## PREPARATION OF MANUSCRIPTS FOR THE CONDOR

The Condor is devoted to the dissemination of knowledge concerning avian biology. To be considered for publication, manuscripts should contain new, original information and a clear indication of its significance and its relationship to existing knowledge. Material that has been published elsewhere in any substantial part cannot be included.

The maintenance of high standards of style, accuracy, and scientific content requires the active cooperation of author, editor, and printer. The approach toward these standards begins with the author, and will be much advanced by the submission of copy that conforms in detail with the style and usage of The Condor. Extensive departure from these requirements always causes delay in the processing of manuscripts.

Submit copy typewritten on one side of standard ( $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$  inch) bond paper, leaving at least one-inch margins. Text pages through the list of references should be numbered. Tables and legends for figures should be included as separate, unnumbered pages. Tables should not be ruled, and should be planned to fit vertically within one journal page or less. Footnotes are not used in the text, and should be avoided in tables.

Drawings must be made with India ink on durable paper or board, and should conform to standards of draftsmanship exemplified in current issues of The Condor. Photographic reproductions of drawings are acceptable if they are glossy prints of professional quality. Do not use typewritten labels within a drawing or graph. Photographs to be reproduced as halftones must be glossy prints of good contrast. Illustrations should be planned to permit reduction without loss of legibility or significant detail (approximate maximum width is 12 cm.). Do not unnecessarily duplicate data in text, tables, and graphs.

Provide a concise, definitive title and, if necessary, subheadings within the text. A terminal list of references should be given for articles that contain more than five literature citations. Otherwise, citations may be included parenthetically in the text. Check the accuracy of citations against original sources and adhere to bibliographic form given in this and subsequent issues of The Condor. Manuscripts containing multiple errors in citations will be returned to the author for correction. A factual summary is recommended for longer papers.

Scientific names of species should follow the usage of the A.O.U. Check-list of North American Birds, Fifth Edition (1957), or an appropriate equivalent. The use of metric units is required in all measurements of birds and their physical environment; exceptions can be made in specific cases if there is a defensible preference for English units. The military system of calendar notation (e.g., 1 January 1966) will be applied uniformly, and the use of military clock-time is strongly recommended.

For abbreviations, including the titles of serial publications, consult the Style Manual for Biological Journals, Second Edition (Amer. Inst. Biol. Sci., Washington, D.C., 1964), or this and subsequent issues of The Condor.
