TREE SPARROW WITH On February 11, 1962, at Etna, N. Y., I trapped a UNIDENTIFIED BAND Tree Sparrow (Spizella arborea) bearing a strange band on its right leg. This band was of thin steel

stock and measured 7 mm. in length by 3 mm. in diameter - somewhat larger than a normal U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service size 1 band. It was coated with gray enamel and bore no inscription except for a single letter "E" - 4mm high by 2.5 mm. wide - stamped into the metal. The enamel was worn off the edges of the band, indicating that it had been carried by the bird for some time. Since the bird did not bear a Fish a Wildlife Service band, I banded it on its left leg. The unusual band was not removed, and the bird was released. I would appreciate any information regarding the origin of this non-standard band. - John S.
