
As I prepare these notes, I have learned that the firstof-year hummingbirds (Ruby-throated in Illinois) have already returned. That means that hummingbird festivals are not too far behind. It is really amazing how popular these festivals have become and how everyone who has "lots" of hummingbirds wants to have a festival. The challenge becomes when to say "yes" (or "no") and that usually depends on many factors: How many birds are visiting feeders at the site? Are there too many flowers present that could distract the birds from being captured? How far away the site is from my "home base" (Springfield)? What sort of public amenities (including parking) are available at the site? And can the festival be conveniently scheduled? To date, there are already 30+ Illinois

festivals scheduled from late May through early September and attendance ranges from as few as 20 persons to more than 300. Everyone loves hummingbirds.
