THE SONG OF THE CAROLINA CHICKADEE Information wanted by Rodman Ward

I am making a study of the song of the Carolina Chickadee (Parus carolinensis), having recorded on tape so far about 1000 songs of about forty birds in seven states along the Atlantic seaboard. It now seems that there are atypical song patterns strongly localized in at least a few quite small areas.

The Carolina Chickadee has the reputation of being very sedentary, which would of course help in explaining the development of these local songs, but I do not know of any statistical data on its movements. If any EBBA members, particularly those who have banded large numbers of these birds, have developed information of this type, or can lead me to such information elsewhere, I would very much appreciate hearing from them.
