No. 5. A Bibliography of California Ornithology, by Joseph Grinnell. 1909. 166 pp. Price \$1.50 post paid.

The titles listed are 1785 in number, and cover the period from 1797 to the end of the year 1907. These biblographical entries are rounded out by a series of indexes—to authors, to local lists by localities, to the serial publications cited, and to the bird names mentioned, both vernacular and systematic. According to one authority upon the subject, "it is safe to say that this is the most important contribution to the bibliography of North American ornithology since the Couesian contributions of 1878-1880 set the high standard here closely followed." Indispensable to any student of western birds.

No. 7. Birds of the Pacific Slope of Southern California, by George Willett. 1912. 122 pp. Price \$1.50 post paid.

Contains extensive and accurate accounts of the local distribution, nesting, and migration of the 377 species and subspecies of birds found on the Pacific slope of southern California, from San Luis Obispo County to the Mexican line. Anyone interested in the birds of southern California will have constant need of this publication, as a check upon his own observations.
