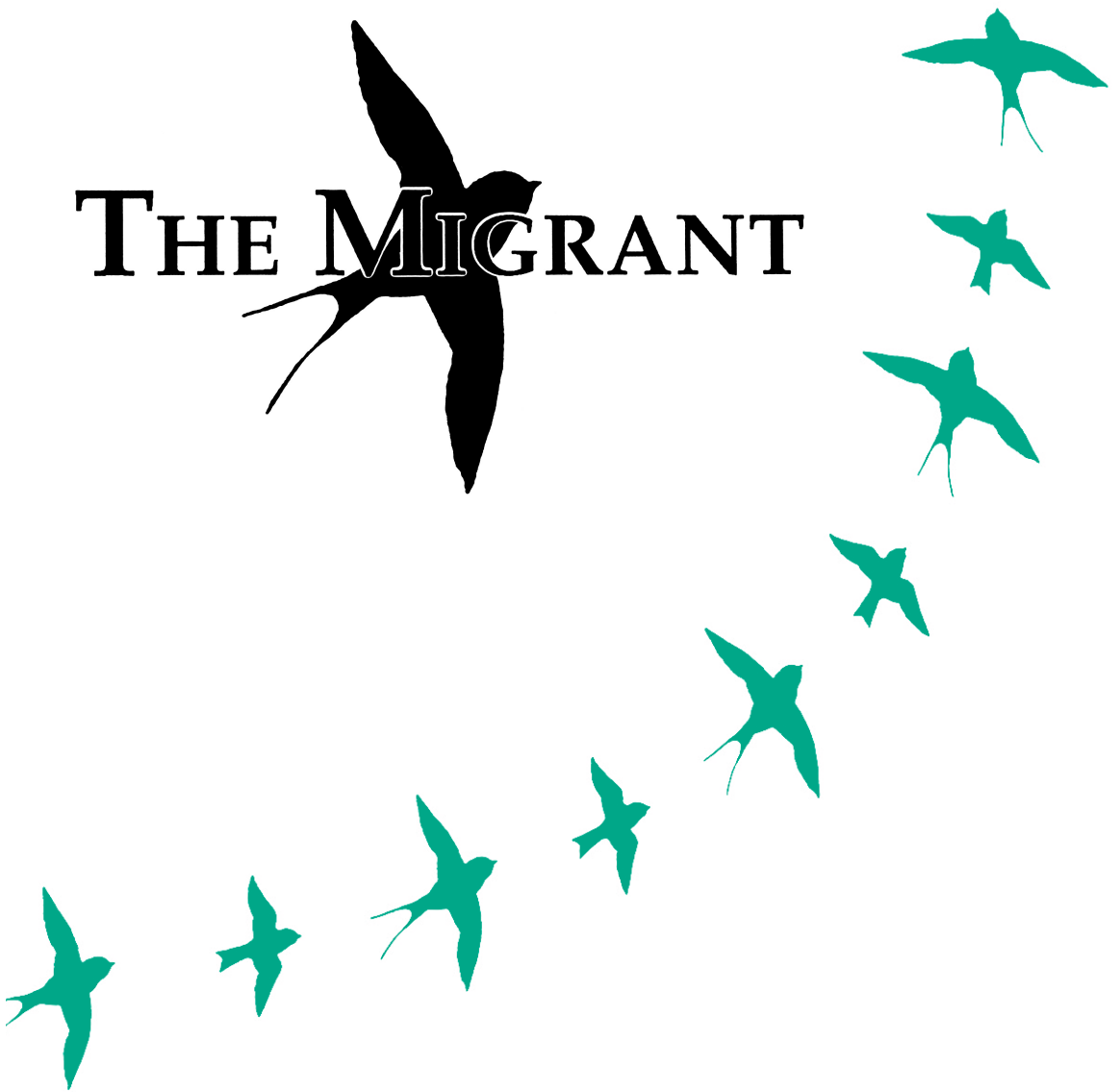

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FIRST RECORDS OF BLACK-CAPPED PETREL AND BROWN NODDY IN TENNESSEE

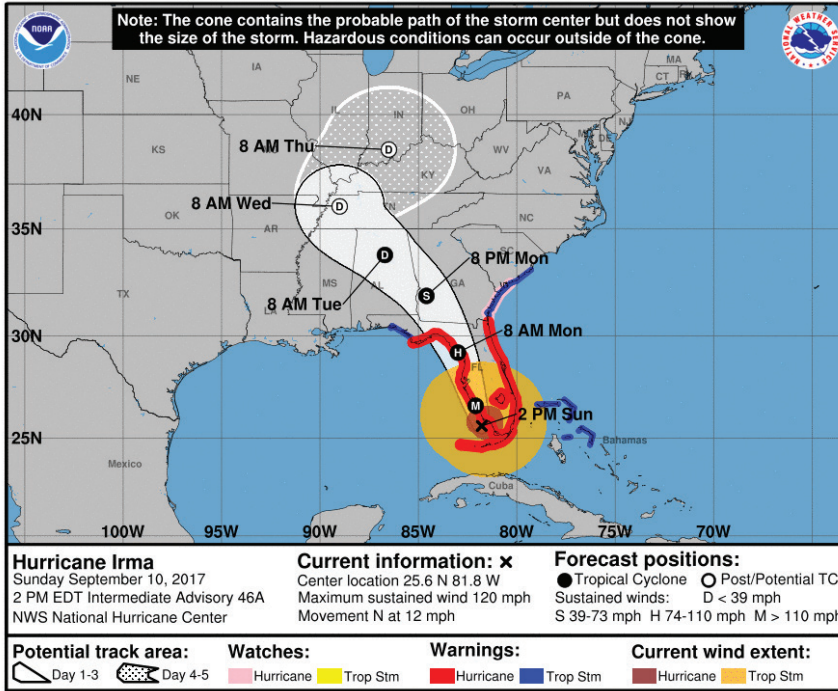


Figure 1. The predicted track of Hurricane Irma in 2017, issued for the public by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and the National Weather Service.

On the afternoon of 13 September 2017 I observed a Black-capped Petrel (*Pterodroma hasitata*) and Brown Booby (*Anous stolidus*) on Pickwick Lake in Hardin County. They were observed out from Bruton Branch Recreational Area a few kilometers above Pickwick Dam. Their presence was a direct result of the remnants of Hurricane Irma which tracked directly over the Pickwick area earlier in the day. Irma was a massive Category 5 hurricane that had wreaked havoc in the Caribbean. It had dropped to a Category 4 when it made landfall in south Florida. It then tracked over the Peninsula, through Georgia, Alabama, northern Mississippi, and into Tennessee (Figure 1).

With the advance of Hurricane Irma into Tennessee, several Tennessee birders discussed the possibility and likelihood of Pickwick Lake being productive after this storm. Initially we agreed that since the winds associated with the storm broke down sooner than expected, most of the birds would have already dropped out of the system before it arrived in Tennessee. However, on this same day observers in Kentucky reported Sooty Terns (*Onychoprion fuscatus*) on Kentucky Lake, so this provided the impetus to head to Pickwick Lake.

I arrived in the area at about 1330; much of the lake was covered in fog, wind was 16 – 24 km, there was misting rain, and the temperature was 18 ° C. One of the first birds I observed coming out of the fog over the lake was an adult Sooty Tern (a juvenile was also seen later in the day as well). A couple of Laughing Gulls (*Larus atricilla*) were present also, which are typical post-hurricane birds; it appears Sooty Tern now qualifies as such. Also of interest in the area was at least one, possibly two, Jaegers (*Stercorarius* sp.), though they weren't seen well enough to identify by species.

I observed the Black-capped Petrel on the water only, initially at a great distance, but it floated to within about 230 meters at one point. When I first saw the bird I scanned by it thinking it a probable Laughing Gull, noting the contrast of the dark black back, white underparts and partially dark head. As the bird came closer it became apparent it was a

petrel (*Pterodroma* spp), most likely a Black-capped. I was able to photograph and see it well enough to rule out any of the other less-likely Atlantic *Pterodromas* species (Figure 2). At one point, after getting a few digiscopes, I had to change position due to the birds drifting behind some trees on the shore. I moved briefly to reposition my optics, but was unable to find the bird again. It is possible the bird expired on the water as it was not seen again after repeated scanning of the lake by me and other birders who arrived later that afternoon.

After losing sight of the petrel I continued to search for birds in the area. The fog lifted suddenly, revealing groups of terns on various parts of the lake, mostly *Sterna* spp, but a few Black Terns (*Chilodnius niger*) as well. While scanning one group in the distance that was flying towards me I picked up an all-dark bird coming with them. My first thought was that this was a jaeger (*Stercorarius* spp) but it quickly became evident this bird did not show the structure or plumage of a dark-morph jaeger. I had distant but solid scope views of a Brown Noddy (*Anous stolidus*) flying with the *Sterna* spp terns; most were likely to be Common Terns (*Sterna hirundo*). I had the noddy in view for about two minutes before losing sight of it as the birds headed towards the dam. I immediately traveled to that area but could not locate the group of birds. Mark Greene arrived soon afterwards; we had distant views of the Brown Noddy again late in the day from the Bruton Branch area. It appeared to be a juvenile; I could not discern any white on the forehead area as expected on older birds.

Pending acceptance by the Tennessee Bird Records Committee, this is the first record of *Pterodroma* spp of any type for Tennessee as well as the first record of a Brown Noddy. Ruben Stoll and Victor Stoll documented a second Black-capped Petrel soon after on 9 October 2017 at Woods Reservoir in Franklin County following Hurricane Nate.

FIRST TENNESSEE RECORD OF BROWN BOOBY

I spent the morning of 20 October 2016 birding at the Big Sandy Unit of Tennessee National Wildlife Refuge (TNWR) and was heading home around 1245 when I decided to stop at the Camden Wildlife Management Area. I went to “The Overlook”, a spot that overlooks the largest part of Kentucky Lake between Camden WMA in Benton County on the west, and the Pump Station of the Duck River Unit TNWR in Humphreys County on the east. Most of this vast, relatively shallow area is in Humphreys County.

No sooner had I set up my Kowa Prominar 880 spotting scope when I noticed a large, active feeding frenzy about 250 meters out, consisting of hundreds of diving Double-crested Cormorants (*Phalacrocorax auritus*) and American White Pelicans (*Pelicanus erythrorhynchos*) foraging by plunging their huge bills into the water. All the birds were working together in a group, appearing to be herding a school of unidentified bait fish. While watching this feeding behavior I noticed a strange bird quietly sitting on the water at the edge of the feeding frenzy. I almost immediately recognized it as a Brown Booby (*Sula leucogaster*) based on my previous experience with this species in Belize, Central America, and Hawaii.

I noted the bird was similar in size to a Double-crested Cormorant but had a relatively long neck and a distinctive, deep-based wedge-shaped bill that was pale grayish to ivory in color. The overall plumage color of the bird was a uniform dull brown. It had a noticeably unique angle to the feathered border at the base of the bill.

I spent the next 30 minutes observing the bird as it took wing, arcing high, then plunging into the feeding frenzy in a shallow dive. Later the bird was circling, gliding and even kiting in the wind as it searched the water below.

Additional field marks noted in flight were long, narrow, pointed wings held somewhat bent at the wrist, fully webbed yellowish feet, and a long wedge-shaped pointed tail that periodically fanned out giving a splayed, fingered look. The underside was not a pure white with a clean cut border as in adult Brown Booby, but rather a dirty white color visible in the belly and under-wing coverts that indicated an immature bird.

On 21 October 2016, the bird was seen again from the Pump Station of the Duck River Unit, TNWR at 0700 by Morton Massey, Victor Stoll, Alan Troyer, Jack Zipperer, Steve Zipperer and me. It flew past us towards the north, briefly landed on a floating buoy, then flew back past a second time and disappeared to the south. Subsequent efforts to relocate the bird failed.

The only known photographic evidence available is a series of extremely poor quality digiscopes I took on the morning of 21 October. These photos were later reviewed by David Roemer and other experts, and showed a shape that suggests a bird from the Sulidae family and a brown color that suggests a Brown Booby, but not entirely diagnostic. The Tennessee Bird Records Committee voted 6 to 0 to accept the record as Tennessee’s first Brown Booby based on the photos and the written documentation (*The Migrant* 88:118-119).

BOOK REVIEW – BIRDS OF THE CENTRAL CAROLINAS

Birds of the Central Carolinas. Donald W. Seriff. Illustrations by Leigh Anne Carter. Published by the Mecklenburg Audubon Society, Charlotte, North Carolina, 2018. 591 pages. www.meckbirds.org

The Carolinas have a rich tradition of ornithology and documented bird study dating from at least the 1800s. In his book, *Birds of the Central Carolinas*, Donald Seriff has continued this tradition. The primary scope of work is the Piedmont region of the Central Carolinas, an 11 county area of both North and South Carolina, which covers a geography of rolling hills, isolated mountain outcrops and three major rivers as well as the rapidly expanding urban area of Charlotte, North Carolina. The book provides an impressive collection of historical and new information for over 300 species known to this region and includes detailed information from the recently completed Mecklenburg County Breeding Bird Atlas. Original artwork of birds by Leigh Anne Carter greatly enhances the book. Numerous people contributed their time, data, unpublished notes, and photographs for publication in this book. In fact, the book is funded and supported in full by the Mecklenburg Audubon Society, a dedicated effort that speaks to the importance of citizen science today as well as providing a strong link to the great tradition of bird study in the Carolinas.

The bulk of the book is the Species Accounts for all of the species known to occur in the Central Carolinas. Each species account includes a wealth of biological background and documentation of occurrence in the region, including the method of verification (such as whether by written report, picture or otherwise). The account often includes information about distribution across the Carolinas, but provides more specifics on the habitat, occurrences, ecology and distribution of the species in the Piedmont region. Breeding Bird Atlas results are summarized for Mecklenburg County and follow the general guidelines of most Breeding Bird Atlas documentation, including observed breeding status and distribution maps. All species accounts include artwork by Carter and pictures of the species. Supplemental lists for hypothetical and exotic species are included, as well as a select bibliography and quick index guide.

While an up-to-date geographic resource for anyone interested in birds in the southeast United States and beyond, *Birds of the Central Carolinas* also carries a consistent theme of history and ornithological tradition throughout. The book introduces many of the early naturalists and those who collected bird eggs and specimens in the Carolinas and moves that history into the conservation effort led by individuals and bird clubs of the Twentieth Century.

Among the highlights of the book for me is that most species accounts include field notes, newspaper articles, and other notes from the 1800s into the 1900s and a variety of folk names for species. These notes were previously either difficult to access or unavailable, or at best, not compiled into one publication. For example, nesting ecology of the “tom-tit” (Tufted Titmouse) in an 1880 account documented by oologist R.B. McLaughlin provides detailed notes and interesting behaviors of this species.

Birds of the Central Carolinas is a large hardcover reference perhaps best suited for the

student of birds who enjoys the details of distribution, ecology, nesting status, and historical accounts of birds in specific regions. However, it is also an attractive and fun book which serve as a coffee table book for anyone to pick up and skim through.

2018 TENNESSEE SPRING BIRD COUNTS

There were ten spring bird counts. A total of 247 observers put in just over 641 party hours to record 57,960 individual birds. There were 211 species observed on the count. The weather was reasonable with only a few counts having some light rain. Nearly all the counts experienced wind up to 20 mph. Temperatures ranged from a chilly 37° F in Cumberland County to 89° F in Blount County. Notable sightings included Ross's Goose, Least Bittern, White-faced Ibis, Golden Eagle, Bell's Vireo, Purple Finch, Vesper Sparrow, and Painted Bunting. It is disheartening that only one Loggerhead Shrike was reported.

The counts in the table are arranged geographically from west to east. Taxonomic order follows the American Ornithological Society (AOS) Checklist of North and Middle American Birds, 59th supplement (2018) to the AOU Checklist.

COUNTY SUMMARIES

MINUTES OF THE SPRING 2018 TOS BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

21 April 2018
Chattanooga, Tennessee

The Spring meeting was held 21 April 2018 at the Crash Pad, Green Space and The Wells in Chattanooga, Tennessee and was hosted by the Chattanooga Chapter. Field trips were offered to Cravens House, Guild Trail, River Gardens, Reflecting Riding Gardens and Honors Golf Course.

President Steve Routledge called the meeting to order at 2:02 pm at the Green Space. Secretary Cyndi Routledge determined there was a quorum. The minutes of the Fall 2017 meeting were approved.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS-AT-LARGE

VICE PRESIDENT, WEST TENNESSEE: Dick Preston reported the Memphis Chapter is undertaking support of a MAPS Station at Strawberry Plains Audubon. The chapter will provide volunteers and monetary support.

TREASURER: Mac McWhirter presented the financial and membership reports for the year ended 31 December 2017. Assets of the Society were \$363,228 on that date, with the fair market value of investments increasing during the calendar year from \$326,455 to \$353,232.

Total revenue for 2017 was \$55,281, with \$11,238 coming from memberships and subscriptions. Individual contributions were \$704. The investment income and change in fair market value of the Vanguard portfolio contributed \$42,778.

Expenses for 2017 were \$22,440. Highlighting a few line items, five issues of *The Migrant* were published for a cost of \$13,229, and conservation and research grants and conservation memberships were \$4,100. The cost of publishing and distributing three issues of *The Warbler* was \$3,003.

The Directors' and Officers' Liability policy was renewed for three years at the same premium cost as the previous period. Combined memberships and subscriptions for 2017 totaled 671, down slightly from 676 in 2016. Several chapters are seeing recent growth, especially the Buffalo River and Kingsport chapters, and the Bristol Bird Club is achieving a good rate of revitalization.

President Steve Routledge announced that after 14 years as Treasurer Mac McWhirter will retire at the end of the year, and Pam Lasley will be taking over on January 1, 2019. Mac will continue to manage the Vanguard accounts.

CURATOR AND WEBMASTER: President Routledge reported on behalf of Curator Chuck Nicholson that he, Rick Blanton and Ashley Heeney are working to create a new webpage with easier access by individual chapters and better coverage of *The Migrant*.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

CONSERVATION POLICY – Co-chair Dick Preston announced the addition of Kellie Clelland and Laura Cook to the committee.

CONSERVATION AND RESEARCH FUNDING – Chairman Dr. Michael Collins made a request to increase the amount available to the Conservation Research Funding Committee. Mac McWhirter made a motion to allot up to \$10,000 on grants beginning in Spring 2019; the motion carried unanimously.

OLD BUSINESS

Cyndi Routledge, coordinator and distributor of the *Discover Birds Activity Book*, reported that about 4800 books remain. Approximately 21,500 books have been distributed to 18 states and 4 Central American Countries. She will be working with David Hanni of Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency regarding funding for future printing.

Steve Routledge provided an update on the Wings of Winter Festival which was held in January and served as the TOS winter meeting. There were approximately 100 participants for this first year. Next year's festival date is set for 18-20 January, 2019. Authors Richard Crossley and Joel Greenberg will be speakers.

Steve Routledge announced the Fall Meeting will be in Manchester, Tennessee, 5-6 October, 2018 hosted by the Highland Rim Chapter.

Susan McWhirter, Susan Hubley, and Anita Gaddy will comprise the new nominating committee. Susan McWhirter nominated Danny Gaddy for the next President. This was accepted by acclamation.

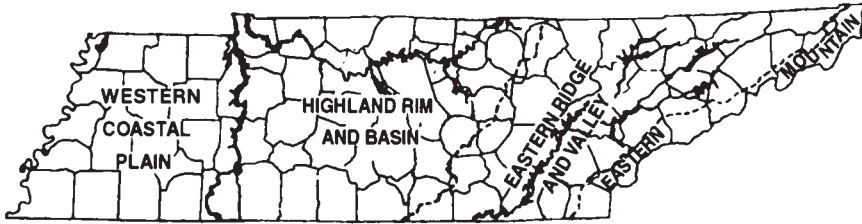

THE WINTER SEASON

1 December 2017 - 28 February 2018

The weather this season was fairly consistent from region to region across the state. December saw near normal temperatures, while January was colder than normal and February was much warmer than normal. Precipitation generally was near normal over the first two months, but was notably heavy in February.

This could be called the “winter of the swans” in Tennessee, with multiple sightings and record high counts of three species. Over the last 20 years there have been an average of five swan reports per winter (range = 0 to 12); however, this winter there were 26 reports of swans. The Mute and Trumpeter Swans seen in Tennessee this winter likely were displaced from the Great Lakes region. Additionally, scoters and Long-tailed Ducks occurred in good numbers, as did several other diving ducks.

Two Red-necked Grebes and a Western Grebe were reported. Whooping Cranes appeared in three regions. Gulls were prominent this winter, with a state first Mew Gull, along with sightings of Little, California (2 reports), Iceland, Glaucous (perhaps 5 different individuals), and Great Black-backed gulls. Note that Lesser Black-backed Gulls are now routine wintering birds at several sites. Lake County produced the state’s fourth Ferruginous Hawk and 14th Prairie Falcon. Short-eared Owls made a strong showing with reports from ten counties.

Tree Swallows arrived record early and en masse during February, particularly in the Ridge and Valley. A flurry of American Tree Sparrows appeared in Middle Tennessee, with a few spilling over into adjacent regions. Harris’s Sparrows occurred at three sites in the Highland Rim and Basin, while another was in the Ridge and Valley. Vagrant songbirds included Common Redpoll and Spotted Towhee in West Tennessee, Western Tanager and Painted Bunting in the mid-state, and Yellow-headed Blackbird in East and Middle Tennessee.

Notable late lingerers included Common Nighthawk, Common Gallinule, Brown Pelican, American Bittern, White-eyed Vireo, Blue-headed Vireo (4 reports), Barn Swallow, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher (3), Ovenbird (2), and Black-and-white Warbler. A Green Heron spent its second straight winter in Nashville. The flight of boreal irruptives consisted mainly of Pine Siskins in modest numbers.

WESTERN COASTAL PLAIN REGION - - Weather extremes and their effect on birds were the themes for the season. December was slightly warmer than normal, but wetter by nearly 2 inches. January was decidedly colder than normal, being 4 degrees below average, but with average precipitation. Two cold snaps during the month saw overnight temperatures plunge to the single digits, freezing over nearly all but the largest and deepest ponds and lakes. This drove many waterfowl out of the area and concentrated those remaining at the few lakes with any open water. These conditions saw several counties reporting new species or new high numbers. February was much warmer at slightly over 4 degrees above normal, while record rainfall occurred over much of the region, averaging more than 9 inches above historic norms.

The birding highlights of the season included the appearance of all three species of swans and in good numbers. Black Scoter, Red-necked Grebe, and Common Loon made their first appearances in Tipton County. A Ferruginous Hawk in Lake County was a nice find. Short-eared Owls appeared at more locations and in greater numbers than usual. A female Rufous Hummingbird spent three weeks at a feeder in Shelby County. The bird was captured and banded, but, unfortunately, was not seen again after a late December freeze. A Prairie Falcon in Lake County, a Spotted Towhee in Henry County, and a Common Redpoll at a feeder in Shelby County rounded out an exciting season.

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HIGHLAND RIM AND BASIN REGION - - Temperatures were near normal in December and slightly below average (- 1.6 degrees) in January, but much warmer than normal (+ 8.4 degrees) in February. Precipitation was near normal in December and below average (- 2.2 inches) in February, but much wetter than normal (+ 6.97 inches) in February.

With this winter being an irruption year for Snowy Owls, hopes were high for one to show up in Tennessee. One did, but unfortunately it was a one-day-wonder photographed by a fisherman at Land Between the Lakes. Cackling Geese appeared in several counties this winter. Mute, Trumpeter, and Tundra Swans were seen beginning in January. Duck highlights included Eurasian Wigeon, all three scoters, Long-tailed Duck, and good numbers of Common Mergansers. California, Glaucous, and Great Black-backed Gulls were seen. Raptor highlights included a Northern Goshawk, plus several Golden Eagles and Short-eared Owls. Also of interest were a Western Tanager and Painted Bunting, plus three Harris's Sparrows, and an invasion of American Tree Sparrows.

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CUMBERLAND PLATEAU / RIDGE and VALLEY REGION - - Temperatures this season were quite variable. December had near normal temperatures, but January was colder than normal, and February was the warmest on record. Two examples from the Tri-cities showcase the extremes: From 31 December through 6 January the area experienced seven straight days with continuous sub-freezing temperatures, representing the second

longest streak of this type on record. Then from 18-24 February there were seven straight days of 70+ degree temperatures (including three days of 80+ degrees), for the longest such streak in that month. Precipitation for the season as a whole was near normal, although little snow fell.

Waterfowl highlights were many, including impressive numbers of geese and swans, good numbers of scoters and Long-tailed Ducks, plus above average numbers of Canvasbacks, Redheads, and Greater Scaup. A Mew Gull at Watts Bar Dam was the first for Tennessee. Birders searching for it the next day found a California Gull, the first for East Tennessee. Other rarities for the region included Western Grebe, two Pacific Loons, two *Plegadis* ibises, Lark Sparrow, Harris's Sparrow, and Yellow-headed Blackbird.

Arrival dates for Tree Swallows continue to come earlier. Amazingly, reports this year at six sites in the region occurred on or before the previous early arrival date for the state! American Tree Sparrows at two sites in the region were part of the flight centered in Middle Tennessee. Remarkable numbers of Orange-crowned Warblers were found again this winter, particularly in Knox and Hamilton counties. Boreal irruptives were generally scarce, with modest numbers of Pine Siskins found mainly west and south of Knoxville. Notable lingering migrants included Common Nighthawk, Sora, Common Gallinule, White-eyed Vireo, Blue-headed Vireo, Marsh Wren, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, Ovenbird, and Black-and-white Warbler.

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EASTERN MOUNTAIN REGION - - Temperatures for December were about normal, while the daily average for January was 3.4 degrees below normal. February was really warm with average temperatures 10.4 degrees above normal. December and January were dry with a combined deficit of 3.4 inches. February was wet, at 3.7 inches above normal, making up that earlier deficit.

Short-eared Owls made a strong winter presence in Cades Cove in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. Besides frequent incidental observations, a survey conducted on 20 January by 25 participants documented up to four owls. It is believed that the presence of the Short-eared Owls in Cades Cove is due to the conversion of pastures to native warm season grasses. The survey on 20 January also tallied high numbers of Northern Harriers and Red-shouldered Hawks, plus a Sedge Wren.

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INSTRUCTIONS TO AUTHORS

The Migrant records observations and studies of birds in Tennessee and adjacent areas.

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MATERIAL: The subject matter should relate to some phase of Tennessee ornithology. It should be original, factual, concise and scientifically accurate.

STYLE: Both articles and short notes are solicited; recent issues of *The Migrant* should be used as a guide in the preparation of manuscripts. Where more detail is needed, reference should be made to *Scientific Style and Format*, eighth edition, by the Council of Science Editors, councilscienceeditors.org.

COPY: Manuscripts should be double-spaced with adequate margins for editorial notations and emailed in Word.docx. Tables and figures should be prepared in a separate file with appropriate headings; see *Scientific Style and Format* for examples of appropriate form for tables. Photographs intended for reproduction should be at least 300 dpi or sharp with good contrast on glossy white paper. Weights, measurements, and distances should be in metric units. Dates should be in "continental" form (e.g., 16 March 1997). Use the 24-hour clock (e.g., 0500 or 1900).

NOMENCLATURE: The scientific name of a species should be given after the first use of the full common name in the text. The scientific name should be italicized and in parentheses. Names should follow the *A. O. U. Check-list of North American Birds* (seventh edition, 1998, or supplements).

TITLE: The title should be concise, specific and descriptive.

ABSTRACT: Manuscripts of five or more pages should include an abstract. The abstract should be less than 5% of the length of the manuscript. It should include a brief explanation of why the research was done, the major results, and why the results are important.

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IDENTIFICATION: Manuscripts including reports of rare or unusual species or of species at atypical times should include: date and time, light and weather conditions, exact location, habitat, optical equipment, distance, behavior of bird, comparison with other similar species, characteristic markings, experience of observer, other observers verifying the identification and reference works consulted.

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
