



#### OVERSEAS ORNITHOLOGICAL FIELD TRIPS

For 8 years we've been putting together bird observation trips in all 6 continents. They are slanted toward serious amateurs, and some tours have a side interest in botany and other forms of natural history. In fact, we try for an experience-in-depth of each country and its people. Tours are 3 weeks in length to utilize low-cost travel (2 weeks in North America), and are set up in pairs or chains of three or four.

We'd be grateful for the assistance of fellow A.O.U. members in developing meaningful itineraries, and in commending the trips to appropriate friends. Or if you enjoy field ornithology, and can find a region in which you are not already an expert, join us yourself!

We use the title "CROWDER NATURE TOURS," but the operation is not profit-seeking, and is slated to become a world association in 1969. Do let us put you on our mailing list. Here is the program for 1968:

#### **EUROPE**

Seven European tours this year permit many fine combinations, including a thrilling North-with-the-Spring adventure:

NORTH TOUR: No. Germany, Denmark, & the length of Sweden; June.

NORWAY: Our most popular tour, and magnificent; late June.

BRITAIN: The bird highlights; June.

BALKANS: Seldom-visited Jugoslavia, Romania, Hungary areas;

U.S.S.R.: Fine coverage; late June. ICELAND: Popular 2-wk. trip with Greenland extension; June or July.

#### **JAPAN**

Fine 3-week coverage of entire archipelago, Kyushu to Hokkaido, with expert local leadership. May. Optional continuation, under leadership, across Siberia to join the U.S.S.R. trip (see above).

#### AFRICA

We pioneered African bird trips and cover the continent in 6 fascinating regional tours, 3 of which go in 1968: South Africa in July, East Africa in August, Central Africa-Madagascar in September.

#### SOUTH PACIFIC

We pioneered this area, too. The 1968 program: MELANESIA from Fiji to New Guinea, Sept. AUS-TRALIA, in two 3-wk. trips, Oct. NEW ZEALAND, 3 weeks for birds, followed by 2-wk. botany trip; Nov.-Dec.

#### **ALASKA**

The 1967 tours were a success beyond expectations. In 1968 we do 3 successive 2-week trips, from Ketchikan to the Aleutians, Pribilofs, and Point Barrow. Start June 1, with a break at Fairbanks for the A.O.U. meeting.

#### LATIN AMERICA

We operate a regular program in Middle and South America: Seven routes in Mexico, several in Central America and the West Indies, and a fine South America program. Two especially fine areas—Yucatan (2 wks.) and Colombia (3 wks.)—are visited twice a year, in February and in August.

#### U.S.A.

We do a bit of species-chasing at home, too: Winter in Florida, spring in Arizona and on the Texas coast, and beginning in 1969, a north-with-spring series in the West.

#### OTHER PLACES

There is quite a program in India, Malaysia, Indonesia, and the Philippines; next departures in early 1969. And we haven't mentioned the Galapagos, Tierra del Fuego, or the proposed "re-enactment" of the Peterson-Fisher Wild America trip.

Unannounced tours and request tours that often materialize are a feature, too: What interests you?

This Pictorial Checklist, condensed from the Denver Museum's monumental two-volume Birds of Colorado, has been published so that nature-minded observers may have in one volume a beautifully illustrated reference to the birds of colorful Colorado and adjacent states.

Included are 23 of the more than 400 black and white photographs used in the original work, and all of the 124 color plates painted by twenty-three outstanding bird artists of Britain, Canada, and the United States. Illustrated are 420 (more than 700 individual birds) of the 441 species recorded from Colorado.

Introductory chapters of this checklist cover Topography, Life Zones, and Migration in Colorado, followed by 130 pages of text recording briefly recognition marks, general range, and status of each of the 441 species and 64 additional races of Colorado birds in this and neighboring states—a vast region sometimes referred to as the *Rocky Mountain Empire*.

Alfred M. Bailey, Director, and Robert J. Niedrach, Curator of Birds, of the Denver Museum of Natural History have been field companions for more than forty years. Their field studies throughout the state often have been from photographic blinds, and as a consequence much of the data summarized in this *Pictorial Checklist* from the extensive records and life history narratives published in *Birds of Colorado* are based on first hand information.

(Periodical Literature)

The Auk welcomes original articles and short notes, not published elsewhere, containing significant new knowledge about birds, or new interpretation of existing knowledge. Address all articles and notes intended for publication and all books intended for review to the editor.

Suggestions to contributors.—Submit all MSS in duplicate. They must satisfy the following minimal requirements: MSS should be typewritten, double-spaced (especially tables and "literature cited"), on one side of numbered sheets of standard (8½ × 11 in.) bond paper, with at least one inch margins all around. Tables (which should be unruled) and legends should be typed on separate sheets. Drawings should be in india ink on good board or drafting paper and lettered by lettering guide or the equivalent. Photographs should be clear, of good contrast, on glossy paper. Illustrations should allow (with particular regard to lettering) for reduction to their final width (usually 4½ in.). Designate top of each illustration and identify (on the back with soft pencil) by author's name, title, and figure number.

Titles should be short and descriptive. MSS should follow the conventions of form observed in articles, general notes, and reviews in The Auk, with minor variations, since 1965. Avoid footnotes. If more than 5 works are cited, references in text should relate to a terminal list of "literature cited" (include no titles not cited). Where critical matter is cited from longer papers, indicate the pertinent pages, e.g. (Lack, 1947: 96-97). Citations in text should be parenthetical, e.g. (Lack, Darwin's finches, Cambridge, England, Cambridge Univ. Press, 1947: 96-97) or (Auk, 79: 208-233, 1962). Verify all citations from original sources unless impossible, in which case so indicate. For abbreviations in a terminal list of references, authors should use forms stipulated by the Style Manual for Biological Journals (Washington, D. C., Amer. Inst. Biol. Sci., 1964). In other matters of form The Auk frequently relies on the dicta of the GPO Style Manual.

For bird weights and measurements use metric units. Other measurements should be in the form usual to the discipline of the paper as practiced in the United States. The 24-hour clock (08:00 and 20:30) and "continental" dating (1 July 1968) are preferred.

Scientific and (if any) vernacular names of birds should be given upon first mention thereof and should follow the A.O.U. Check-list (1957) or the appropriate equivalent unless departures are explained and defended.

Articles more than 10 pages long should include a summary that should not exceed 10 per cent of the length of the article.

Proofs of all articles and notes will be sent to authors. Reprints of articles, notes, and other items are to be paid for by the author. These must be ordered from Allen Press Inc. on the blanks sent with the proof.
