MINUTES OF COOPER CLUB MEETINGS SIXTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING

The sixteenth annual meeting of the Cooper Ornithological Club was held Friday, April 3, to Sunday, April 5, 1942, at the Natural History Museum, Balboa Park, San Diego, California. Friday morning the meeting was opened with a welcome extended to members and visitors by Clinton G. Abbott, Chairman of the Local Committee. Howard Robertson, president of the Board of Directors, spoke in response for the visiting members of the Club.

Miller; Some birds as possible carriers of disease among the giant cacti (illustrated with slides), by Elizabeth S. Arnold.

Dixon; The white pelicans of Clear Lake, Modoc County, California (a Kodachrome motion picture), by Ed N. Harrison and Frances Roberts; Sex recognition in valley quail, by John T. Emlen, Jr.; Studies on the life-history and distribution of the phainopepla (illustrated with slides), by James E. Crouch; Weight-carrying capacity of eagles (illustrated with slides), by Lewis W. Walker; Some recent bird records from the lower Colorado River Valley (illustrated with slides), by Lee W. Arnold; To the tip of Lower California (illustrated with slides), by Frank F. Gander; Sierra birds and their nests (a Kodachrome motion picture), by James B. Dixon).

Saturday morning: Movements of immature gulls (from records of the Pacific gull colorbanding project), by Grace Sargent; The story of the African peacock (Afropavo) (illustrated with slides), by T. D. A. Cockerell; Color shots at owls and herons (illustrated with slides), by Lewis W. Walker; Home life of the broad-tailed hummingbird (a Kodachrome motion picture), by Wilmatte P. Cockerell; Birds of an inland lake (a Kodachrome motion picture), by Ed Harrison and Frances Roberts; the western grebe: a life history contribution (a Kodachrome motion picture), by Stanley G. Jewett.

In the afternoon members and their friends were guests of the San Diego Zoological Society. At 2 p.m. the group met in the grounds of the Zoological Park and were accorded greetings by Mrs. Belle J. Benchley, Executive Secretary of the Zoological Society. The entire afternoon was devoted to enjoyment of the wonderful collection of animal life assembled there.

On Saturday evening, approximately 75 members and guests attended the annual dinner in the Gold Room, at the U. S. Grant Hotel. Ed Harrison and Frances Roberts presented their excellent new Kodachrome motion picture, "Birds of the Pacific Coast." In addition, members were particularly fortunate in being able to hear anecdotes and highlights on early days of the Cooper Ornithological Club from two of the founders, Harry R. Painton and Wilfred H. Osgood.

On Sunday, very enjoyable visits were made to the homes and museums of Ed Harrison at Encinitas and James B. Dixon at Escondido. The Proxy Committee reported that, of a total membership of 876, 40 members were present in person and 414 were represented by proxies. The Chairman therefore declared a quorum present.

The Secretary reported election by the two divisions of the Club since the last Annual Meeting of 52 members, from and including Number 1230 on the Club Membership Roster, to and including Number 1281 on said roster. On motion by George Willett, seconded by Joseph Dixon and duly carried, the election of these members was ratified.

The Nominating Committee presented the following nominations for Directors for the ensuing year: John S. Appleton, W. Lee Chambers, Hilda W. Grinnell, Jean M. Linsdale, Alden H. Miller, J. R. Pemberton, Howard Robertson, John McB. Robertson and George Willett. On motion by Eric C. Kinsey, seconded by Louis B. Bishop and duly carried, the nominations were closed and the nominees declared elected.

The meeting adjourned at 9:40 a.m.—George Willett, Secretary.

NORTHERN DIVISION

FEBRUARY.—The regular monthly meeting of the Northern Division of the Cooper Ornithological Club was held on Thursday, February 26, 1942, at 8:00 p.m., in Room 212 Wheeler Hall, University of California, Berkeley, with Vice-president R. M. Bond in the chair and about 40 members and guests present. Minutes of the Northern Division for January were read and approved. There was one proposal for membership: Jack Chalmers Culbreath, 2412 Channing Way, Berkeley, by Seth B. Benson.

Field notes were numerous. Mrs. Kelly had made particular note of a Pileolated Warbler in Alameda on February 24, only to find that her neighbor, a reliable observer, could report one present all winter. Mrs. Sheldon described a case of partial albinism in a Red-winged Blackbird seen at the Berkeley Aquatic Park. She had seen a Black-necked Stilt and hundreds of Avocets at Dumbarton Bridge on February 22. Milton Seibert reported an Allen Hummingbird in Oakland on February 9, while Mr. Harwell

could give February 6 as the date of an observation at Woodside, San Mateo County. Mr. Seibert also told of finding the nest of a Golden Eagle, with eggs, near Livermore. Mr. Bond had found six White-tailed Kites in Ventura County; one pair was beginning nesting activities. Numbers of Band-tailed Pigeons were reported by several observers in different localities.

Mrs. Grinnell quoted a letter from Dr. Parkinson of Estates Drive, Piedmont, reporting 30 or 40 Band-tailed Pigeons in the pines; they suddenly increased to 70 on February 14. Mrs. Allen reported that Forster Terns had been here all winter, 5 to 7 being seen at the Aquatic Park; they are usually fewer in number.

Introducing his talk on Birds of the Kings Canyon National Park, Mr. Joseph Dixon showed a choice collection of Kodachrome slides, illustrating the ecology of the region. The area is peculiarly lacking in records, and is critical as a meeting place of forms from southern California with Sierran forms from Yosemite.
