

FREDERICK C. LINCOLN

Frederick C. Lincoln died after an illness of several months in Washington, D.C., on Friday, September 16, 1960. Dr. Lincoln, who was born in Denver, Colorado, 68 years ago, was an employee of the U.S. Government since 1920 when he was hired to set up the bird banding program of the Biological Survey. For many years he was chief of the bird banding activities of the Biological Survey, later the Fish and Wildlife Service. He was well known to all the older banders, was a frequent visitor to bander's meetings and did much to encourage the growth and activities of the Eastern and other Banding Associations as well as of individual banders. At the time of his death he was assistant to the director of Interior's Sport Fisheries and Wildlife Bureau, but he will be remembered always by members of the Eastern Bird Banding Association for his earlier leadership of bird banding activities.

LEONARD M. LLEWELLYN

Leonard M. Llewellyn, a long time member of the Eastern Bird Banding Association, died on September 21, 1960, at the age of 52. He was an employee of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and at the time of his death was on the staff at the Patuxent Wildlife Research Center, Laurel, Maryland. While most of his official duties were concerned with mammals he has been an active bird bander since December 17, 1937 when he banded his first bird, a Downy Woodpecker, and he banded more than 9,385 birds of 95 species mostly in Maryland. He had many friends among the banders.
