In collaboration with the Joslyn Memorial of Omaha, Nebraska, the Wilson Ornithological Club will sponsor a unique bird and mammal art exhibit in connection with their coming meeting in Omaha, November 29–30. Exhibitors will be members of the United States armed forces who made paintings, drawings, etc. during World War II. The drawings need not have been made overseas, but it is hoped that birds and mammals of Asia, Europe, Africa, Australia, and the Pacific Islands will be among those depicted.
