Who banded this bird? - A high school girl found a bird crushed on a concrete highway five miles south of the banding station of "Jeff" Gill at Huntington, L.I., N.Y. This bird was beyond recognition but wore band no. 39-255125. It was disdiscovered on October 18, 1948. It isn't Gill's bird and the Washington office states that the data on the banding of the bird has not been filed at their office as yet.
