MINUTES OF THE 2008 SPRING MEETING TENNESSEE ORNITHOLOGICAL SOCIETY

26 APRIL 2008
MILLINGTON, TN

TOS Board of Directors Meeting

The 2008 Spring Meeting of the Tennessee Ornithological Society (TOS) was hosted by the Memphis Chapter (MTOS) 25-27 April in Memphis. Field trips were offered to Shelby Forest, Shelby Farms (Penal Farm) including the Mid-South Raptor Center, The Earth Complex (Pits), and Hatchie National Wildlife Refuge.

The Directors Meeting was called to order by President Richard Connors at 3:15 p.m. Secretary Laura McCall announced that a quorum had been met. The minutes from the Fall 2007 Meeting, held 3 November 2007, were approved as written.

President's Report: Richard remarked that his term had gotten off to a slow start but that it had picked up in the fall, and he has been busy since that time. He noted that some committees are working fine while others need to be re-established. Richard stated that he would like to set up a constitution/bylaws committee.

East Tennessee Vice-President (Rack Cross): No report.

Middle Tennessee Vice-President (Melinda Welton): No report.

West Tennessee Vice-President (Dick Preston): Dick urged chapters to get involved with the Cats Indoors! Campaign and suggested that clubs distribute pamphlets to local veterinarians. He also encouraged chapters to be more proactive in promoting Duck Stamps.

Directors-At-Large: No reports.

Secretary: No report.

Treasurer: Mac McWhirter gave the Treasurer's report. He stated that TOS remains in excellent financial condition and had a good financial year in 2007.

Total dues from memberships were \$13,397 and investment income was \$7,508, contributing to revenues of \$21,854 for 2007. Expenses for the year were \$12,106. The excess of revenues over expenses for the year was \$9,748, but Mac noted that no Conservation and Research grant awards were made in 2007, so this surplus was artificially high. The Conservation and Research committee is active again, so grant requests should be forthcoming in the fall of 2008. The Conservation and Research Restricted Funds, held for specific future use, now total \$5,602. This fund has grown rapidly over the past two years from allocation of funds not awarded, investment income, and special designated gifts.

As of 31 December 2007, investments owned by TOS totaled \$226,305 and are now all placed with Vanguard Mutual Funds and allocated through different funds selected by the Finance Committee.

Membership totals for 2007 were down slightly from the prior year, with 739 regular memberships and 32 libraries and institutions. By comparison, in 2006 we had 762 regular memberships and 33 libraries and institutional members.

Curator/Website: Curator and Webmaster Chuck Nicholson reminded chapters to send officer updates to be posted on the web. He also encouraged members to submit detailed bird-finding guides for local birding sites, as these are popular and get a lot of use.

Dick Preston mentioned how useful the chapter page has been for the Memphis Chapter and encouraged other chapters to make use of this as a way of getting information out to existing and potential members.

Ron Hoff suggested that back issues of *The Migrant* should be raised to \$2 (from current \$1). Chuck pointed out that back issues, except for the last couple of years, are all available on the website. Mac noted that there are still some CDs of digital *Migrants*, but he said he had very few requests for these during the last year.

Migrant: Richard reported for *Migrant* Editor Chris Welsh, who was birding in Texas, that Chris is currently putting together the June 2007 issue. The September 2007 issue should follow relatively soon afterwards.

Tennessee Warbler Newsletter: Editor Theresa Graham announced that she would be accepting submissions for the August 2008 issue until 30 June.

Melinda Welton suggested that there should be an option to receive *The Warbler* by email. This would conserve paper and also save on postage costs. Mac responded that, while we have email addresses for members from some chapters, over all, we do not have current email records for many members. Chuck suggested that if we lowered the volume of our mailings, this might affect our 2nd class mail status, which might negate any savings in postage from the change. In the discussion that followed, some insisted that TOS should lead by example and try to conserve resources, even if we don't save money by doing so. Others voiced concern that this action might alienate members who either do not have internet access or who are more comfortable reading from paper rather than a computer screen.

Susan McWhirter moved that, beginning with the 2009 calendar year, TOS strongly urge members to opt for an email subscription to *The Tennessee Warbler* newsletter, in lieu of a paper copy, by providing their email address on the membership form. Ron Hoff seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

A notice to this effect will be posted in the last *Warbler* of the year, and it will also be included in the membership packet that Mac sends to the chapters at the end of the year. It was noted that this action would not affect paper delivery of *The Migrant*.

Nominating Committee: Committee members Susan McWhirter, Rack Cross, and Linda Kelly reported their nomination of Dick Preston as President-Elect of TOS.

Tennessee Bird Records Committee (TBRC): Dean Edwards, TBRC Secretary, sent the following report, which was read by Laura McCall: Current members of the Tennessee Bird Records Committee are Dean Edwards (Secretary), Kevin Calhoun, Mark Greene, John Henderson, Don Miller, Jan Shaw, and Phillip Casteel (alternate). None of the members' terms expire this term.

The TBRC is currently in the midst of the 2008 round of reviews for sighting reports. We are reviewing 28 reports including reports for Townsend's Solitaire (2 reports), Iceland and Sabine's Gulls, Pacific Loon, Calliope Hummingbird, White-faced Ibis, "Audubon's" Warbler (3 reports), MacGillivray's Warbler, and Common Redpoll, among several others. Also under review are first-breeding reports for Northern Harrier, Sedge Wren, and Pine Siskin. A report on the current round of reviews will appear in *The Migrant* and be announced at the Fall TOS Meeting.

The TBRC would like to thank everyone who submitted reports and encourage everyone to continue submitting reports of species that appear on the Review List, that are new to TN, or for which breeding in Tennessee has not been documented.

Conservation Policy Committee (CPC): Melinda Welton, Co-chair of the Conservation Policy Committee, presented a report of the Committee's activities in the past six months:

- Last November, TOS wrote letters urging Senators Alexander and Corker to support climate change legislation entitled America's Climate Security Act. To date, the bill has been introduced but not yet scheduled for a debate. Neither Alexander nor Corker has signed on as co-sponsors.

- In February, Melinda Welton represented TOS at the Bird Conservation Alliance meeting that was held in conjunction with the Partners in Flight International meeting in McAllen, Texas. She gave a short presentation on the 127,000-acre Cumberland Mountains land deal.

- In March, TOS signed on to a Bird Conservation Alliance letter urging Congress to maintain the ban on the highly toxic pesticide Carbofuran, despite pressure from pesticide manufacturer FMC Corporation and some members of Congress.

- TOS has signed on to a Bird Conservation Alliance letter requesting the withdrawal of the Western Oregon Plan Revisions draft EIS because the proposed actions in that plan do not reflect the best available science. This revision would

weaken or eliminate habitat protections for the Spotted Owl and Marbled Murrelet.

- In another Bird Conservation Alliance initiative, TOS pledged its support for a bill that would reauthorize the Neotropical Migratory Bird Conservation Act (NMBCA) at the increased level of \$20 million by 2015. The NMBCA is one of the most important pieces of legislation for the funding of migratory bird conservation. It provides millions of dollars in matching, competitive grants for monitoring, habitat restoration, education, and other projects in the United States, Canada, Latin America, and the Caribbean. The NMBCA originally passed with an authorization of \$5 million per year and began supporting projects in 2002. Its first appropriation was for \$3 million (\$2 million short of the authorized amount). Since then, funding for the program has been increased up to \$4.5 million each fiscal year. In 2006, Congress reauthorized the Act and increased its authorized funding from \$5 million to \$6.5 million, to be phased in over the next five years. Under the new reauthorization bill introduced by Kind and Gilchrest, the authorized funding would increase to \$20 million by 2015.

- At the April Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency (TWRA) Commission meeting, Mike Butler of the Tennessee Wildlife Federation (TWF) spoke about TWF's support for a hunting season on Sandhill Cranes. TWRA is very anxious to make sure that TOS has all of the facts about the process of creating a new hunting season. Over the past several weeks, the CPC has been gathering information on this issue so that TOS can develop a position on it.

Conservation And Research Funding Committee: No report.

Finance Committee: It was reported by President Richard Connors that Susan Hollyday had audited the financial records of TOS for the year ended 31 December 2007 as required by the bylaws. Her report to the President indicated all financial matters were in order.

The Finance Committee reported it had researched prices and comparative policies for liability insurance. It was reported that the most important protection at this time for the organization is Director's and Officer Liability (D&O) coverage. This insurance covers actions not only by the state officers and Board, but also extends to TOS's affiliate local chapter officers, hike leaders and volunteers. The policy will cost approximately \$1,250 per year and will also cover publications liability and carries a duty to defend clause. The Finance Committee recommended the coverage be obtained through Traveler's/St. Paul immediately. This matter was moved and seconded, and the motion passed, with one opposition.

The Finance Committee asked the Board to consider whether to continue financially supporting the Institute for Bird Population's MoSI monitoring station in 2008. After discussion, it was moved and seconded that TOS make a donation in 2008 in the amount of \$600, the same amount of support as in 2007. This motion passed unanimously.

Publications Committee: No report.

Collateral Materials: Donna Ward indicated that the TOS patches and decals, along with copies of J. Robinson's *Annotated Checklist of the Birds of Tennessee*, were available for sale at the back table.

TN-BIRD: No report.

Distinguished Service Award Committee: The committee currently consists of Theresa Graham and Ruth Luckado and is currently in search of a member to represent East Tennessee.

NEW BUSINESS

Dan Hicks, TWRA Region III Information Education Officer, gave a presentation about the Hiwassee Crane Festival, the problems that TWRA has been experiencing with Sandhill Cranes, and the proposed Sandhill Crane hunting season.

Hiwassee Crane Festival - TWRA is looking to get more involvement from TOS. TWRA has decided to move the date of the festival up to 8 November as the birds are eating the grain much faster, and this would also coincide with a break between the duck and deer hunting seasons. TWRA is no longer working with the Birchwood School on this event, and the agency is broadening the scope of the festival to include all wildlife. It will be called a Wildlife Festival instead of a Sandhill Crane Festival. TWRA is also interested in having some kind of a Birding Competition, in which teams from each chapter would compete, and they would like to have a dry-run of this at this year's Wildlife Festival.

Melinda Welton and Ron Hoff suggested that the festival might have broader appeal as a Nature Fest, instead of strictly a Wildlife Festival.

Problems with Sandhill Cranes at Hiwassee – TWRA is spending a great deal to feed the cranes and feels that the number of cranes has grown too large, and that too many resources are being taken away from their mission of managing the habitat for waterfowl hunting. The agency has received complaints from local farmers that the cranes are causing damage to their crops. TWRA feels that feeding the cranes may be encouraging large numbers to stay the entire winter at Hiwassee when they should be using the area simply as a stopover on their migration further south.

Sandhill Crane Hunting – Mr. Hicks indicated that TWRA does support Sandhill Crane hunting when the population can sustain it but noted that this is not strictly a TWRA decision; there is also input at the regional and federal levels (US Fish & Wildlife Service and Flyway Councils). The issue is a complex one. Within the Eastern population, there are 35,000-40,000 birds and growing. Both TWRA and USFWS will only support a hunting framework that will allow Sandhill populations to continue to increase and would incorporate contingency plans to prevent takes of Whooping Cranes. A management plan would have to be written by the Mississippi Flyway Council and approved by USFWS and the Atlantic Flyway Council as the first step. The draft management plan may be complete by Summer 2008. With this long approval process, a hunting season would be possible no sooner than 2010.

TWRA is currently projecting issuing permits to take about 200 birds.

The discussion that followed centered on why hunting is being considered when TWRA could instead stop feeding the cranes, which would encourage the birds to continue on their southward migration. This would solve the management problem and prevent damage to farmers' crops. Mr. Hicks indicated that the idea of a hunting season came from Tennessee Wildlife Federation because duck/geese hunters feel that they should be benefiting from the expenditures that TWRA has been making to support the Sandhill Cranes at Hiwassee and because waterfowl populations have been declining in the area. More questions followed, about whether the waterfowl decline was consistent with declines in other regions in the United States and whether TWRA had evidence that the decline here was due to Sandhill Cranes. Mr. Hicks responded that waterfowl breeding has been good up North, but we have not seen increases in waterfowl populations here.

There was also concern about how accidental shootings of Whooping Cranes would be prevented. To this, Mr. Hicks replied that hunters would be educated about the difference between Sandhills and Whooping Cranes so that there would be no mistakes.

Following the discussion, the Conservation Policy Committee presented a draft resolution on the matter: The Tennessee Ornithological Society does not at this time endorse a hunting season on Sandhill Cranes. While crop depredation may be a problem, we believe other management techniques to reduce depredation and slow the crane population growth should be fully implemented prior to the opening of crane hunting. These include active efforts to reduce the short-stopping and concentrating of cranes. We also support research on the economic impact of both crop depredation and crane-watching.

Ruth Luckado moved that the resolution be accepted by acclamation. The motion was seconded, and the resolution was accepted.

Location of Fall Meeting – Various locations were discussed for the Fall TOS Meeting. It was decided to have the meeting in Chattanooga, with the date to be announced later.

Location of Spring 2009 Meeting – The Spring 2009 TOS Meeting will be held in Middle Tennessee.

The meeting adjourned at 5:15 p.m.

TOS Annual Business Meeting

The TOS Annual Business Meeting was held at Meeman-Shelby State Park. Members were welcomed by Memphis TOS President Dick Preston, who thanked MTOS members for their hard work in making the meeting a success.

TOS President Richard Connors called the meeting to order at 7:35 p.m. Committee chairs or their representatives highlighted the reports of the Directors' Meeting, as recorded above.

Information about TWRA's discussion of Sandhill Crane hunting was relayed to the membership.

The Conservation Policy Committee announced TOS's position on Sandhill Crane hunting, as adopted at the Board of Directors' meeting: "The Tennessee Ornithological Society does not at this time endorse a hunting season on Sandhill Cranes. While crop depredation may be a problem, we believe other management techniques to reduce depredation and slow the crane population growth should be fully implemented prior to the opening of crane hunting. These include active efforts to reduce the short-stopping and concentrating of cranes. We also support research on the economic impact of both crop depredation and crane-watching."

TWRA will host a Wildlife Festival, which will take the place of the Sandhill Crane Festival, on 8 November 2008.

The Nominating Committee put forth Dick Preston as their nomination for President-Elect of TOS. Chuck Nicholson moved to close nominations. The move was seconded, and Dick Preston was elected as TOS President-Elect by acclamation.

Special TOS Distinguished Service Awards were presented to Virginia Reynolds, Knox Martin, and Neal Frisbie for their many years of service in the study and conservation of birds.

NEW BUSINESS

Amy Potter spoke to the members about the proposed development at Bell's Bend in Nashville. This is the site where two Whooping Cranes spent the winter this year.

Susan Hollyday spoke on behalf of Bob Hatcher about the 2008 Bald Eagle Commemorative Coin program.

The business meeting concluded at 8:15.

Following the business meeting, David Ziolkowski, Jr., program biologist for the North American Breeding Bird Survey (BBS) at Patuxent Wildlife Research Center, spoke on the BBS effort in Tennessee and discussed current trends among Tennessee birds.

TOS DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARDS: NEAL FRISBIE, KNOX MARTIN & VIRGINIA REYNOLDS

Neal Frisbie

Neal Frisbie was awarded the Tennessee Ornithological Society's (TOS) Distinguished Service Award at the 2008 Spring Meeting for the countless hours he has spent helping the Eastern Bluebird thrive in Lawrence County and in many other parts of Tennessee. He has been an enthusiastic, faithful member of TOS for about ten years and brings in new members often. He has bluebird nesting boxes from the East Coast to the West Coast and to the north and south of Lawrenceburg, Tennessee.

Neal Frisbie, member of Buffalo River Chapter of TOS, is truly "Mr. Bluebird." It all started in 1977 with a simple request from his daughter Nelia to help build a bluebird box. He went to the library and looked up information on how to build bluebird boxes. He made two for her and has not stopped since. In 1981, Neal began placing bluebird box trails in various parts of Lawrence County. Today, he has 44 boxes at David Crockett State Park in Lawrenceburg, 12 at his cabin and land beside the Buffalo River in the Salem Community, seven at Cardinal Place, a subdivision, and 18 at the Lawrenceburg Golf and Country Club, a total of 81 boxes. As a measure of Neal's impact on local bluebird populations, consider in 2007 he had 81 boxes in Lawrence County that produced 297 eggs in 63 nests.

From 1981 until fall of 2000, Neal made 2300 bluebird nesting boxes and kept a record of every box made and the name and address of the people who received them. He rarely takes any cash donations unless he is low on nails and screws, and almost all the wood is donated by Parkes Lumber Company and Lindsey Manufacturing Company in Lawrenceburg. He says he wants to give bluebird nesting boxes away

as long as people will take care of them and monitor them. In addition to bluebird boxes, Neal has branched out to build boxes for Tree Swallows and Wood Ducks.

Neal's design of the Eastern Bluebird nesting box is probably the ultimate box. He has made about eight or ten designs of his own, plus the Petersen box and the Kentucky slot box. His latest design will last around 20 years. He uses Western Cedar, Southern Red Cedar, and Redwood for the sides and bottom, Poplar for the door and exterior plywood for the roof, covering it with asphalt shingles. He has devised a way to put PVC in the entrance hole, which discourages woodpeckers and squirrels from chewing the hole. Since he started using the PVC, none of his boxes have been chewed or enlarged. The boxes are practically indestructible. He recently retired a 27-year old box at David Crockett State Park.


Although he is especially fond of the Eastern Bluebird, Neal loves all birds and has made cut outs of several local species of birds for a children's wooden playground at Lawrenceburg's Rotary Park. TOS members of Buffalo River Chapter painted the cutouts in correct plumage. Neal has helped a church's children's group make nesting boxes and would be glad to work with any organization that wants his help on projects relating to birds, especially bluebird nesting boxes.

Knox Martin

What is the proper response when your employer indicates that the place is not big enough for the two of you and the work you find most rewarding? If you are Knox Martin, an employee of the Memphis Zoo, you know you must find a way to continue doing what you feel is important. And so he did!

Knox is indelibly identified with raptor rehabilitation. A zoo employee for more than twenty-one years, Knox was involved in, and soon assumed control of, the raptor rehabilitation program of the zoo. But, in 2003 a new direction was needed when the zoo felt they could no longer continue the rehabilitation program. At that point Knox established the Mid-South Raptor Center on land made available at the Agricultural Center in Shelby Farms.

The Center received financial assistance from the Zoo for the first couple of years to construct the basic building. Knox remains a full time employee at the zoo, yet operates the Center and is responsible for finding funding for

maintenance, operations and expansion. Since the beginning of his two decades of work in rehabilitation, it is estimated that nearly 4,000 birds have been taken in for treatment.

Perhaps he should be considered a foster grandfather to dozens of eagles and Mississippi Kites reintroduced to west Tennessee, having worked with the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency and the Memphis Chapter of the Tennessee Ornithological Society (MTOS) to successfully hack Bald Eagles at Reelfoot Lake and release thousands of young Mississippi Kites in counties of west Tennessee.

A member of MTOS for 22 years, he is one of the most active — leading hikes, giving programs and working on projects. Knox is in his 13th year as Chapter recording secretary. He was part of the project to Atlas the Breeding Birds of Tennessee, and he has contributed articles to *The Migrant* and the *Tennessee Conservationist*. He served three terms, 1997-2003, as Recording Secretary for the TOS.

Knox is a tireless circuit speaker. Since Memphis is the hub for northern Mississippi and eastern Arkansas, his efforts extend there also, especially at Strawberry Plains, the Mississippi Audubon Center in Holly Springs. Knox is also a featured speaker for Tennessee State Parks at Reelfoot Lake and the Lake County Chamber of Commerce Eagle Festival. Most significantly, he has presented hundreds of programs, often using live birds for added excitement, at the zoo, garden clubs, churches, scout meetings and civic organizations. By his untiring efforts, well over 10,000 children and adults have been entertained, educated and given a new appreciation of the world of birds.

For his long-standing contributions to TOS, MTOS, and bird conservation and education in Tennessee and surrounding states, Knox was awarded the TOS Distinguished Service Award at the 2008 TOS Spring Meeting.

Virginia Reynolds

The Tennessee Ornithological Society (TOS) gained a real dynamo when Virginia Reynolds joined the Memphis Chapter (MTOS) in 1981 after she and husband Tom moved to Memphis. Already an accomplished birder, and never one to sit quietly on the sidelines, she immediately became active in all facets of the Memphis Chapter.

She became a regular leader on Chapter hikes, was a member of the Wednesday ladies' birding group, ran a breeding bird survey for many years, and participated in forays and in

numerous Christmas Counts in Tennessee, Arkansas, and Mississippi. She was an active participant in all six years of the Tennessee Breeding Birds Atlas project, and assisted in the Mississippi and Arkansas Atlas projects also. When the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency and MTOS began hacking eagles at Reelfoot Lake, she became an enthusiastic participant for the duration.

Her term as Vice-President of the Memphis Chapter and program chairperson produced interesting and informative speakers. She served as President of the Chapter 1999 to 2001. She serves as a contact person for visiting out-of-town birders, giving advice on birding hot spots as well as often accompanying the visitors. She has been an effective ambassador for TOS to the local community, giving numerous talks to diverse groups, and as a certified Master Gardener, has combined her knowledge of plants and birds to stress the importance of backyard habitats.

Conservation and the preservation of birding habitat has always been one of Virginia's major interests. She was the Chapter Conservation Chairperson, and is active in the Shelby Farms, Sierra Club and Wolf River organizations, serving as Treasurer and a Board Member of the Wolf River Conservancy.

Virginia has served the Society at many levels. She was Chairperson of the committee to revise the By-Laws of the TOS Constitution in 1996. She was a State Director on three different occasions, and was Vice-President for West Tennessee 1989 to 1991. In 2003 she was elected to serve a two-year term as President of the Society.

Thanks to her enthusiastic efforts on the behalf of birds, birding, and birders in Tennessee, Virginia was awarded the TOS Distinguished Service Award at the 2008 TOS Spring Meeting.

THE 2008 TENNESSEE CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNTS

The 2008 Tennessee Christmas Bird Count (CBC) season was the 65th consecutive compilation of CBCs in Tennessee, and the 78th overall (no count was reported for 1943). Whooping Cranes, though not countable, were found on three counts this year. This year's results produced 155 species (the record is 163, in 2003), plus two more found during the count week (cw = three days before and three days after the actual count date, but not on count day). Laughing Gull (found on two counts), Clay-colored Sparrow (count week only), and Chestnut-collared Longspur were all new species for this year's CBC compilation, bringing the all-time species count for the Tennessee CBC compilation to 259 (plus seven count week species). This season, 506 observers put in 1,549 party hours and located 547,574 individuals (Table 1).

Sixteen species were represented by a lone individual. The weather throughout the CBC season varied as usual with many counts experiencing some form of rain (at times very heavy) and several counts having windy conditions that impacted their counts. Temperatures ranged from a frigid 8° F at Shady Valley to a balmy 72° F at Buffalo River. Some other highlights included 28 of the possible 31 species of waterfowl (missing only Tundra Swan, Black Scoter, and Long-tailed Duck), Red-throated Loon (first record in 11 years), Rough-legged Hawk, Black-legged Kittiwake, Lesser Black-backed Gull (cw), Forster's Tern, Ruby-throated Hummingbird, Blue-headed Vireo, Gray Catbird, Common Yellowthroat, and Western Meadowlark. Notable misses included American Bittern, Green Heron, Osprey, Peregrine Falcon (only the second miss in the last 15 years), and Red Crossbill (first miss in 14 years).

The following species were recorded in record or unusually high numbers for this compilation: Snow Goose, Bufflehead, Black Vulture, Merlin, Eastern Phoebe, Hermit Thrush, Cedar Waxwing, Lapland Longspur (8550; previous high was 3001), and American Goldfinch.

The following species were recorded in record or unusually low numbers for this compilation: Wilson's Snipe (lowest total since 1970) and American Tree Sparrow (lowest total since 1982).

New record high totals for any individual CBC ever in Tennessee were as follows: Snow Goose/Reelfoot – 20,206; Gadwall-Cross Creeks NWR – 16,132; Black Vulture/Clarksville – 689; Merlin/Savannah – 3 (tie); Eastern Phoebe/Savannah – 37; Hermit Thrush/White Co. – 105; Orange-crowned Warbler/Memphis – 6 (tie); and Lapland Longspur/Reelfoot – 8,550.

COUNT SUMMARIES

BLEDSOE COUNTY (35° 40' N, 85° 10' 40" W) – 29 December 2008; 0430-1745. Weather: clear all day with wind W 0-5 mph; 27-48° F. This count was a Christmas

bird count blitz, but it is not an official Audubon CBC. It does, however, follow CBC rules and stays within a 15-mile diameter circle. Count highlights included two non-countable Whooping Cranes (found in a cow pasture near Brushy Cemetery, north of Ninemile Road), Horned Lark, Red-breasted Nuthatch, House Wren, American Pipit, Fox Sparrow, and Rusty Blackbird. BRISTOL (36° 35' N, 82° 06' W) – 28 December 2008; 0715-1730. Weather: cloudy all day, with light rain and winds 0-24 mph; 48-60° F. This count was first held in 1931. The total of 84 species found this year is in line with the recent 10-yr average of 82.9. The count record is 91, set in 2004. Notable highlights included Redhead, Ruffed Grouse, Eared Grebe, Merlin, Loggerhead Shrike, Brown-headed Nuthatch (first ever recorded between Roanoke, Virginia and Knoxville, Tennessee), and Palm Warbler (cw). BUFFALO RIVER (35° 18' N, 87° 28' W) – 27 December 2008; 0530-1710. Weather: partly cloudy all day with winds S 10-25 mph; 59-72° F. High winds throughout the day kept bird activity low. Notable sightings included Wild Turkey, Merlin, 16 Loggerhead Shrikes, Red-breasted Nuthatch, Pine Warbler, and Lapland Longspur. Species found in record high numbers included Red-shouldered Hawk, Killdeer, Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Cedar Waxwing, Yellow-rumped Warbler, and Chipping Sparrow. Species found in record low numbers included Northern Harrier, Red-tailed Hawk, Belted Kingfisher, Downy Woodpecker, Northern Flicker, Pileated Woodpecker, Carolina Chickadee, Savannah Sparrow, Fox Sparrow, White-throated Sparrow, Northern Cardinal, and Red-winged Blackbird. Notable misses included Barn Owl (although fresh pellets were found). CADES COVE (35° 36' N, 83° 50' W) – 28 December 2008; 0700-1730. Weather: cloudy all day with some heavy rain in the morning; 46-56° F. This was the 10th consecutive year for this CBC. This was the 3rd year in a row the count was affected by weather, as moderate to heavy rain fell until around 10 a.m. A Brown-headed Nuthatch, found at the Top-of-the-World community, was a new species for this count, bringing the all-time species total for this CBC to 93. Count Highlights included Common Raven, Brown-headed Nuthatch, Pine Warbler, Fox Sparrow, and Purple Finch. Record high numbers were recorded for Gadwall, Bufflehead,

The total of 73 species was slightly above the past 20 year average of 72. The all-time high count for this CBC was 79 (1995 & 2001). A LeConte's Sparrow represented a first record for this count and just the 5th record in the five county area. Record low numbers were tallied for Downy Woodpecker, Hairy Woodpecker, Carolina Chickadee, Tufted Titmouse, White-breasted Nuthatch, Dark-eyed Junco, and Northern Cardinal. 
SHADY VALLEY – MOUNTAIN CITY (36° 30' N, 81° 51' W) – 1 January 2009; 0530-1700. Weather: sunny all day with winds NW 5-10 mph; 8-48° F. This year's total of 64 species was a bit above the past 10-year average of 60.4. This is the 12th year for this count, and the 20 observers represented a record high number. Notable count highlights included Ruffed Grouse, American Pipit, Fox Sparrow, Rusty Blackbird, and Purple Finch. Species appearing in all-time high numbers for this count were Mallard, Wood Duck (tie), Red-shouldered Hawk, Red-tailed Hawk (tie), Northern Flicker, Blue Jay, Common Raven (tie), Winter Wren, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Hermit Thrush, and Pine Siskin. THE WINTER SEASON

Goose numbers statewide are still on the increase. Two Trumpeter Swans in Dyer County represented the fourth modern record in Tennessee, with all originating from reintroduction programs to the north. Scoters and Long-tailed Ducks were found in all four regions this winter. A trio of Northern Goshawks in Sullivan County was remarkable, while another was seen in Obion County. The new eastern population of Whooping Cranes seems to be doing rather well, with reports from four counties away from their regular stop-over site at Hiwassee Refuge. Among gulls, immature kittiwakes were found on opposite ends of the state.

The star attraction this season was the Snowy Owl at Spring Hill in Maury County, which delighted hundreds of birders during its stay. Remarkably, this bird had been present for nearly a month and a half before it was discovered by the birding community. Although about the twelfth state record, this was just the third to be found in Tennessee since 1961; the other two occurred in 1987 (*Migrant* 59:28-29) and 2001 (*Migrant* 73:39).

Chestnut-collared Longspurs put in a brief appearance in Lake County, providing the first state record. Other passerine rarities included Smith's Longspur and Snow Bunting in West Tennessee, "Pink-sided" Dark-eyed Junco and Western Meadowlark in Middle Tennessee, and Clay-colored Sparrow in East Tennessee. Besides the expected Yellow-rumped and Pine Warblers, six other species of warblers were observed in the state this winter. Palm Warblers were reported from at least 16 counties and in all four regions. Pine Siskins were present in large numbers statewide.

WESTERN COASTAL PLAIN REGION — The season was marked by generally above average temperatures and higher than usual rainfall. Two major weather events impacted the region. First was a late January ice storm which caused severe and widespread damage across six northwestern counties (Dyer, Gibson, Henry, Lake, Obion, and Weakley), as well as areas in Missouri and Kentucky. The storm caused a fallout of several northern wanderers in Obion County. The last day of the period saw the onset of a freak late-season snow storm which blanketed the entire region with 4 - 14 inches, the most in nearly four decades.

The initial month of 2009 had below average temperatures and was slightly wetter than usual. February had significantly above normal temperatures, but precipitation for the month dipped by 25%. During the three winter months, more than a trace of snow fell on only four days, totaling less than two inches at the airport.

CUMBERLAND PLATEAU / RIDGE & VALLEY REGION — Temperatures fluctuated widely this winter, with periods of both near-record cold and near-record warmth. The overall trend was of slightly below average temperatures. This season was the first in two years to have a surplus of precipitation, although February failed to reach its normal amount. Only a few dustings of snowfall occurred.

The four species of Arctic-nesting geese continue to increase in numbers in the region. Not that long ago, any sighting of White-fronted Goose in East Tennessee was noteworthy; this winter they were reported from seven counties. Although the first state record of Ross's Goose occurred in 1986, the first in this region was not found until 1997; thus, reports of this diminutive white goose from eight counties this winter were impressive. Numbers of Snow Geese were up, too. Reports of Cackling Goose came from four counties as birders scanned flocks of Canada Geese for this recently-split form. Other waterbird highlights this winter were Red-throated Loon (three reports), Pacific Loon (regional first), Western Grebe, and Black-legged Kittiwake.

Winter sightings of ravens continue to increase in the northeastern-most counties in the region, while Fish Crows were found again at Knoxville. Noteworthy lingerers this winter included Green Heron, Osprey, Spotted Sandpiper (three reports), Common Nighthawk, Northern Rough-winged Swallow, Yellow-throated Warbler, Prairie Warbler, Ovenbird, and Summer Tanager. Pine Siskin numbers were the largest in nearly two decades. However, aside from a few Purple Finches, other boreal irruptives were absent.
