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### BRIEF MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETINGS

On the evening of Feb. 24th the officers and councillors met at the Philadelphia YMCA where various committees reported on their activities during the past year.

At 11 A.M. the next day a business meeting was held in the auditorium of the Academy of Natural Sciences. Mrs. Marie V. Beals was elected Vice President and Verdi Burtch was elected Councillor to fulfill her unexpired term of two years. J. J. Hickey's term as Councillor having expired. Geoffrey Gill was elected to serve in his place and allow Mr. Hickey to devote his full time to the Gull Survey. Albert Conway was elected as a new Councillor for Pennsylvania and all other officers and councillors were re-elected.

40 Stenerousene reservate 7 em William Pepper, Jr., Treasurer, made his report and John A. Gillespie of the auditing committee reported the books in order.

Mrs. Marie V. Beals of the membership committee reported a membership of 143. (Now forging ahead past the 150 mark)

Geoffrey Gill of the publicity committee reported more than 20 stories about banders being published in their home papers.

Dr. Witmer Stone was elected an Honorary Member.

Business meeting adjourned.

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An Gpen Meeting was held in the same place in the afternoon and was attended by 70 members and guests. A program of the very interesting papers will be found elsewhere in this issue and many will be published in BIRD-BANDING.

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Numerous displays were set up in the hall outside the auditorium. These included: The Latest Type Traps; Healed Bird Bones; A Bluebird Housing Project: Newspaper Publicity of Banders: Drawings of Song Sparrow Breast Markings; Pictures of Berries and Shrubs Preferred by Birds; A Summary of the Work at Birdwood, Mr. and Mrs. Beal's station; and a variety of ornithological literature.

At 6 o'clock dinner was served at Holland's Restaurant and 36 people attended. This was followed by short addresses by Dr. C. Brooke Worth, Frederick C. Lincoln and Beecher S. Bowdish. Randolph Ashton then showed three reels of colored moving pictures of birds. The Secretary thanked him on behalf of EBBA. This brought the day's activities to a close. 

At 9 o'clock, Feb. 26th, 13 members met at the Academy of Natural Sciences and went on a field trip which lasted until 4:30 P.M. This trip included visits to the homes and banding stations of Mr. and Mrs. John Gillespie at Glenolden, C. B. Worth in Swarthmore, Horace Groskin in Ardmore, Horace McCann in Paoli, and Raymond J. ## CATS AND CASUALITES

Much can be said for and against cats. No bander can deny that they are the cause of a number of recoveries of small birds, yet "Tabby's" habit of bringing her kill home may be a blessing in disguise, as in this way they are usually reported. Beecher S. Bowdish of Demarest, N.J. has been notified recently of the following recoveries by the Survey: Robin, banded Sept. 5, 1937, killed by a cat at Tenafly, N.J., Aug. 12, 1938. Song Sparrow, banded April 9, 1938, killed by a cat, May 1, 1938 at St. John, New Brunswick. Catbird (jv.) banded June 25, 1938, killed by Automobile Aug. 11, 1938 at Teaneck, N.J.

Mr. Bowdish adds, "The auto in the country constitutes a serious menace to bird life, but by the foregoing, the cat still maintains supremacy in this respect by 2 to 1, even in the far north."

WHAT BANDERS ARE DOING

Barton L. Sharp, 201 N. Broad St., Lititz, Pa. proposes the banding of Upland Plovers with colored bands, Size #3. He would like to hear from banders who would be interested in such a project.

Dr. C. B. Worth, Swarthmore, Pa., recently converted an assortment of small traps into one "jumbo" trap, more than 8 ft. square, with sparrow-trap, woodpecker and top opening entrances. Reports he is now catching birds 10 at a time. Many banders still favor the scattered trap plan. He had an 8 year old Chimney Swift return last Fall.

Dr. H. B. Wood of Harrisburg, Pa. expects to pass the 3,000 mark of birds banded by him, this year. The first bird he banded was a Sparrow Hawk. He has done considerable work with Bank Swallows.

Malcolm Lerch, Penn Yan, N.Y. operates, besides his own station, 3 substations at the homes of friends. He is having excellent luck with Song Sparrows. He says, "Experience is the best teacher". All members of EBBA will heartily second this statement.

Dobbin, 1308 Bolton St., Baltimore, Md. is planning one in Elk Ridge, Md. and Mrs. M. V. Beals, Elmhurst, N.Y. is getting the Queens County Bird Club busy with another for 1940, now, so that the houses can be put outside and weathered.

Any member interested in a community project, either for Bluebirds or Wrens, may procure a complete kit through the Association for \$1.00. This kit includes: Project outline of 4 typed pages, suitable for scouts, school lads, 4-H club members, etc., with contest features but with the welfare of the birds given first consideration; I page of drawings of an approved house with complete specifications; a page of placing instructions and a completely built house to use as a model or ready to erect.
