





THE AUK is edited at the Museum of Natural History, The University of Kansas, Lawrence, Kansas 66045, by the following staff:

The Auk welcomes original articles and short notes, not published elsewhere, containing significant new knowledge about birds, or new interpretation of existing knowledge. Address all articles and notes intended for publication and all books intended for review to the editor.

Note to contributors to The Auk.—The operation of a large journal on a quarterly schedule with limited editorial assistance poses demanding problems in organization and timing. The latter frequently is the all-important factor in meeting the production schedule.

Extreme pains are taken in the present operation to avoid the perpetration of error. (1) All MSS are read and edited by the editor and rechecked by at least one other member of the editorial staff. (2) All MSS which receive significant revision, discounting trivia of journal style, are returned to authors for consideration. (3) All galleys are read to copy at the Allen Press by their trained proof-readers, once-corrected, and the corrected lines read again before the editorial staff sees them. (4) All galley proof is then read to copy by the editorial staff, corrected, and the corrected copy (page proof) read once (and sometimes twice) more. At this point any residual errors discovered are corrected. (5) All galleys are submitted to their authors for checking.

It is here that we may realize a significant saving in time. If authors will maintain for their own use an up-to-date carbon copy, it is possible for the editorial staff to read proof to the ribbon copy simultaneously with the author's reading to the carbon copy. (Otherwise we must either complete this reading to the ribbon copy before mailing proof, or defer such reading until the proof and [hopefully] ribbon copy are returned by the author.) We estimate that with some issues as much as two weeks of production time is saved by this procedure. Further, it allows us to utilize an additional time-saving service that Allen Press provides if desired: namely the mailing directly from the press of proofs to authors, immediately as they are ready.

To be sure, MSS in which changes are minimal and self-evident may not be returned; however, as noted above, all MSS submitted to considerable editorial modification are routinely cleared with authors before being committed to type, and at this time the carbon copy may and should be adjusted for ultimate reading to proof. In some cases, where time is certainly adequate (often meaning that the article will be scheduled two issues ahead), the ribbon copy will continue to be returned with the galleys and may be retained by its author unless its return is explicitly requested.

The editorial staff solicits the understanding of authors in this matter and profoundly appreciates their cooperation. This in the main has continued to be exemplary.

It may be appropriate, finally, here to urge that authors contemplating absence from their usual haunts take pains either to notify the editor of their temporary addresses or to appoint representatives empowered to read their proofs and order their reprints. The editor naturally recognizes an obligation to make proof available; he cannot, however, accept the obligation either to search for missing authors or materially to delay the publication or alter the content of any issue on account of delinquent proof.
