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FIRST TENNESSEE RECORD OF VIRGINIA'S WARBLER

A Virginia's Warbler (*Oreothlypis virginiae*) was discovered by Bambi Fincher and Sherrie Quillen on 19 January 2019 at Riverfront Park along the South Holston River in Kingsport, Sullivan County, Tennessee. Quillen obtained a series of photographs that day. These observers did not immediately recognize the warbler, noting that it superficially resembled a Nashville Warbler (*Oreothlypis ruficapilla*) with its bold white eye ring, but was gray overall with much less yellow on the undersides. Fincher and Quillen considered Virginia's Warbler as a possible identification, but realized an individual of that species would have been very far out of range. They were concerned that it might be a pale immature Nashville Warbler instead. Photos were sent to me by email, and I instantly recognized it as a Virginia's Warbler, a species with which I have some field experience. I went to the site the following morning (20 January) and soon relocated the bird, observing it for 15 minutes in good light at close range.

The following description is based on some of Quillen's later photos (Figures 1 and 2) and my notes made over several days of observation. This was a smallish warbler. The plumage was largely gray above and below, lacking any hint of green on the back or wings. It had a complete bold white eye ring and a faint rufous crown patch. Yellow in the plumage was restricted to a small patch of dull yellow in the center of the breast, bright yellow undertail coverts, and a pale yellowish rump. It is often difficult to determine the age and gender of Virginia's Warbler, as the males and females are very similar (Dunn and Garrett 1997, Pyle 1997). The males tend to have more yellow on the breast and more rufous in the crown. Therefore, I lean toward the Kingsport bird being a male, but of uncertain age.

The warbler was very active while foraging, often pumping its tail up and down. It gave frequent sharp chip notes. It mostly foraged in low vegetation consisting of shrubs, vines, and lower tree branches along the river. It seldom ventured higher than 4-5 m above ground,

even dropping to the ground to forage in short grass. During its stay the Virginia's Warbler sometimes loosely associated with a mixed flock of other warblers and Ruby-crowned Kinglets (*Regulus calendula*), but it often stayed by itself. Occasionally it was chased by Yellow-rumped Warblers (*Setophaga coronata*). The Virginia's Warbler was seen through 2 February 2019 by an estimated 150+ birders. Additional photos are available at eBird. This warbler endured sub-freezing temperatures overnight several times in January, plus light snowfall on 29 January. On colder days it was more reliably seen close to the water's edge taking advantage of the milder microclimate there. It appeared to be foraging successfully, even on the coldest days. This sighting of Virginia's Warbler represents the first record for Tennessee, pending acceptance by the Tennessee Bird Records Committee.

Virginia's Warblers inhabit western North America, breeding in the southern Rocky Mountains and the mountain ranges of the Great Basin; they spend the winter in western Mexico (Dunn and Garrett 1997). They are casual migrants through the western Great Plains, but are very rare vagrants in the East. There are approximately 26 records from

14 states or Canadian provinces east of the Mississippi River, plus one from the Bahamas (Dunn and Garrett 1997, seasonal summaries in *North American Birds* 1997-2018). The ones nearest to Tennessee were from West Virginia, Georgia, and Alabama. Thus, the sighting in Tennessee is remarkable.

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UNUSUAL WINTER CONCENTRATION OF WARBLERS IN NORTHEAST TENNESSEE

Numerous birders searching for a vagrant Virginia's Warbler at Riverfront Park in Kingsport, Sullivan County, Tennessee, during late January 2019 found 12 species of warblers (see list below) within a 1.6 km section of this linear park. All but one were documented by photographs. This remarkable concentration of warblers in a relatively small area during winter is unprecedented in the state. That this concentration occurred in late January is particularly noteworthy.

Riverfront Park is a section of the city's greenbelt that runs alongside the South Holston River. This linear park is roughly 15-30 m wide with a paved walkway down the middle. Bordering the river is a broken line of deciduous trees (mostly sycamore [*Platanus occidentalis*] and box-elder [*Acer negundo*]), a few small shrubs (including privet [*Ligustrum vulgare*]), some vines (including Japanese honeysuckle [*Lonicera japonica*] and English ivy [*Hedera helix*]) and forbs. Much of the park is covered in short grass, with a few trees scattered throughout. A busy street runs along the other edge of the greenbelt. The river creates a slightly milder microclimate along the shoreline, thus providing better foraging opportunities for insectivorous birds. This increased foraging potential certainly played a role in the concentration of these warblers. This was particularly important on 21 January when temperatures dipped to -13°C. Several other nights also experienced sub-freezing temperatures. A light snow fell on 29 January. During these coldest times the warblers mostly foraged in low vegetation within a few meters of the water's edge. On several days during this period, hatches of small flies (Diptera) were observed along the river edge. Many warblers were observed successfully gleaning these or some other type of small insects from the vegetation (R. Knight, pers. obs.).

Although 41 species of warblers are known from Tennessee, 36 as regular breeders or migrants and five others as vagrants, few of these species occur here during the winter. Only three species overwinter widely in the state: Yellow-rumped, Palm, and Pine warblers, with Orange-crowned Warbler wintering locally in small numbers. Common Yellowthroat occurs rarely in winter and another 18 eastern warblers are regarded as accidental visitors to the state in winter, most with five or fewer winter records and most only in December (Somershoe and Sloan 2015). Thus, it would seem rather unlikely that more than four or five warbler species could be encountered at any site within a short time span during winter, especially in late January. So the discovery of 12 warbler species during a two-week span in late January is quite remarkable. Up to nine species per day were seen at Riverfront Park during this event (R. Knight, pers. obs.).

The twelve warbler species found in Kingsport during late January 2019, with notations on their winter status in the state:

Orange-crowned Warbler (*Oreothlypis celata*): 16 January - 10 February (1-4, possibly up to 6) seen by multiple observers. Photo on eBird: checklist S51918169 by Michael Todd. Uncommon to rare winter resident in the state (Somershoe and Sloan 2015), but showing a recent increase in winter records in East Tennessee (R. Knight pers. obs.). Most winter

records in the state are of one or two birds, so the high number reported here is impressive.

Nashville Warbler (*Oreothlypis ruficapilla*): 22 / 25 January and 9-10 February (1) seen by multiple observers. Photos on eBird: checklist S51929700 by Evan Buck and checklist S52535984 by Sherrie Quillen. There are two previous winter records in the state, both in December (Somershoe and Sloan 2015) (Figure 1).

Virginia's Warbler (*Oreothlypis virginiae*): 19 January - 2 February (1) found by Bambi Fincher and Sherrie Quillen, and then seen by many observers during its stay. First state record of this western species, and one of very few ever found in eastern North America (Knight 2019b). Photos on eBird: checklist S51862102 by Sherrie Quillen and checklist S51918169 by Michael Todd.

Common Yellowthroat (*Geothlypis trichas*): 22 January - 11 February (1 female), seen by multiple observers. Photo on eBird: checklist S52354121 by Ron Carrico. Regarded as a rare winter visitor statewide. There are at least 11 previous winter records in northeast Tennessee (Knight 2008).

American Redstart (*Setophaga ruticilla*): 26 January - 2 February (1 immature male) seen by many observers. Photos on eBird: checklist S52053954 by Colin Sumrall. There are four previous winter records in the state, all in December (Somershoe and Sloan 2015).

Cape May Warbler (*Setophaga tigrina*): 22-23 January (1 female) and 26-27 January / 10 February (1 male), both seen by several observers. Photos on eBird: checklist S51929700 (the female) by Evan Buck; checklist S52079020 (the male) by Ron Carrico. There are eight previous winter records in the state spread throughout the season (Robinson 1990, Somershoe and Sloan 2015).

Northern Parula (*Setophaga americana*): 20 January - 2 February (1 male) seen by multiple observers. Photo on eBird: checklist S51876689 by Adrianna Nelson. There are three previous winter records in the state, all in December, including two earlier this winter (Somershoe and Sloan 2015, Knight 2019c).

Yellow Warbler (*Setophaga petechia*): 20 January (1 female) adequate description by single observer (Kevin Brooks). There are four previous winter records in the state, all in December or the first week of January (Somershoe and Sloan 2015; Zipperer 2015, 2017).

Palm Warbler (*Setophaga palmarum*): 19 January - 28 February (1-7, all of the nominate Western subspecies) seen and photographed by many observers. This is an occasional to uncommon winter visitor statewide.

Pine Warbler (*Setophaga pinus*): 20 January - 10 February (1-2) seen by multiple observers. Photo on eBird: checklist S51994400 by Victor Stoll. Fairly common year-round resident in most of the state, but rare in winter in northeast Tennessee (Knight 2008).

Yellow-rumped Warbler (*Setophaga coronata*): Throughout the season (10 to 50+ daily). This is a fairly common winter resident statewide.

Prairie Warbler (*Setophaga discolor*): 21 January (1) seen by two observers, photo by Ron Hoff confirmed by the author. There are four previous winter records in the state, all in December (Somershoe and Sloan 2015).

Most of these warblers were not seen after early February. Birding effort at this site declined significantly after the Virginia's Warbler disappeared, but a few local birders continued to monitor the site from early February into spring. Only Palm and Yellow-rumped warblers were found after mid February.

Of the 12 species of warblers found at Riverfront Park, six are accidental in Tennessee during winter (not counting the vagrant Virginia's Warbler): Nashville, Cape May, Yellow, and Prairie warblers, plus American Redstart and Northern Parula (Somershoe and Sloan 2015). These six are Neotropical migrants that typically winter south of the United States. Small numbers of Northern Parula and Prairie Warbler regularly overwinter in Florida, and all six species may rarely occur during winter elsewhere along the Gulf coast or southern Atlantic coast of the U.S. (Dunn and Garrett 1997). Exceptional winter records of these six species are known from other areas in the eastern U.S., mostly early in the season.

Unusual, in addition to these warblers, was a Blue-gray Gnatcatcher (*Poliioptila caerulea*) at Riverfront Park during 20 January - 2 February. This species is a rare winter visitor to the state (Somershoe and Sloan 2015).

Although the microclimate in the riparian strip had a concentrating effect, what brought this assemblage of warblers to northeast Tennessee in midwinter? Had they been present at this site or in the vicinity earlier in the winter? Were they late autumn holdovers, like the surprising number of lingering Neotropical migrants seen during November 2018 in East Tennessee (Knight 2019a)? There were no obvious weather anomalies that might account for the presence of these warblers in late January.

The warbler concentration in Kingsport reported here is reminiscent of a phenomenon observed at a small downtown park in Atlanta, Georgia, in November and December 2009 in which numerous late migrants, mostly warblers, were found well past their normal departure dates (Blankenship and Farnau 2009). Light pollution as an attractant was one theory presented as an explanation; however, light pollution was not an issue at Riverfront Park in Kingsport. Furthermore, the concentration in Kingsport was found much later in winter than the one in Atlanta.

Whatever the cause, the winter warbler concentration at Riverfront Park in Kingsport was an extraordinary event.

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BOOK REVIEW — BIRD COUNT

Bird Count. Susan Edwards Richmond, 2019, Peachtree Publishing Company, Inc., 31 pages.

This is not a book one expects to see reviewed in an ornithological journal. It isn't a new field guide or scientific study, but a children's book. For a parent or grandparent who has ever tried to explain to a child what you do when you bundle up and head outdoors with binoculars in hand, this is the book you need. Or, if you are looking for something to spark children's interest in birding, this would be excellent for any elementary schoolroom or children's library.

Bird Count tells of a little girl's experience as she joins her mother and a friend on a Christmas Bird Count. It gives a very accurate description of the count and count methods in a way that is easily understandable to a child as it follows this team throughout the day. It also conveys her excitement and joy as she identifies and tallies the birds. The book is beautifully illustrated by Stephanie Fizer Coleman and shows accurate depictions of the species.

My copy of *Bird Count* was given to me by a friend who is not a birder, but who knows of my birding interests and remembers an aunt participating in bird counts. She says this is now the book her grandchildren request more than any other, and that they have learned to identify many of the birds illustrated. I believe that for many children this book could be the spark that ignites the passion we feel for birds and brings future birders into the fold.

ROUND TABLE NOTE

COMMON LOON FALLOUT ON FORT CAMPBELL, KENTUCKY AND TENNESSEE — Fort Campbell Fish and Wildlife Program received phone calls 14-20 November 2018 to pick up injured Common Loons (*Gavia immer*) on Campbell Army Airfield (Christian County, Kentucky), Sabre Army Airfield (Montgomery County, Tennessee), and a few roads/parking lots across the installation. A total of 16 loons were retrieved and released into Lake Kyle (Stewart County). Lake Kyle is the largest body of water on Fort Campbell providing enough space for their long takeoff. Most of the loons exhibited only superficial wounds and a few missing feathers. All the loons appeared to be in good health once they were released (i.e. swimming and diving normally).

Loons are almost incapable of movement on land and cannot take off from land due to their heavy weight and positioning of their legs so far back underneath their body. Therefore when these loons were grounded from the storm on surfaces resembling water (ramps, runways, and parking lots), they were stranded.

This loon fallout occurred after Winter Storm Avery brought rain, freezing rain, sleet, and snow to the northern middle Tennessee area on 13-14 November. Loons were reported from other locations in the Montgomery County area as well, including Dunbar Cave State Park, Outlaw Field Airport, and the wetland at Trenton Road/Highway 374 intersection.

2019 TENNESSEE SPRING BIRD COUNTS

Eight counts were conducted this year. Two hundred twenty observers put in just over 462 party hours to record 208 species and 43,935 individual birds. Every count this year was impacted by rain, sometimes heavy enough to end the count earlier than normal. Owling effort in the state amounted to 5.17 hours. Temperatures ranged from a cool 50°F in Nashville to 88° F in Shelby County. Highlights included Ruffed Grouse, Virginia Rail, Upland Sandpiper, Northern Saw-whet-Owl, Olive-sided and Yellow-bellied flycatchers, Western Kingbird, Bell's Vireo, and all the warblers except Connecticut.

The counts in the table are arranged geographically from west to east.

Taxonomic order follows the American Ornithological Society (AOS) Checklist of North and Middle American Birds, 59th supplement (2018) to the AOU Checklist.

MINUTES OF THE SPRING BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

27 April 2019
Nashville, Tennessee

The annual Spring meeting was held 27 - 28 April in Nashville and hosted by the Nashville Chapter. Field trips for the weekend were offered to Radnor Lake, Bells Bend, Timberland, and the Burch Reserve at Warner Park. The Board of Directors meeting was held at the Nashville Zoo at Grassmere on Saturday 27 April.

President Steve Routledge called the meeting to order at 2:03 pm. Secretary Cyndi Routledge determined a quorum was met. The minutes of the Fall 2018 meeting were accepted as corrected.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS, DIRECTORS AT LARGE and PUBLICATIONS

Treasurer - Pam Lasley reported that assets for the society at the end of 2018 were \$353,196, including cash of \$9,868; fair market value of our Vanguard investments is \$342,181. The year saw our investments experience a net decline of \$1,051 due to overall markets plummeting in the last quarter of the year. By the end of the first quarter of 2019 our market value had more than recovered, with an increase of \$22,407.

Total revenue for the year was \$12,837, roughly 88% of that from memberships and subscriptions. Total expenses were \$22,694. Publications and communications, at \$15,133, is our largest expense and includes four issues of *The Migrant*, *The Warbler* newsletter, website maintenance, and the deposit for our website design. We disbursed \$2,440 for research grants and printed 5000 *Discover Birds Activity Books* for \$3,000. Insurance cost \$997. Overall, the net excess of expenses over revenue was \$9,857.

Total memberships and subscriptions were down slightly, with memberships totaling 630, down 10 from 2017.

As noted above, our investments had a good year until the last quarter. Dividends and interest for 2018 were \$15,218 but a loss in market value of \$16,179 netted us a slight loss. At March 31 our portfolio had risen to \$361,659 even after an operating transfer of \$5,000 that month. In 2018 we distributed \$10,000 to our operating cash account for the year. Returns are 7.7% for 1 year return, 3 year annualized is 8.9%, 5 year is 6.9%, and 10 year annualized return on investments is 9.2%. The portfolio remains defensively structured with approximately 46% in equity positions.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Conservation Policy Committee – Co-chair Dick Preston reported the work done by the committee since the last state meeting, and the report was placed on file.

Conservation Research Funding – Chair Michael Collins reported the funding of all four proposals received this year for a total of \$6,068. These are the study of the ecology of Barn Owls, migrating cuckoos, parental investment in Prothonotary Warblers, and banding Saw-whet Owls.

Educational Grants Subcommittee – Three projects were funded this year. These were a raptor education and rescue program at Hiwassee/Ocoee State Park, a rural busing program for schoolchildren to support Friends of Tennessee National Wildlife Refuge and Cross Creeks National Wildlife Refuge, and educational signage at the Kingsport Greenbelt.

TNBird – Rob Biller, who replaces Andy Jones, and Dave Worley are the TNBird moderators.

Nominating Committee – Committee chair Susan McWhirter placed in nomination the following slate of officers:

President – Danny Gaddy

Vice Presidents – Dick Preston, West; Danny Shelton, Middle; and Chris Welsh, East

Secretary – Cyndi Routledge

Treasurer – Pam Lasley

Directors-at-Large – Allan Trently, West; Mac McWhirter, Middle; Susan Hubley, East

This passed unanimously.

OLD BUSINESS

Ashley Heeney reported that all the navigation and organizational structures for the new website are in place, and the visual and basic content is being reviewed and organizes. Ron Hoff made the motion that Bob Ford, editor of *The Migrant*, be given approval to develop a proposal for digital/electronic access to *The Migrant*. Motion passed.



THE WINTER SEASON

Richard L. Knight, Editor



1 December 2018 - 28 February 2019

Temperatures were on the mild side this season, particularly in February. Copious rainfall, especially in February, caused flooding in many areas across the state.

A Virginia's Warbler in Kingsport provided the first state record and one of few sightings in eastern North America. A Western Tanager spent its second consecutive winter in Wilson County. Rarities in West Tennessee included Common Ground-Dove, Little and Iceland gulls, and Say's Phoebe. Three separate Eurasian Wigeon drakes were found in the mid-state. You would think a hen had to be hidden among the other wigeons, albeit difficult to distinguish from its American relatives. Red-necked Grebe, Harris's Sparrow, and Yellow-headed Blackbird appeared in two regions. Boreal irruptives were represented by widespread Red-breasted Nuthatches and Purple Finches, smaller numbers of Pine Siskins, a few American Tree Sparrows in West and Middle Tennessee, and two separate female Evening Grosbeaks.

Most seasons seem to have a theme. For this winter the theme clearly was of lingering Neotropical migrant passerines. Among these were Eastern Wood-Pewee (2 reports), White-eyed Vireo (3), Yellow-throated Vireo, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher (4), Baltimore Oriole (4), Summer Tanager (3), and Indigo Bunting. More amazing, 18 species of warblers were observed this winter, of which 11 species were completely unexpected: Black-and-white (2), Tennessee (4), Nashville (2), Cape May (2), Magnolia, Yellow, Prairie, Canada, and Wilson's warblers, plus American Redstart and Northern Parula (3). Four species represented first winter records for the state: Eastern Wood-Pewee, Yellow-throated Vireo, and Magnolia and Canada warblers. Some winters might produce a couple of these lingerers, but to have this many in one winter seems to defy conventional wisdom. What was driving this event? Surely it was more than just the milder weather, as we have experienced other winters that were as mild, yet without this high number of lingering songbirds.

WESTERN COASTAL PLAIN REGION - - Temperatures and precipitation across the region fell within normal ranges in December and January. However, February temperatures were 3.5 degrees above normal and rainfall was 4.5 inches greater than normal. The Mississippi River reached flood stage, causing significant flooding in four counties bordering the river.

The period saw its share of unusual sightings. A Say's Phoebe spent nearly four months at the Agricenter in Shelby County, and a Whooping Crane made a brief appearance in Obion County, which also hosted a Long-eared Owl. A Baltimore Oriole spent a month at a feeder in Tipton County, while two Summer Tanagers appeared at feeders in Shelby County. The Camden landfill in Benton County produced an Iceland Gull and a record count of Lesser Black-backed Gulls.

Boreal irruptives made a good showing with Red-breasted Nuthatches widespread and numerous, as were Purple Finches and Pine Siskins. American Tree Sparrows were reported in three counties.

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HIGHLAND RIM AND BASIN REGION - - Temperatures this winter were above average each month. December was + 4.6 degrees and January was + 2.3 degrees, while February really turned up the heat at + 7.2 degrees. Similarly, each month saw above average precipitation. December and January each received about an inch more than normal, while February was also the most extreme in rainfall at + 9.5 inches.

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CUMBERLAND PLATEAU / RIDGE and VALLEY REGION - - Mild temperatures prevailed this winter with February being the mildest at nearly 7 degrees above normal. Rainfall was above average each month. Indeed, this was the wettest winter on record in many areas. The heaviest rains fell in February, with 10.5 inches in the Tri-cities being the most ever recorded in that month. Areas further west received up to 15 inches. With the ground already saturated, these heavy rains in February caused widespread flooding and localized landslides. The only significant snowfall of the season occurred on 9 December,

with 6-10 inches accumulating in the Tri-cities area.

It was an off-season for geese, following exceptional numbers last winter. All three American scoters plus Long-tailed Ducks were found, along with good numbers of Canvasback and Greater Scaup. Also noteworthy were Red-necked Grebe, Common Gallinule, Lesser Black-backed Gull, Red-throated and Pacific loons, Golden Eagle, and Harris's Sparrow. Good numbers of wintering American White Pelicans and Great Egrets continued this year. Also of interest were three Green Heron reports in December. Boreal irruptives included small to moderate numbers of Red-breasted Nuthatches, Purple Finches, and Pine Siskins. A single Evening Grosbeak was the first regional report since December 2012.

This was an amazing winter for lingering Neotropical migrant songbirds, with Eastern Wood-Pewee (2 reports), Blue-gray Gnatcatcher (4), Baltimore Oriole (3), and a stunning display of 16 species of warblers (including regular wintering species and a vagrant). The wood-pewee, Magnolia Warbler, and Canada Warbler were the first winter records in the state. A Virginia's Warbler was a new state record. An unusual concentration of 12 winter warblers in Kingsport is detailed in this issue.

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EASTERN MOUNTAIN REGION - - It was a mild and wet winter. Temperatures were over 3 degrees above normal in both December and January, while February was more than 7 degrees above normal. Total precipitation was about 10 inches above normal for the period. February was the wettest on record with over 11 inches for the month. The only significant snow event came on 9 December when about 10 inches fell in the northern mountains.

Waterfowl numbers were low this winter, perhaps due to the milder conditions. Wintering sparrows appeared to be in reduced numbers, also. The predicted influx of irruptive species didn't really materialize in the Tennessee mountains. There were scattered irruptives, but nothing of any volume.
