## **NEWS AND NOTES**

#### 44TH ANNUAL MEETING

The Cooper Ornithological Society held its 44th Annual Meeting 19–22 April 1973 at California State University, San Francisco, California, in cooperation with the California Academy of Sciences and the Point Reyes Bird Observatory. Robert I. Bowman was Chairman of the Committee on Arrangements and Richard F. Johnston was Chairman of the Committee on the Scientific Program.

The following were elected as officers of the Society: William H. Behle, President; Harold F. Mayfield, Vice-president; J. David Ligon, Secretary; Russell P. Balda, Assistant Secretary; Jane R. Durham, Treasurer; James G. Miller, Assistant Treasurer; Francis S. L. Williamson, Editor, *The Condor*; and Tom J. Cade, Editor, *Pacific Coast Avifauna*. Three new directors, Ed N. Harrison, Stephen M. Russell, and Kenneth E. Stager, had been previously elected by mail ballot. Harold F. Mayfield, Oliver P. Pearson, and Edgar Stone were elected as members of the Investment Committee.

Several actions taken by the Board of Directors and the Council are of general interest. Changes in membership dues and subscription rates were approved (see details elsewhere in News and Notes). An archives for the Cooper Ornithological Society was established with the Bancroft Library, University of California at Berkeley, as the depository. It was recommended that members save items of historical interest pertaining to the Society for the archives (see note below).

The Painton Award for the most outstanding paper published in *The Condor* in the previous four years was given to Lowell Spring for his paper "A comparison of functional and morphological adaptations in the Common Murre (*Uria aalge*) and Thick-billed Murre (*Uria lomvia*)." The Council voted to hold the 1974 meeting of the Society at Northern Arizona University, Flagstaff, Arizona.

Officers of the Council were elected as follows: John W. Hardy, President; Nicholas E. Collias, Vice-president; Miklos D. F. Udvardy, Secretary. Kenneth C. Parkes and Gordon H. Orians were elected as members of the Council. Jane R. Durham and Dean Amadon were elected Honorary Members of the Society.

Awards for the best papers presented by persons not holding a doctoral degree in biology were as follows: A. Brazier Howell Award, David F. # THIRTY-SECOND SUPPLEMENT TO THE AOU CHECK-LIST

The Thirty-second Supplement to the American Ornithologists' Union Check-list of North American Birds (Fifth ed., 1957) was recently published in The Auk (90:41). Contributors should note the changes made in scientific and English names when preparing manuscripts for The Condor. Beginning with the autumn (No. 3) issue, the names used in The Condor will usually follow the new usage.
