


EMBRYOLOGY OF INVERTEBRATES

By Dr. E. Korschelt and Dr. K. Heider

Translated from the German by Edward L. Mark, W. McM. Woodworth and Matilda Bernard. Revised and edited with additional notes by Martin F. Woodward.

The broadest, most comprehensive and exhaustive work on the subject. In method of treatment the authors proceed from the special to the general. The translators, on account of the rapid advance of the science since the date of first publication, have supplemented the text by numerous additions, both in the body of the text and in foot-notes, giving a succinct statement of the results of recent embryological research. In this work they were fortunate in having the co-operation of the authors themselves, and all interpolations in the text are bracketed, thus rendering it unnecessary to compare with the original to ascertain what is new. Each of these additions, together with the foot-notes, is followed by the initial of the author, or by the word "Translators", to indicate the persons responsible for the new matter.

This work is comprised in four volumes as follows:

Vol. I.—Porifera, Cnidaria, Ctenophora, Vermes, Enteropneusta, Echinodermata.

Vol. II.—Phoronidea, Bryozoa, Ectoprocta, Brachiopoda, Entoprocta, Crustacea, Palaeostraca,

Vol. III.—Arachnida, Pentastomidae, Pantopoda, Tardigrada, Onychophora, Myriopoda, Insecta.

Vol. IV.—Amphineura, Lamellibranchia, Solenoconcha, Gastropoda, Cephalopoda, Tunicata, Cephalochorda.
