Howard P. Mahnken of Lambertville, N.J., writes that he banded 11 Common Terns and 59 Black Skimmers -- his first sea birds -- last summer. He adds, "My banding assistant, Mrs. Dorothy Hartmann, is feeding with her Blue Jays. They steal her suet. Mine are well behaved and never seem to touch the suet. Quite a contrast in Blue Jays living 3 miles apart. ★ ★ ★ E. Alexander Bergstrom, Editor of Bird-Banding, writes that he has a few extra copies of the July issue left, including Seth Lov's paper on nets, and will send one free to any of EBBA's readers who write him, while the supply lasts. His address: 37 Old Brook Road, West Hartford 7, Conn. ★ ★ ★ EBBA President Paul Fluck banded more than 5,000 birds of 92 species in 1957 and had about 500 returns ★ ★ ★ Mrs. Joseph Cardinali of Jamesburg, N.J. trapped and banded an immature Northern Shrike on January 12. The bird, which had killed a Tree Sparrow in the trap, was released many miles away ★ ★ ★ Oliver F. Irwin of Memphis, Tenn., writes "There are several records of Coturnix Quail, banded in Tennessee, being killed in other states. John S. Wilder, Mason, Tenn., killed a Coturnix Quail banded in Indiana." ★ ★ ★ James McCabe of Carthage, Ohio (according to Inland Bird Banding News for December 1957) has replaced his one inch "c" clamps on the hoses of his water traps with aluminum alloy ones. The iron ones rusted too easily, but the aluminum ones are perfect. They can be bought through Sears Roebuck at 31¢ each. ★ ★ ★ Rev. Garrett Detwiler, EBBA Secretary, banded some 6,876 birds in 1957 and he tells us that Bennett Matlack stopped in and said that he had banded about 12,300 in 1957. Rev. Detwiler bands in Salem, N.J. and Bennett Matlack in Bridgeton, N.J.
