A Distributional Survey of the Birds of Honduras.—Burt L. Monroe, Jr. 1968. A.O.U. Ornithological Monographs, no. 7, 458 p. \$9.00, \$7.20 to A.O.U. members (clothbound). Available from the treasurer of the A.O.U., Burt L. Monroe, Jr., Box 23447, Anchorage, Kentucky 40223.—This fine monograph provides an excellent account of the distribution and geographic variation of 663 species whose occurrence in Honduras the author regards as firmly established. Discussions of the physiography, geology, climate, and habitat types of Honduras; a gazeteer; and ecological and distributional analysis of the avifauna will be of interest to all students of Central American birds.

The Birds of the Republic of Panamá Part 2. Columbidae (Pigeons) to Picidae (Woodpeckers).

—Alexander Wetmore. 1968. Smithsonian Miscellaneous Collections, Vol. 150, Part 2 (distributed by Random House, New York). v + 605 p., 76 illustrations. \$15.00 (clothbound).—Although this monumental work is taxonomic in organization, considerable information on natural history is included. Each subspecies is described and discussed; families are characterized briefly; and keys to the species are given for each family. Part 1 of this series (tinamous to skimmers) is now available in cloth from Random House for \$12.50.

Bird Guide of Thailand.—Boonsong Lekagul. 1968. The Association for the Conservation of Wildlife, Bangkok. xxviii + 271 p., numerous color plates, several black-and-white drawings, and a few photographs, all by the author. \$8.50 (clothbound). Available from Pierce Book Co., Winthrop, Iowa 50682.—In this interesting field guide nearly all of the 829 species of Thai birds are illustrated, most of them in color. Species accounts include vernacular (English and Thai) and scientific names, brief descriptions and field marks, and indications as to habitat, distribution, and status. It will be indispensable to a bird student visiting Thailand and useful in other parts of southeast Asia.

Birds of the Eastern Forest: 1.—Paintings by J. F. Lansdowne, text by John A. Livingston. 1968. Houghton Mifflin, Boston. 229 p. \$20.00 (cloth-bound).—This beautiful volume includes, for each of 52 species, a full page  $(9\frac{1}{2})'' \times 13''$ ) color plate, a full page of artist's sketches, and a page of textual comment. The paintings are outstanding.

Bird Song: Acoustics and Physiology.—Crawford H. Greenwalt. 1968. Smithsonian Press, Washington (distributed by Random House, New York). 194 p. \$12.50 (clothbound).—In this scholarly treatment, the author combines detailed analysis of bird vocalizations with knowledge of the properties of the syrinx to arrive at interesting conclusions as to the nature of the sound production apparatus in birds.
