

The Editor with Mr. & Mrs. Richard Kane had a very successful day at Hawk Mountain on October 26th, with a total of 172 hawks including 136 Red-tails and, notably, four Goshawks. Up to the 26th, 67 Goshawks had been counted there this season, of which 36 were seen the week preceding Oct. 26. It appears that this is to be

a Goshawk "invasion year" and so say the experts at Hawk Mountain. It also appears that this will be a "finch year" judging from recent reports so perhaps good winter banding is in store for us.

Treasurer Elise Dickerson, after a vigorous season of Block Island O.R. banding, is visiting her daughter in San Diego, California and, we hear, doing some interesting banding there while accumulating "life-birds". (See News in Brief for March-April 1968.)

Harold E. Burtt writes, regarding Dr. Blake's lack of Starling returns (EBBA News 31:5, p. 234), "My experience has been otherwise. I have had 12 returns from 24,784 Starlings banded, and with a sample of 8,736 birds I have had 119 repeats. Traps differ in the way they facilitate learning to avoid the trap. If we are teaching an animal to avoid a certain behavior we negatively reinforce (punish) the undesired behavior immediately. If the reinforcement is delayed the animal does not learn as readily, like the child that is not punished until father comes home that night. Blake used a nest-box trap which presumably closed and startled the bird immediately upon entry. My Starlings entered a decoy trap and at the outset were rewarded with food. It was at least several minutes before they went into their escape routine...so they did not consistently learn trap avoidance. It is as simple as that."
