May 28

The seasonal idiosyncrasies, noticed in the Bulletin of April 26, have been maintained; the weather-shifts have been frequent, and the winds commonly prevailing and dying at northerly points, have rendered the month exceptionally cool; the season is still about two weeks behind the normal average.

The fruit of the Lake region barely escaped frosting on the night of May 9-10, when 32° was registered at Cleveland at eight o'clock in the morning; considerable damage from frost was then reported from central and southern Ohio. The conditions for cross-fertilization were perfect, and so far as known not a fruit bud was injured in the northern parts of the State. As earlier indicated we have at last a perfect fruit-year in prospect for our immediate lake region.

As an instance of the restraining influence of cold weather late cherries on the Heights remained in full bloom from 10 to 14 days, and the late apples did not reach their flowering height until May 20; today - May 28 - many remnants of the super-abundant bloom still remain on many of the trees. The effect of such a prolongation of the flowering season, with its attendant insect life, is to be seen in the leisurely movements of the warblers, multitudes of which are with us at this time; accordingly the season has been exceptional for the observation of these interesting birds; no fewer than 26 species are recorded below.

The Cedar Waxwings, noticed as early as March 3, were reported up to May 20; they have been active in the fruit trees, and they constantly erect their crests, a habit rarely, if ever, noticed in the breeding season.

The present list of 160 species is the largest yet attained, a result mainly due to the contributions of Messrs. Baker and Doolittle and of Professor Finfrock.

Note: Fruits set well and all yielded well but apples, which were small on account of drought in August; moreover Ohio's fruit was very imperfect on account of the great number of moths. [Note added after original publication.]
