

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GOLDEN-CROWNED SPARROW: FIRST STATE RECORD

On 4 December 2005, an adult Golden-Crowned Sparrow (*Zonotrichia atricapilla*) was seen feeding on the ground under a feeder in our backyard in Covington, Tipton County. It was in the company of White-throated Sparrows (*Zonotrichia albicollis*) and Cardinals (*Cardinalis cardinalis*). Initial observations were made from 10-12 meters with 8x42 binoculars. The bird was first observed at 0700 for fifteen minutes. The bird returned in the afternoon and fed intermittently until sundown. Viewing conditions were overcast to clear. It was a large sparrow with a yellow-brown crown, a wide black supercilium and gray breast. No vocalizations were heard. Photos were taken and provided to the Tennessee Bird Records Committee.

The sparrow returned to feed most days in the company of White-throated Sparrows and Cardinals. It was viewed by multiple observers and was last seen 11 January 2006.

We have no previous experience with this species, but have many years of observation of other *Zonotrichia* sparrows in our region.

ANHINGA NESTING ON PERCY PRIEST LAKE, RUTHERFORD COUNTY

Anhinga (*Anhinga anhinga*) is an uncommon nesting bird typically found only in the bottomland hardwood swamps of west Tennessee, specifically the Mississippi River Valley. Few known nesting sites have been documented in recent years, however, nesting has been confirmed at Shelby Forest Wildlife Management Area in Shelby County and Reelfoot Lake, Obion County, Tennessee since 2010 (SGS, pers. obs.).

On 2 June 2011, while conducting routine wading bird surveys by kayak, I observed and photographed a pair of Anhingas in a small rookery east of the Lamar Hill Boat Ramp, Percy Priest Lake, Rutherford County, Tennessee. Initially I saw a male fly out of the rookery, circle the island, and land at the top of one of the tallest snags. I obtained a few photographs and watched the male for several minutes. After paddling my kayak around the island in continuation of the survey, I saw a female on a nest in a willow tree about 6 meters above the water. After the female flushed from the nest, she was not seen again that day nor on any subsequent visit. I observed the male again on 5 June 2011, but not on subsequent searches. Assessment of the photographs showed the male had a couple of small patches of tan feathers on his neck, which may indicate he was a second year male. The nest failed, or they abandoned shortly after I discovered the nest as no Anhingas were observed on subsequent visits by the author.

The Anhinga nest on Percy Priest Lake in Rutherford County is the first documented nesting in Tennessee east of Kentucky Lake and one of only three nests documented away from the Mississippi River Valley. The first record was at the Tennessee National Wildlife Refuge, Humphrey's County in 1953 (Cybert 1955). Nesting was also documented at Big Hill Pond State Park, McNairy County in 1980 (Waldron 1980). More recently, a pair of Anhinga was suspected of nesting at Hatchie National Wildlife Refuge, Haywood County in 2009 and possibly in 2013 (J.R. Wilson, B. Ford, pers. comm.).

HOW WE FOUND THE HOODED CRANE

On 13 December 2011 Phyllis Deal and I went to Hiwassee Wildlife Refuge, Meigs County, hoping to see a Whooping Crane (*Grus americana*) reported to be there. I had been introduced to the refuge and birding many years before by my sister, Sylvia Britt, who had moved back to Cleveland, Tennessee after retirement.

Phyllis and I had stopped there the afternoon before on the way to Cleveland from Lexington, Kentucky, where we live. We had seen only an immature Whooping Crane that had been pointed out by Jen Davis who was tracking the brownish bird for the International Crane Foundation as it migrated south. On the 13th we found four beautiful adult Whooping Cranes in a partially cut corn field north of the observation pavilion. After watching them for a bit, I started searching the closest visible shoreline for the immature bird where we had seen it the day before. Instead of the Whooping Crane I saw a bird I could not identify. It had a black body and white neck and was smaller than the Sandhill Cranes (*Grus canadensis*) that were foraging near it.

Phyllis and I took turns viewing it through my scope, trying to figure out if it could be a heron instead of a crane, but came to no decision. Neither of us had ever seen a bird like it before. We were alone and knew no birders to contact in Tennessee. Although I grew up in nearby Bradley County, I became interested in birding long after leaving the state. After about an hour a man drove in and joined us briefly. He had stopped on his way home from

work to see the Sandhill Cranes and seemed uninterested in our strange bird. Obviously not a birder!

We lingered, hoping a local birder would show up. Finally, just before dusk, our hopes were realized. Charles Murray, a member of the Chattanooga Chapter, who checks the site frequently came by. After viewing the bird, Charles called Jen Davis and asked her to come to the site. When Jen saw the bird she said it looked like a Hooded Crane (*Grus monacha*). She digiscoped the bird, and that evening she and Charles sent the photo to Scott Somershoe, State Ornithologist, who agreed with her identification. The bird was placed on the rare bird alert, and the rest is history.

Phyllis and I feel very fortunate to have been at the right place at the right time.

HOODED CRANE AT HIWASSEE

I arrived at Hiwassee Wildlife Refuge at about 1630 on 13 December 2011 and met Marie Sutton and Phyllis Deal, residents of Lexington, Kentucky. They asked me to identify an unknown crane they were observing. After seeing the crane myself and being unable to identify it, I called Jen Davis, a Whooping Crane (*Grus americana*) tracker for the International Crane Foundation (ICF), whom I knew to be in the area. She came to the refuge, took digiscope photographs and wrote a detailed description of the unknown crane. Ms. Davis contacted Bryant Tarr, curator at the ICF. He identified the bird as a Hooded Crane (*Grus monacha*), a native of Asia. Ms. Davis also sent her description of the crane to Scott Somershoe, State Ornithologist, Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency.

On 14 December I posted a report on the discovery of this Asian rarity on the TNBird.org list serve web site. Within about an hour and a half wildlife watchers from the southeast Tennessee area began to arrive at the Hiwassee viewing gazebo hoping to see the Hooded Crane.

The Hooded Crane was seen by many observers during the time it remained at Hiwassee. I maintain a visitors log at the refuge on behalf of the Tennessee Ornithological Society. A total of 4187 visits to Hiwassee was recorded from 14 December 2011, when the crane was first reported, until 8 February 2012. (Note: Visitors were asked to sign the log each day that they visited the refuge; if no volunteer was manning the log some visitors failed to sign in, so though the exact number of visitors is not known, the positive economic impact to the region is obvious).

On 30 January 2011 I observed the Hooded Crane from 0820 until about 0950, when it was chased by a Sandhill Crane (*Grus Canadensis*) and flew out of sight. This was the last reported sighting of the crane in Tennessee. It is interesting to note that in February a Hooded Crane was being reported in Indiana.

Editors' note – The record of the Hooded Crane is pending acceptance by the Tennessee Bird Records Committee.

ROUND TABLE NOTES

SAY'S PHOEBE AT HATCHIE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE - On 29 January 2012 we were birding at O'Neal Lake at Hatchie NWR in Haywood County. While by the fishing pier we saw a phoebe fly up from the ground and perch on a post. We both recognized that this bird was not an Eastern Phoebe (*Sayornis phoebe*), and because of time spent birding in western states felt this was a Say's Phoebe (*Sayornis saya*). The bird had a warm buffy-ochre undertail, sides and belly. The head was dark gray-brown with a dark eye, black bill and whitish throat. The back and wings were gray-brown with smudgy whitish wing bars. The chest was a dingy light gray, and the tail was black. The bird called "phoebe" several times with the accent on the last syllable, the call being thinner than Eastern Phoebe and not as hoarse or harsh. When we played the song of Say's Phoebe the bird responded strongly by immediately changing direction while flying and flying toward us, veering off at the last second. We observed the bird for about 15 minutes with both binoculars and scope, at times from as close as 3 meters, as it flew from perch to perch.

We were able to get notification out quickly via TN-Bird , and the bird remained very cooperative for many observers throughout its stay. We saw it for the last time on February 17, the last day it was reported. We believe this is the sixth sighting of Say's Phoebe in Tennessee.

WINTER LIFE OF MALE SUMMER TANAGER -- It is perhaps a bit surprising that many neotropical migrants maintain territories when they are on their nonbreeding wintering grounds. Some species like Golden-winged Warblers (*Vermivora chrysoptera*) move around in mixed feeding flocks—which contain both other migrants and resident tropical species. At the same time, they aggressively maintain territories against individuals of their own species. This year we have a male Summer Tanager (*Piranga rubra*) guarding the boundaries of our property in Costa Rica against potential Summer Tanager intruders. We have about 2 hectares (~ 5 acres) outside of Monteverde in the Tilaran Mountains at 4500 feet elevation. Our tanager has chosen our property boundaries as his own, as he makes his solo route around the edges of our little "farm," "pit-ta-tucking" all the way. Our property is a mixture of citrus trees, coffee, bananas, vegetable gardens, lawn, young native trees, and lots of flowering shrubs planted to attract hummers and butterflies. There seems to be a sufficient supply of insects to keep him well-fed, and he shows no interest in native berries, orchard fruit, or bananas at our fruit feeder. He vocalizes extensively at the lower edge of our property, where we have heard another Summer Tanager calling from time to time. However, he has no quarrel with numerous Blue-gray Tanagers (*Thraupis episcopus*) that are frequently about, or with any other bird species. After calling ("pit-ta-tuck") off and on most of the day, he settles into steady calling around the property about half an hour before sunset. Finally, after sunset every evening, he settles down about 1.5 meters up in a densely-foliated orange tree in the center of the yard, and pit-ta-tucks himself to sleep. Who came blame him—it's a lonely life.

THE 2011 TENNESSEE CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT SUMMARY

The 2011 Tennessee Christmas Bird Count (CBC) is the 81st compilation. Thirty counts reported data this year, with Cane Creek as a new count. Warren County did not conduct a count, and no data was received from the Norris count. This year's count resulted in 158 species, plus three more found during the count week. Four hundred eighty-four observers tallied 1510.91 party hours and recorded 378,544 individuals, which is the lowest total of individual birds found for the compilation since 1992. Twenty of these species were represented by a lone individual.

The weather throughout the CBC season was normal. Several counts experienced some heavy rain and/or windy conditions, and temperatures ranged from a chilly 23° F at Kingsport to a pleasant 65° F in Clay County.

Black-bellied Whistling-Duck, Little Gull, Northern Rough-winged Swallow and Clay-colored Sparrow (previously only a count week bird) are all new species for the Tennessee CBC compilation. This brings the all-time total of species found on Tennessee CBC's to 267 (plus 6 more count week only species). Notable misses include scoters, American White Pelican (first miss in 14 years), Green Heron and Black-capped Chickadee. Notable, but not countable, were 6 Whooping Cranes and a Hooded Crane (possibly only the 2nd North American record) at the Hiwassee Wildlife Refuge.

The following species were recorded in record or unusually high numbers: Green-winged Teal, Redhead, Bufflehead, Pied-billed Grebe, Black Vulture, Golden Eagle, Merlin, American Woodcock, Short-eared Owl and Common Raven. The following species were recorded in unusually low numbers: American Coot, Least Sandpiper, Song Sparrow and Red-winged Blackbird.

THE WINTER SEASON

1 December 2011 - 29 February 2012

Remarkably mild temperatures prevailed through the entire season. Precipitation was generally near normal, but with very little falling as snow.

Black-bellied Whistling-Ducks over-wintered in Shelby County for the first such occurrence in the state. Waterfowl numbers seemed to be low, although Tundra Swan and Common Merganser were found in all four regions. A Hooded Crane of unknown provenance attracted throngs of birders to Hiwassee Refuge. A Say's Phoebe at Hatchie National Wildlife Refuge established the sixth state record and was the longest-staying individual. Boreal irruptives were quite scarce statewide, thus two separate Common Redpolls in Middle Tennessee were all the more remarkable. Not unexpectedly, a few early migrants (e.g., Lesser Yellowlegs, Purple Martin, and Tree Swallow) arrived in the state in mid to late February. More surprising, however, were early nesting records for Bald Eagle in Marion County and Killdeer in Shelby County.

Innovative techniques using motion-sensing trail cameras to monitor staked-out deer carcasses provided documentation of Golden Eagles at multiple sites in East Tennessee, involving both of the eastern regions of this report. Eagles were photographed in six of seven counties where monitoring occurred. Apparently these birds represent an extension of the substantial wintering population (25-30+ birds) in southwestern Virginia.

WESTERN COASTAL PLAIN REGION - - The winter of 2011-2012 was marked by mild temperatures across the region with slightly lower than normal rainfall. The Memphis metro area experienced the seventh warmest winter on record, averaging more than four degrees above normal. Irrupective species were nearly absent, with few reports of Red-breasted Nuthatch or Pine Siskin. Purple Finches were widespread, but in lower numbers than usual. The best bird of the season was a Say's Phoebe which lingered at Hatchie NWR for several weeks, much to the delight of many birders.

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HIGHLAND RIM AND BASIN REGION - - The winter season in the Nashville area was one of the warmest in many years. The mean temperature for each month was well above its typical value, averaging 4.3 degrees warmer than normal over the three month span. Precipitation was near normal. Warm temperatures meant there were only two measurable snowfalls in Nashville during the period, although other areas in Middle Tennessee got more than the trace amounts recorded in Nashville. Northern irruptive species, such as Purple Finch, Pine Siskin, and Red-breasted Nuthatch, were very hard to find this winter, though individual Common Redpolls in Davidson and Perry counties provided birders with a most uncommon sight. Duck numbers on the lakes around Nashville also seemed to be down, perhaps the result of overall warmer weather in states to the north.

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CUMBERLAND PLATEAU / RIDGE and VALLEY REGION - - Very mild temperatures persisted through the entire season, averaging 4 to 5 degrees above normal. Precipitation was near normal, but with only trace amounts of snow in most of the region. Low numbers of waterfowl likely were related to the unusual warmth. The mild conditions also may have contributed to the over-wintering by a Least Sandpiper at a farm pond in Northeast Tennessee, the first such record. A few "half-hardy" species lingered into or through the season. Much more unexpected, however, were records of Common Gallinule, Common Nighthawk and Painted Bunting.

A deal of "buzz" in the birding world was generated by the discovery of a Hooded Crane at Hiwassee Refuge in mid-December. A native of eastern Asia with a small population and little history of vagrancy, the provenance of this bird was debated. Over the next two months during the Hooded Crane's stay more than 4200 "visits" were recorded at the Hiwassee Refuge viewing gazebo, not including the well-attended two-day Crane Festival. This total includes repeat visits. It should also be noted that not all visitors were seeking the Hooded Crane. Guests from 47 states and several foreign countries signed the register. Kudos to Charles Murray for monitoring the site; posting daily updates on the Hooded Crane and maintaining the visitors log at the site.

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EASTERN MOUNTAIN REGION - - It was a mild winter. Average daily temperatures were about 5 degrees above normal for the entire period. Precipitation was slightly above normal. There was very little snowfall.

There were several reports of Golden Eagles. Motion sensing cameras set up near staked out deer carcasses provide a great tool for monitoring this species. Another camera of this type was set up to monitor bird feeders for Brown-headed Nuthatch at Washington County Park, just barely into Virginia on the shore of South Holston Lake. All winter finches and Red-breasted Nuthatches were in low numbers.

Shrike - Siskin: **Loggerhead Shrike**: thru season (1) Holston Valley, Sullivan Co (m.ob.). **Red-breasted Nuthatch**: 18 Dec / 7 Feb (20+) Roan Mtn (RLK), max; few reports elsewhere. **Brown-headed Nuthatch**: mid Dec - mid Feb (1-2) Washington Co Park, on VA portion of South Holston L shoreline (JWC, MSa), feeder camera. **House Wren**: 31 Dec (1) Doe Valley, Johnson Co (RLK), on Shady Valley - Mountain City CBC. **Snow Bunting**: 3 Dec (1) Round Bald on Roan Mtn (DK). **Orange-crowned Warbler**: 3 Jan (1) count week for Bristol CBC (MSa), in VA portion of count circle. **Pine Warbler**: 1 Jan (1) Bristol CBC (RLK); 24 Feb (1) Wilbur L, Carter Co (BP, JP), ers. **Fox Sparrow**: few reports. **Purple Finch**: very scarce. **Red Crossbill**: 18 Dec / 29 Jan (9 / 13) Roan Mtn (RLK, DK, David Hall / RBB, TSM, RMC); 20 Jan (1) South Holston L (MSa). **Pine Siskin**: 18 Dec (170) Roan Mtn (RLK, DK, David Hall), max; no reports elsewhere.

The scientific name should be italicized and in parentheses. Names should follow the *A. O. U. Check-list of North American Birds* (seventh edition, 1998, or supplements).

TITLE: The title should be concise, specific and descriptive.

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
