## THE ATOMIC AGE

A recent issue of "Chemical and Engineering News" carries an item which may be of interest to our members. Under the heading "Bird Watching Made Easy" there is a story of a new approach to an old problem which was worked out by D. R. Griffin, a zoologist at Cornell University. Dr. Griffin came up with the idea of tagging birds by affixing small aluminum capsules containing radioactive isotopes to them. The placement of a Geiger counter near the nest of a "hot" bird furnishes a convenient aid in studying its habits. The charge in the capsule is small enough to prevent injury to the bird or to anyone who may touch it. This technique may also be used with animals and the course of a subterranean mole so tagged can be followed from the surface of the earth by a similar device.

While this kind of research requires equipment and techniques which are not readily available to most banders, there may be some with particular problems who might find it worth investigation.
