FIRST TENNESSEE RECORD OF NORTHERN WHEATEAR

Northern Wheatears (*Oenanthe oenanthe*) nest in dry northern tundra around the world including northeast and northwest Canada and Alaska. Almost all of these birds spend the nonbreeding season in sub-Saharan Africa (Kren and Zoerb 1997), although fall vagrants have occurred in many places. The first Tennessee record of Northern Wheatear was documented on 13 November 2016 on Windy Hill Farm in Loudon County (Figure 1). On that morning my wife and I visited the farm to bird as we have been doing since 2008. Our grandson was with us since he likes to play in a barn on the farm. As we passed a threegate corner I noticed a strange bird go to ground from one of the gates. Its general shape, appearance and behavior suggested Northern Mockingbird (*Mimus ployglottos*) without a tail. I watched briefly as it dropped down into the grass to get insects, but soon headed for the barn for my grandson to play. After about an hour we came back from the barn, and I saw the bird again. I had never seen one like it before and did not know what to call it.

We returned home, and I began a search of *The Sibley Guide to Birds of Eastern North America* (Sibley 2009) where I found the bird. We identified the bird as an adult non-breeding female Northern Wheatear. I began calling members of the Knoxville chapter of TOS, and John O'Barr was able to meet me and drive back to Windy Hill Farm. Though the light was failing, he was able to photograph the bird to document it and distributed information about its location to others about the discovery.

The bird would constantly move in a circuitous route around the cattle pastures. It would sit on a wooden fence, fly down to the grass for an insect, and return to the post. Along the road lined with cars it would sometimes alight on the cars. Frequently it landed within meters of observers. The Northern Wheatear was last observed on Windy Hill Farm 20 November 2016. According to eBird data (Sullivan et al 2009) there are at least 18 occurrences of Northern Wheatear across the southeastern United States from coastal zones to mountain regions. Most records are either October or November, but there is at least one occurrence

in February. The closest record to the first Tennessee observation in Loudon County was in Translyvania County North Carolina in October 2003

The owners of Windy Hill farm graciously allowed birders to come onto their property to view the bird, which remained for nine days; and KTOS member Morton Massey was on site for most of that time to manage traffic. It is estimated that at least 250 birders were able to see the bird.

Windy Hill Farm was established in 1827; it is 200 hectares in size and located on Blair Bend on the Tennessee River. The terrain is rolling hills with about 50 hectares of forest and is bounded by forest on the sides not bordered by the river. It is mainly a cattle farm with some acreage leased for row crops. Steve Brewington is the third generation manager of the farm. The farm is the site of the only known active Bald Eagle (*Haliaeetus leucocephalus*) nest in Loudon County. My wife and I have been allowed free access to the farm since 2008 when we first learned of the eagle nest along the river there, made the effort to find the nest location from land, and got to know Steve and his family.

RECENT RANGE EXPANSION OF THE FISH CROW INTO EAST TENNESSEE

Fish Crows (*Corvus ossifragus*) are endemic to the eastern and southeastern United States, from southern New England southward along the coastal plain and piedmont to Florida, thence westward across the Deep South to eastern Texas, and up the Mississippi River to Missouri and Illinois. In recent decades this species has been expanding its range up the Mississippi River drainage and to other inland areas, especially along river corridors (Alderfer 2006). The preferred habitat of Fish Crows is fields and woodland edges along rivers and lakes, but they also occur in suburban settings.

The historic range of the Fish Crow in Tennessee was limited to counties adjacent to the Mississippi River, particularly Shelby County (Robinson 1990). Since the mid-1980s they have been expanding their range upstream along tributaries of the Mississippi River in West Tennessee (McNair 1997) and into Hardin County along the Tennessee River in the mid-state (Somershoe and Sloan 2015). This note summarizes Fish Crow expansion into East Tennessee, beginning in Hamilton County and advancing northeastward along the Tennessee River and its tributaries.

The first report of Fish Crows in East Tennessee was of four birds flying over Savannah Bay in Hamilton County on 10 April 1979 (Dubke 1982). However, there were no additional reports in the region for 21 years until one was noted on 5 March 2000 at Booker T. Washington State Park, also in Hamilton County (The Migrant 71:93). The next significant moves by the species were to Roane County in 2004 and Knox County in 2005, evidently leapfrogging up the Tennessee River valley. Reports from Blount, Anderson, Loudon, and Campbell counties soon followed from 2006 through 2011. Expansion from Hamilton County into adjacent Marion County was first reported in 2007 and into Rhea County in 2015. In another apparent leapfrog movement, Fish Crows appeared in Washington County in 2015 and Sullivan County in 2016 (see Table 1 for a summary and documentation). The Sullivan County reports occurred along the South Holston River in Kingsport, following the typical pattern of dispersal along rivers. However, the reports in adjacent Washington County occurred in residential portions of Johnson City, somewhat distant from the nearest river, but still within an acceptable habitat type.

Fish Crows have been reported annually in Hamilton County since 2002 and in Knox County since 2005 (The Season and seasonal bird counts in The Migrant). These two counties remain as the centers of abundance for this species in East Tennessee, although their distribution remains localized within these counties. The lack of reports in some other counties along the Tennessee River drainage may represent genuine gaps or simply be an artifact of insufficient coverage in those counties. Most reports are from the spring, but Fish Crows have been noted in all months in East Tennessee. Presumably they are breeding, at least in Hamilton and Knox counties; however, the only published mention of breeding is of nest building in Knox County in late April 2014 (The Migrant 85:66). This rapid expansion

from the Chattanooga area up to the Tri-Cities is part of a widespread expansion by this species. Further expansion and range consolidation within East Tennessee seems likely and should be documented, especially breeding records.

BREEDING BIRD FORAYS IN TENNESSEE'S UPPER CUMBERLAND REGION: PART III (WARREN, WHITE, VAN BUREN AND BLEDSOE COUNTIES)

Starting in 2008 the senior author (SJS) initiated a series of breeding bird forays to cover 16 counties in the Upper Cumberland region of Tennessee as well as 10 nearby counties in Kentucky. This effort was intended to supplement prior breeding bird foray work and especially breeding bird atlas work undertaken from 1986–1991 (Nicholson 1997), both to enhance coverage and to document ensuing changes in bird species distribution and abundance.

This is the third in a series (see Stedman and LeGrand 2016a, 2016b) presenting breeding bird foray data from four additional Tennessee counties. The counties presented extend geographically from west to east, thereby emphasizing elevational differences among the counties. These differences will be highlighted in a summary article dealing with all sixteen counties. Warren County lies predominantly on the Eastern Highland Rim with some elements of the escarpment between the rim and the Cumberland Plateau occurring along its eastern border. The western two-thirds of White County lie situated on the Highland Rim and the eastern third on the plateau. Van Buren County lies mostly on the plateau except in the northwestern corner which falls to the Highland Rim. Bledsoe County lies on the plateau but is dramatically bisected from southwest to northeast by the Sequatchie Valley.

Each county was divided into survey blocks derived from United States Geological Survey topographic maps. Topographic maps are 7.5-minute quadrangles, each approximately 11.3 x 13.9 km that were subdivided into six 5.7 x 4.6 km blocks (26.2 km²) as described by Nicholson (1997). These blocks were overlain on the county boundaries, with a typical county having 40–50 blocks (range 24–75 blocks). However, the county boundaries split many blocks such that many were considered as partial blocks or were completely excluded if little of the block lay within the county. Forays were conducted during late May or in June; the period of each foray varied from several days to two weeks, being mostly 3–7 days in length. A complete overview of methods is provided by Stedman and LeGrand (2016a).

Observers classified the status of each species in each survey block as one of the following:

- I. Transient (TRANS), based on presumption of lack of breeding by the species;
- II. Possible Breeder (POSS), denoted by X–present during the foray;
- III. Probable Breeder (PROB), denoted by T-territorial (present at same site

on dates at least a week apart; not usually possible), P-pair, A-agitated behavior (presumably near nest or young), and C-courtship or copulation; and

- IV. Confirmed Breeder (CONF) denoted by
 - a. DD-distraction display,
 - b. CN-adult carrying nest material,
 - c. NB-adult building nest,
 - d. UN-used nest,
 - e. FY-adult carrying food for young,
 - f. BG-begging young,
 - g. FL-fledged young,
 - h. FS-fecal sac removed from nest by adult,
 - i. ON-adult on nest incubating,
 - j. NE-nest with eggs, and
 - k. NY-nest with young.

RESULTS AND DISCUSSION




Figure 1. Distribution and abundance of Dickcissel during the 2016 UCR Foray in Warren County, TN.

The overall foray statistics for each county are presented in Table 1. The occurrence of each species, the highest level of breeding status found, and its abundance are presented in Appendix I. Distribution and abundance of many species ranged widely across counties during the forays; for example, Grasshopper Sparrow (*Ammodramus savannarum*) abundance maximized at four individuals in survey blocks of one county but up to eleven individuals in one survey block in each of two counties (Appendix I, Figures 1 – 4).




Figure 2. Distribution and abundance of Dickcissel during the 2015 UCR Foray in White County, TN.




Figure 3. Distribution and abundance of Dickcissel during the 2011 UCR Foray in Van Buren County, TN.




Figure 4. Distribution and abundance of Dickcissel during the 2012 UCR Foray in Bledsoe County, TN.

THE 2016 TENNESSEE CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT SUMMARY

Ron Hoff Clinton, Tennessee 37716

The 2016 Tennessee Christmas Bird Count (CBC) is the 86th count and 73rd consecutive as no count was reported for 1943. A total of 30 counts accounted for a total of 157 species across the state. Four hundred and eighty-seven participants tallied 1412 party hours. Fortunately the weather was not a factor. Temperatures ranged from a chilly 21° F at Roan Mountain and Memphis to a comfortable 76 at Reelfoot Lake.

Count highlights include Trumpeter Swan, Whooping Crane, Little Gull, Long-eared Owl, Ash-throated Flycatcher, Smith's Longspur, and Lark Sparrow.

The following species were recorded in record or unusually high numbers: Ross's Goose, Hooded Merganser, Golden Eagle, Sandhill Crane, Thayer's Gull, Merlin, Winter Wren, Brown Thrasher, Chipping Sparrow, Vesper Sparrow, and Swamp Sparrow.



THE FALL SEASON

1 August - 30 November 2016

The weather this autumn was hot and dry, continuing trends from the summer. Above-average temperatures were recorded each month and below-average rainfall was experienced for at least three months in every region. It was so dry that much of the state fell into moderate to exceptional drought categories.

Three species new to Tennessee were found this autumn by alert birders: a Brown Booby at Duck River Unit, a Northern Wheatear in Loudon County, and a Bohemian Waxwing in Knoxville.

Waterfowl highlights included a Eurasian Wigeon and multiple reports of Surf and Black Scoters. A Neotropic Cormorant and a Roseate Spoonbill were found in West Tennessee, while a Wood Stork occurred in the Ridge and Valley. There were nine reports of White Ibis and two of unidentified dark ibises (*Plegadis* sp.). Shorebird highlights included Marbled Godwits at three sites, a Red Phalarope, and multiple reports of American Avocets, Willets, and Buff-breasted Sandpipers. Individual Pomarine and Parasitic Jaegers, as well as two Sabine's Gulls, appeared in the Western Coastal Plain. Six reports of Swallow-tailed Kites this fall, plus another in July, were the most in any modern year. Mississippi Kites made an excellent showing in East and Middle Tennessee, where sightings have been on the increase. Passerine highlights included Smith's Longspur, Snow Bunting, Clay-colored and Nelson's Sparrows, Black-headed Grosbeak, and Western Meadowlark. Boreal irruptives were represented by modest numbers of Red-breasted Nuthatches and Purple Finches scattered statewide.

The totals for two East Tennessee hawkwatches are presented in Table 1. Data for Soddy Mountain in Hamilton County was compiled by Jimmy Wilkerson, and data for Big Bald Mountain in Unicoi County was compiled by Mark Hopey. In addition, the reports for three banding stations are presented in the Eastern Mountain Region.

The "Fifty-seventh Supplement to the A.O.U. Check-list of North American Birds" (Chesser et al., Auk 133:544-560), published July 2016, brought sweeping changes to the sequence of non-passerine birds. It will take some time for most of us to adjust to these changes, as the deck has really been reshuffled. Few changes were made to the sequence of passerines, although the finches were moved from near the end of the checklist to a position

between pipits and long spurs. These changes in sequence have been incorporated into this report.

WESTERN COASTAL PLAIN REGION - - High temperatures and drought describe weather conditions across most of the region this fall. Only August had an above average amount of rainfall, while the September through November period saw a cumulative deficit

of 8 inches below normal. Many lakes and ponds were reduced to little more than mud puddles. Monthly mean temperatures were higher during all four months, with October readings averaging 6.6 degrees above normal. We seem to have entered an era of a new "normal".

Birding highlights included a Parasitic Jaeger in Gibson County, a lingering Pomarine Jaeger in Henry County, single Sabine's Gulls in Lake and Henry counties, a Neotropic Cormorant in Lake County, and single Swallow-tailed Kites in Gibson and Madison counties. A number of sparrows uncommon to rare in the region were reported. A Henslow's Sparrow was found at Hatchie National Wildlife Refuge, while both Le Conte's and Nelson's Sparrows occurred in the northern part of the region. A Swamp Sparrow in late August in Shelby County was an extremely early arrival.

Irruptive species were a mixed bag. Red-breasted Nuthatches were widely reported, although in small numbers overall. Purple Finch numbers were rapidly increasing at the end of the period, but Pine Siskins were still scarce. An American Tree Sparrow in Lake County on the last day of November was a nice find.

Thanks to all who reported their sightings and especially those who submitted photographs or written details.

HIGHLAND RIM AND BASIN REGION - - Fall in Middle Tennessee found most of the region in moderate to severe drought, with the most severe conditions occurring in the south and east portions of the region. August had 22 days of 90 degrees or higher with overall temperatures averaging 2.9 degrees above normal. September brought 16 days of 90 degree heat with temperatures that were 4.5 degrees above normal. October and November continued the warm temperatures at 7.4 degrees and 5.5 degrees above normal, respectively. August was the only month with above average rainfall, at 3.2 inches above normal, but this was limited to the northern part of the region. The rest of the season saw precipitation at below normal levels: September (-1.5 inches), October (-2.6 inches), and November (-2.4 inches).

Birding highlights this fall were Brown Booby (first state record), Eurasian Wigeon, White Ibis, and Black-headed Grosbeak.

CUMBERLAND PLATEAU / RIDGE and VALLEY REGION - - Summer's heat wave continued well into autumn with each of the four months having above average temperatures. September and October were the most extreme, with readings at Chattanooga that were 6.1 degrees warmer than average in both months, while November was 4.5 degrees warmer than average in that city. From June through late September, the Tri-cities area experienced 62 days of 90+ degree temperatures, breaking the previous record of 55 days set six years ago and more than three times the long-term average. Numerous days of 80+ degrees continued into early November, although the latter half of that month saw more seasonable temperatures. The warm temperatures apparently contributed to numerous birds lingering a bit later than normal. It was also very dry this autumn with a shortage of rainfall in each of the first three months. November was equally dry until heavy rains fell over the last two days of the month. By November most of the region was in severe to exceptional drought conditions which were exacerbated by the heat. Numerous small ponds, springs, and other wet areas dried up.

The water level in Douglas Lake was lowered earlier than normal this year, exposing the mudflats at Rankin Bottoms by early August. By season's end, 25 species of shorebirds had been observed on Upper Douglas Lake (including Rankin Bottoms), highlighted by Marbled Godwit and Red Phalarope. A Lesser Black-backed Gull there on 21 August established a new early arrival date in Tennessee. Long-legged waders were well represented in the region, including a Wood Stork and multiple records of White Ibis. The post-breeding dispersal of kites into East Tennessee was remarkable this year, with four records of Swallow-tailed Kites and three records of Mississippi Kites. Good numbers of Merlins and Peregrine Falcons were observed, continuing that trend.

Most amazing was the appearance of two species new to the state. First was a very accommodating Northern Wheatear that lingered for a week on a private farm in Loudon County. The hospitality of the farm manager allowed many birders to view this rare visitor. Soon after came a Bohemian Waxwing in a city park in Knoxville; unfortunately, it did not linger. Both of these rarities were well photographed.

Also notable were Lapland Longspur, Clay-colored Sparrow (three reports), Le Conte's Sparrow, and a tardy Great Crested Flycatcher. Boreal irruptives were represented by scattered Red-breasted Nuthatches and Purple Finches.

EASTERN MOUNTAIN REGION - - Temperatures were well above normal for each month in the period. Each month had below average precipitation with October the driest with less than an inch of rain. Highlights this autumn included Black Scoter, American Avocet, Marbled Godwit, Short-eared Owl, and Snow Bunting.

Three fall banding stations were conducted in the region. At Big Bald Mountain, there was a raptor banding operation in addition to songbird banding (detailed separately below). Cape May Warblers had a record year at Big Bald. Tennessee Warbler numbers were low there and also at the other two stations. Gray-cheeked Thrushes were banded in above average numbers at each station.

INSTRUCTIONS TO AUTHORS

The Migrant records observations and studies of birds in Tennessee and adjacent areas. SUBMISSIONS: The manuscript should be submitted electronically to Bob Ford at editorthemigrant@gmail.com. Submission of hard copies is optional. If so desired the original and two copies of the manuscript should be sent to the: Editor: Bob Ford, 808 Hatchie, Brownsville, TN 38012 editorthemigrant@gmail.com. Manuscripts that have been published in other journals should not be submitted.

MATERIAL: The subject matter should relate to some phase of Tennessee ornithology. It should be original, factual, concise and scientifically accurate.

STYLE: Both articles and short notes are solicited; recent issues of *The Migrant* should be used as a guide in the preparation of manuscripts. Where more detail is needed, reference should be made to *Scientific Style and Format*, eighth edition, by the Council of Science Editors, councilscienceeditors.org.

COPY: Manuscripts should be double-spaced with adequate margins for editorial notations and emailed in Word.docx. Tables and figures should be prepared in a separate file with appropriate headings; see *Scientific Style and Format* for examples of appropriate form for tables. Photographs intended for reproduction should be at least 300 dpi or sharp with good contrast on glossy white paper. Weights, measurements, and distances should be in metric units. Dates should be in "continental" form (e.g., 16 March 1997). Use the 24-hour clock (e.g., 0500 or 1900).

NOMENCLATURE: The scientific name of a species should be given after the first use of the full common name in the text. The scientific name should be italicized and in parentheses. Names should follow the *A. O. U. Check-list of North American Birds* (seventh edition, 1998, or supplements).

TITLE: The title should be concise, specific and descriptive.

ABSTRACT: Manuscripts of five or more pages should include an abstract. The abstract should be less then 5% of the length of the manuscript. It should include a brief explanation of why the research was done, the major results, and why the results are important.

LITERATURE CITED: List all literature citations in a "Literature Cited" section at the end of the text. Text citations should include the author and year.

IDENTIFICATION: Manuscripts including reports of rare or unusual species or of species at atypical times should include: date and time, light and weather conditions, exact location, habitat, optical equipment, distance, behavior of bird, comparison with other similar species, characteristic markings, experience of observer, other observers verifying the identification and reference works consulted.

REPRINTS: Reprints are available to authors on request. Billing to authors will be through the TOS treasurer. Request for reprints must be made well in advance of printing.

SEASON REPORTS: Observations that are to be considered for publication in "The Season" section should be mailed to the appropriate Regional Compiler. Consult a recent issue of *The Migrant* for the name and address of the compiler.
