## IDENTIFICATION OF FLIES

Dr. Jos. Bequaert, at the Museum of Comparative Zoology, Cambridge 38, Mass., has consented to identify bird flies sent to him. He wrote, "I prefer to have them preserved in 75 to 80% alcohol. Flies sent in dry are also acceptable, but it is advisable to place them with soft paper or cotton in the small box before shipping." This information was sent to Harold B. Wood after identifying an Ornithomyia fringellina from a Wood Thrush, which Dr. Bequaert said is one of over 100 kinds of birds recorded as hosts for this little fly. Dr. Bequaert is a recognized authority on Hippoboscidae and will welcome perfect specimens.
