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# MINUTES OF THE SPRING 2002 TOS BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

The Spring meeting of the Tennessee Ornithological Society (TOS) was hosted 3-5 May 2002 by the Memphis TOS Chapter at Dyersburg, Tennessee. In addition to the Directors' Meeting, field trips were taken to several birding spots in the area including Reelfoot Lake State Park, Black Bayou, Walnut Log, and several areas in Kentucky. The meeting of the TOS Directors was called to order by TOS President Chuck Nicholson at 4:16 p.m. Secretary Knox Martin reported a quorum present. Copies of the minutes of the Fall 2001 meeting were available for the members to read and approve. The president requested that approval of the minutes be postponed until the end of the meeting to give members a chance to read them before voting on approval.

THE MIGRANT: Editor Chris Welsh reported that the March 2001 issue of *The Migrant* was at the post office ready to be mailed to members. The June 2001 issue should be ready by May, and the September-December 2001 issue should be ready by December. More articles are needed, so if you have an article you would like considered for publication, see Chris.

THE TENNESSEE WARBLER: No report.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE: The Nominating Committee (Martha Waldron, Chairman, Jan Shaw, and David Vogt) put forward Virginia Reynolds as their choice for TOS President-Elect. A motion was made by Ron Hoff and seconded by Chris Welsh to elect Virginia as the next TOS State President. The vote to elect was unanimous. The general membership will vote on Virginia at the annual meeting later in the evening.

FINANCE COMMITTEE: TOS members Mac McWhirter and Chris Sloan have agreed to serve on the Finance Committee. More members are needed. There has been no report by the treasurer for quite a while, and it has been a few years since the books were audited, so the work of this committee is critical. A few new members are really needed. A meeting is needed immediately where the books can be looked at by all committee members. After that it can probably be done by correspondence, email, phone, etc. The way it is supposed to work is that sometime before the Spring state meeting the Treasurer should submit the annual financial report to the finance committee for review. Then the committee reports to the members at the annual Spring meeting.

BIRD RECORDS COMMITTEE: Kevin Calhoon reported that currently six or eight birds have been voted on. One member still needs to vote on these. For 2002 there are two or three open spots on the committee. Two names will be submitted for each opening before the Fall meeting so they can be chosen at the Fall meeting.

CONSERVATION AND RESEARCH FUNDING COMMITTEE: Troy Ettel gave a report for Melinda Welton on two funding proposals that had been made. One was by Dick Preston concerning the partnership for wildlife refuges, and the second was the Golden-winged Warbler Atlasing Project. Both proposals were voted on and approved for funding in 2002. Currently the committee is looking at several new projects. The Golden-winged Warbler funding was aimed at helping with expenses for volunteers working on the project. Dick Preston reported on his proposal. There is a support group in West Tennessee for the wildlife refuge system including Reelfoot Lake, Lake Isom, Lower Hatchie, and Chickasaw. The group got a matching grant of \$20,000 from Wild Birds Unlimited for construction of three observation platforms. The partnership needs to raise a matching \$20,000 to get this Wild Bird grant. The CRFC gave a \$900 grant to support the group.

TWRA is reviewing a new grasslands bird project, and they would like TOS to be a partner. The total budget cost of the project is about \$250,000. If TOS could donate \$500, it would be considered an active partner.

Susan McWhirter asked if there was anything in the CRFC guidelines that would allow TOS to purchase land. Chris Sloan said that land could be purchased. There is currently over \$11,000 in the fund, so Susan suggested that we consider land purchases along with other funding possibilities. First we need an accurate accounting of the funds to see just how much we could afford to spend each year.

President Chuck Nicholson brought up a question concerning term limits and other term questions for committee members. Several current committee members have said they would like to rotate off the committee, and several have been on the committee since it was founded. The committee is supposed to be made up of two members from each of the three grand divisions of the state as well as one member at large. If any members are interested in serving on the committee, see Chuck. Right now the committee has one member from West Tennessee, three from Middle Tennessee, two from East Tennessee, and a member at large. Several of these members are scheduled to rotate off the committee. If you would like to be a member,

see Chuck. There are no term limits currently, so it is not a problem to serve. Often it is hard to find qualified individuals to serve, but new blood is needed so think about serving.

A new group has been formed called the Alliance for the Cumberland. It is made up of different conservation groups in the area, as well as some state and federal agencies. The alliance looks at problems in the Cumberland Plateau and the Cumberland River.

President Chuck Nicholson reported that while oil drilling in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge is currently dead, there is still a lot of interest in drilling. Both of our U.S. Senators are in favor of drilling, so we have to keep an eye on the issue. All TOS members should write letters to federal representatives.

TOS passed a resolution in 2001 opposing the closing of our state parks. TOS is still opposed to the closing of Tennessee state parks. There has been no long term solution to this problem as yet. A group called "Pennies for Parks" has been set up as a park support group. Should TOS join this group? Chris Sloan made a motion to join the "Pennies for Parks" group. The motion was seconded by Ron Hoff. The vote to join was passed by voice vote.

TVA has begun a reservoir study plan. Lakefront homeowners and boat dock owners want to leave water levels high at all times. If this is done, it will certainly affect bird populations. The study will last for two years, and a draft of the findings is due out in 2003. Chuck Nicholson wrote a letter expressing his concerns with this plan a few weeks ago.

TVA has made "Green Power" available in many areas of the state. It is slightly more expensive for users than regular power, but it comes from renewable sources. Virginia Reynolds suggested that an article explaining this concept be published in *The Tennessee Warbler*.

TOS is currently involved with TWRA in the purchase of the 70,000 acres around Frozen Head/Royal Blue in the East Tennessee area. Troy Ettel brought TOS up to date on this project. The cost will be over \$10,000,000, and International Paper wants their money by the end of the year.

## COLLATERAL MATERIALS: No report.

TOS WEBSITE: The website is still up and active.

OLD BUSINESS: Troy Ettel reported on the Important Bird Areas Program of TWRA. Money is available from TWRA to help pay volunteers to work with this program. TOS is involved as well as the Audubon Society and several universities. In the next few months TWRA will begin the process of finding appropriate sites. One member of each state TOS chapter is needed as a contact person with TWRA. Troy gave a CARA update. TWRA received \$800,000 in 2001 and expects to receive \$1,300,000 in 2002. They plan to spend \$1,000,000 for land acquisition in 2002.

**NEW BUSINESS**: Chuck Nicholson is looking for a chapter from Middle Tennessee to host the Fall 2002 meeting. There are no plans yet for the 2003 Winter meeting. Troy Ettel reported the Chattanooga chapter of TOS raised over \$9,000 at

their annual Sandhill Crane event. There is a great deal of interest around the country in the work being done by both TOS and TWRA in crane conservation and restoration in the state.

The TOS chapter in Murfreesboro has been disbanded.

Chris Sloan brought up the possibility of an electronic database for *The Migrant*. An index could be put on line that would help everybody. Ron Hoff made a motion to look into the possibility of indexing *The Migrant* on line. The motion was seconded and passed by voice vote. The question of who would do the actual work was brought up. Most felt the webmaster should do it.

A motion was made by Chris Sloan and seconded by Susan McWhirter to approve the minutes from the Fall 2001 meeting. The vote to approve the minutes as amended was unanimous.

TOS BUSINESS MEETING: President Chuck Nicholson started the short business meeting by thanking TOS chapter members Jim and Sue Ferguson for all their work in setting up the Spring 2002 TOS State Meeting. He then recognized the various state chapters present at the meeting. A short update was given by *The Migrant* editor Chris Welsh and *The Tennessee Warbler* editor Theresa Graham.

Martha Waldron, chairman of the Nominating Committee, reported that the committee had voted to nominate Virginia Reynolds of the Memphis Chapter to the office of State TOS President-Elect. Gaynell Perry made a motion to close the nominations. The motion was seconded by Ron Hoff. The vote to elect Virginia Reynolds as TOS President-Elect was unanimous.

Chuck Nicholson reported the Columbia Chapter was interested in hosting the Fall 2002 State Meeting. The Spring 2003 State Meeting will be hosted by the Knox-ville Chapter. It was next reported that TOS Treasurer David Trently was interested in resigning his office in the near future. Chris Sloan volunteered to take over the office of treasurer upon the resignation of David Trently and after the TOS Finance Committee does an audit of the TOS financial records. Martha Waldron nominated Chris Sloan to the office of TOS Treasurer. A motion was made from the floor and seconded to close nominations. The voice vote to approve Chris Sloan as TOS Treasurer was unanimous.

Special TOS Distinguished Service Awards were awarded to TOS members Ruth Luckado of the Highland Rim Chapter and Jim Ferguson of the Memphis Chapter in recognition of their many years of outstanding service to TOS.

## DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD: JIM FERGUSON

Jim Ferguson is a true Renaissance man because of his interests in horticulture, cooking, and the arts. He was selected for a Distinguished Service Award because of his long and exemplary commitment to the Tennessee Ornithological Society (TOS).

He joined the Memphis chapter of TOS in 1975, promptly becoming a regular participant in the Memphis Christmas Count and serving as leader of the Raleigh group since 1980. He served as president of this chapter from 1982-1984 and moved up to president of the state organization from 1985-1987. He has been a member of several state and local committees including finance and by-laws. In addition, Jim has been a local and state director and has served as vice president from West Tennessee.

Jim has accompanied his wife Sue on her breeding bird survey route in West Tennessee since 1983. Jim and Sue also contributed to the Tennessee Breeding Bird Atlasing project. For many years he drove the "geriatric mobile" to the state meetings, providing transportation for many of our older members.

The members of the Memphis Chapter often turn to Jim for his clearer vision and solutions to "thorny problems." Among his many talents, Jim enjoys writing. The Memphis Chapter especially appreciates the outstanding article Jim wrote about Ben and Lula Coffey that was published in *The Migrant*.

## DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD: RUTH LUCKADO

Ruth Luckado is the backbone and spirit of the Highland Rim Chapter of the TOS. She has a natural enthusiasm for all things related to birding and is certainly the most active birder in the Chapter. More importantly, she is willing to share her enthusiasm with any and all who will go into the field with her.

She has been active in the organization for more than 30 years and is now serving as its President. In this, her second term, she is emphasizing recruitment, recognizing that in a group this long-standing, adding new members is essential if the organization is to survive. As new members are brought in, Ruth makes it a point to involve them in meaningful birding adventures, spending many hours in tailored outings for each to make sure they get "hooked" on birding.

Ruth participates in all activities of the Chapter. She leads many of the field trips, sharing her expertise with the members. The program of field trips planned with her guidance for the coming year includes the Fall hawk watch on Sewanee Mountain, Spring and Fall migrant surveys, woodcock courtship display, waterfowl and eagle watch, the January eagle count, and of course, the annual Spring Count and Christmas Bird Count.

Ruth has been a State Director of TOS for as long as anyone can recall. She is a regular attendee at State meetings and participates in numerous TOS state-wide studies and activities. She conducts a Roadside Raptor Survey in Moore County each year, has done the Breeding Bird Survey for the past several years, and has worked with the Partners in Flight projects.

Ruth is not just a birder. She is also concerned about other conservation issues and finds creative ways to support worthy conservation projects. Recently a long-time member of the Chapter passed away and members of her family wanted to find a constructive use of the many birding books she left behind. Ruth offered the amazing collection to members of the local chapter, TOS, and friends in the community. The proceeds from the sale of the items provided a \$500 contribution to the Smith Bend preservation project. She frequently lends her expertise in hearings on issues affecting conservation matters using humor to get her point across while making sure that all concerned know when an idea or proposal is in conflict with her vision of wise action.

There is so much more that could be said about Ruth Luckado and her dedication to birding and the TOS, but we trust that the above demonstrates that she is an exceptional and dedicated member of the TOS and is deserving of its Distinguished Service Award.

## FALL 2002 BIRD COUNT

Ron Hoff 282 Hackworth Ln Clinton, TN 37716

This article is a compilation of all the bird counts for the fall 2002 season (Table 1). Some of the counts were conducted in conjunction with the North American Migration Count, run every year on the third Saturday of September. This year it was September 21. The fall North American Migration Counts are similar to the spring counts in that each county is a count area. The data gathering is exactly the same as all Tennessee counts pertaining to hours and miles, times, participant names, and weather. The other counts are traditional fall counts conducted on a different date and the area censused is sometimes larger than a single county. The date a particular count was run is shown in the county summary below. The eastern end of the state experienced rain on Sept. 21, but not in the west. Anderson County was washed out and efforts in Blount and Sevier were hampered.

#### **COUNT SUMMARIES**

Anderson County - 21 September 2002; 0730-1030. Weather: hard rain all day (3+ inches); temperatures were 65-75. The participants tried to bird during the rain, but every time it let up, it would start raining hard again. While driving around, they spotted a group of Wild Turkeys. Most of the data is from the compiler's yard. A Gray-cheeked Thrush was a nice find. Blount County – 21 September 2002. Weather: Drizzle and showers most of the day with temperatures in the 70's. Rain hampered this count also, but the participants made the best of it and managed to find a Ruffed Grouse, Lesser Yellowlegs, Western and Least Sandpipers, 1 snipe, 1 Wilson's Phalarope, a couple of ravens, 2 Red-breasted Nuthatches, and an Orange-crowned Warbler. Elizabethton – 5 October 2002. Weather: A few patchy showers in the mountains in the early morning, then partly cloudy throughout with some light winds; temperatures were 57-84. The area covered was Carter County and parts of adjacent Johnson, Sullivan, Unicoi, and Washington Counties. Participants had a great day, finding 6 species found nowhere else in the state. While doing this they tallied 10 species of raptors, 6 species of woodpeckers, and 5 species each of owls, wrens, thrushes, and vireos. Knox County - 29 September 2002; 0545-1930. Weather: clear with calm winds; temperatures were 59-83. One of the highlights was a Loggerhead Shrike. Blue Jays were migrating through and they outnumbered all other species, but starlings and feral doves were under reported. Wild Turkeys were found for the third consecutive year. Other nice finds included Marsh Wren, snipe, Northern Harrier, Philadelphia Vireo, Gray-cheeked Thrush, and Bobolinks. Also of note were 21 species of warblers. Lebanon (John Sellars Chapter) – 21 September 2002; 0630-1500. Weather: Mild with mostly sunny skies and temperatures of 68-83F. The participants had a nice day finding several tough to find species, including the state's only Fish Crows, Bewick's Wren, and an early Hermit Thrush. 20 Northern Bobwhites were a welcome number, as were 58 Wild Turkeys. Morgan County – 21 September 2002; 0630-1700. No weather data given. Some of the more interesting finds were Blue-winged Teal, a Northern Harrier, Yellow-billed Cuckoo, 12 species of warblers, and 6 Bobolinks. Nashville – 5 October 2002; 0400-1900. Weather: clear to partly cloudy, with NW winds of 7-14 and temperatures of 53-73. Observers had a great day. They managed to turn up 31 American White Pelicans; 9 species of waterfowl; 11 Cooper's Hawks; all 7 species of woodpeckers; a Least Flycatcher; 35 (!) White-breasted Nuthatches; Winter and Sedge Wrens; all 6 species of vireos (including 24 Philadelphia); Orange-crowned, Cape May, Connecticut, and Canada Warblers; and finally Lark and Lincoln's Sparrows. One party birded by bicycle for 2 hours and 5 miles. Putnam County - 21 September 2002; 0430-1845. Weather: overcast with intermittent drizzle, fog, and 0-5 wind in the a.m., turning mostly cloudy with occasional misting and 0-10 winds in the afternoon; temperatures were 62-80. Observers recorded the highest species total and highest total of individuals in the 3 years of the Fall Count despite a smaller total of observers and fewer party miles than earlier counts. The main highlight of the count was the discovery of an immature "Great White Heron" (the white form of the Great Blue Heron). There are few records of this form away from Florida and the adjacent Gulf and Atlantic coasts. Other unusual species found on the count were Gadwall, Barn Owl, and Brown-headed Nuthatch. The Semipalmated Sandpiper set a new early fall arrival date for the county and was one of very few fall records for this species in the county. Eastern Screech Owls and Great Horned Owls established new high counts for the county. The Acadian Flycatcher tied a late fall departure date for the county. Great-crested Flycatcher, Yellow Warbler, and Kentucky Warbler all set new late fall departure dates for the county. An Eastern Wood-Pewee was seen feeding young on the day of the count. Species heard singing on count day were White-eyed Vireo, Yellowthroated Vireo, Common Yellowthroat, and Indigo Bunting. Observers: Ken Gum, Louann I. Gum, Steven E. Sevier County – 21 September 2002; 0830-1730. Weather: intermittent moderate rain with temperatures of 65-80. Rain hampered the efforts of the participants, but they still managed to find some interesting species. Among these were Goldencrowned Kinglet, Veery, Blue-winged and Golden-winged Warblers, and Dark-eyed Juncos. Observers: Susan Hoyle (compiler: P.O. Shelby County – 21 September 2002; 0530-2100. Weather: The morning was foggy until 0800, then partly cloudy becoming clear in the p.m. The winds were 0-5 NW and the temperatures were 67-83. Species of note were Black-crowned Night-Heron, an early American Black Duck, and a Lark Sparrow that was apparently a first park record for Shelby Forest. Least Terns, Black-billed Cuckoos, and Olive-sided Flycatcher were also nice finds. Temperatures in late March through much of April were warmer than usual resulting in early arrival dates for some migrants. A cold snap in May, particularly in the eastern part of the state, slowed the pace of migration at that point. Also, this presented some hardship for aerial insectivores and some early breeders, at least locally. Most observers commented that overall numbers were near normal for most regular migrants. As is often the case, a nice mix of unusual species enlivened the season.

WESTERN COASTAL PLAIN REGION — This season's weather was generally unremarkable. Migration overall seemed neither poor nor spectacular. Perhaps the most noteworthy event of the season was the unprecedented influx of Scissor-tailed Flycatchers. This species was found in six locations in four counties, with Fayette County recording its first, and a nesting pair was discovered in Lake County. Notably unusual species found included Hudsonian Godwit, Henslow's Sparrow, Fulvous Whistling-Duck, and the region's (not to mention state's) apparent third record of Clay-colored Sparrow. Written documentation was submitted for all of these rarities, along with photographs of the whistling-ducks, godwits and the nesting scissor-tails.

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HIGHLAND RIM & BASIN REGION — In Nashville, for the spring trio of months, the temperature was normal in March, nearly 4 degrees above average in April, and slightly below average in May. March was extremely wet, having 9.4 inches of rainfall, almost twice the average for the month. However, one third of the total occurred during a single day, 17 March, producing flooding in many areas. Precipitation returned to normal in April, but over two thirds of the amount fell in just two days. Finally, the total rainfall in May was slightly below average.

Undoubtedly, the highlight of this season was the presence of Connecticut Warblers in the Nashville area from 9-22 May. Up to four birds were present on a single day at Radnor Lake, and up to three at Shelby Bottoms. Birders from Kentucky, Alabama, and all over Tennessee were able to see this elusive species.

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CUMBERLAND PLATEAU / RIDGE & VALLEY REGION — March had near normal temperatures and slightly below normal precipitation. April was noticeably warmer and drier than average, while May had slightly cooler temperatures and near normal rainfall. The overall migration seemed interesting, with several unusual species reported, even though most regular migrants were only in fairly typical numbers. Near Chattanooga, the Standifer Gap Marsh produced numerous goodies, following the "Patagonia rest stop effect" (i.e., one good sighting results in more coverage which yields additional sightings). Most notable there were both Yellow and Black rails! Other regional rarities included Tricolored Heron, several unusual shorebirds, Yellow-bellied Flycatcher, and Connecticut Warbler.
