Persons interested in birds are invited to join the American Ornithologists' Union. Dues are \$42 per year; student memberships are \$20. Membership is \$20 for persons in all countries *except* the United States, Canada, Israel, Japan, Australia, New Zealand, and the following Western European countries: Iceland, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Denmark, Germany, The Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg, France, the United Kingdom, Ireland, Switzerland, Austria, Italy, Spain, and Portugal. All members receive *The Auk*, and North American members receive a bimonthly *Ornithological Newsletter*. Subscription price to institutions is \$70. A Life Membership is \$1,260, paid in one sum or four annual installments of \$315. Gifts of any amount for the Endowment Fund are welcome and should be sent to the Treasurer (see last page).
