EBBA NOW TAX EXEMPT

The Internal Revenue Service, U. S. Treasury Department, has now ruled that EBBA is on exempt status. Contributions made to EBBA are deductible from income taxes (including dues, of course) and bequests, legacies, etc. are deductible for Federal estate tax purposes.

Postage cost of mailing <u>EBBA</u> <u>News</u> to members from now on will be half what it has been before this determination was made -- a considerable saving to EBBA.
