## INFORMATION FOR CONTRIBUTORS

The Condor will publish research reports and short communications that contain new information on any subject relevant to the biology of wild species of birds. The journal will also publish occasional review articles. Submit manuscripts for publication to the Editor.

Manuscripts. Submit the original and one copy, typewritten double-spaced (including tables, legends, and literature cited section) on one side of standard (8½ × 11 inch), good quality bond paper, with at least one-inch margins. Do not use erasable, light weight, or mimeo bond. The author's name should be placed in the upper right-hand corner of each page. Number pages through the list of references; include tables and legends for figures on separate unnumbered pages. Avoid footnotes. Provide a concise, definitive title and, where necessary, subheadings within the text (no more than three levels). A factual summary is recommended for longer papers. Tables (unruled) should be kept at a minimum and should not duplicate material in either the text or graphs.

Scientific names should always be given at first mention of a species and those for avian species should usually follow the usage of the A.O.U. Check-list of North American Birds (Fifth ed., 1957; 32nd Supplement to the A.O.U. Check-list, Auk 90:411) or an appropriate equivalent. When both the common name and the scientific name of a bird species are given as a paragraph heading (e.g., in regional lists of species) the scientific name should be given first. The use of metric units is generally required in all measurements of birds and their physical environment.

Abbreviations of mensural units should conform with the Council of Biological Editors' Style Manual for Biological Journals (Third ed., American Institute Biological Sciences, Washington, D. C., 1972) except in the case of thermometric units, where the degree sign is to be retained. Clock time is to be designated in the 24-hour system and written as 08:00 or 17:25 (not 0800 hours, or 1725 hours). Use the military system of calendar notation (e.g., 1 January 1970). In many other matters of form the Government Printing Office Style Manual, in addition to the A.I.B.S. style manual, will be helpful.

Illustrations. All illustrative material should be arranged in the form of figures, each with an arabic number. A duplicate or reasonably accurate copy of each figure should be submitted for use of reviewers.

The vast majority of illustrations should be on  $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$  inch paper, including labels of coordinates. The general rule is to make drawings about twice the size they will appear in print. That is, one-column illustrations ( $2\frac{3}{4}$  inches) should be 5-6 inches wide, and two-column ( $5\frac{3}{4}$  inches) figures should be no more than 11 inches wide. All but the most complex graphs should be planned for a single column. If the originals are larger than  $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$  inches, they should not be sent to the editor, but should be submitted as photostats or glossy photographs of MS page size. Almost all copies by office duplicating machines are not acceptable, but engravings can be made from photocopies if of professional quality.

Typewriter lettering is not acceptable. We suggest mechanical lettering, pressure transfer letters, or good hand lettering. Avoid bold, heavy, and ornate letters. When reduced for printing, lettering should be little, if any, higher or grossly darker than the text type; nor should the lettering be much smaller than the smallest text type in the journal. The size of the lettering is simple to plan with 50 per cent reduction of the illustration. When possible, all the drawings for one paper should have the same reduction.

Coordinate paper (light blue grids only), and any smooth or "plate" finish drafting paper is suitable. Tracing paper and cloth are not recommended, although if submitted they should be mounted on white cardboard. Only carbon drafting or india ink should be used.

Photographs should be glossy prints, no larger than  $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$  inches, and of good contrast and sharpness. Write the author's name and figure number lightly on the back in soft pencil. Never use paper clips on photographs. Do not fold photographs, or mark the surface of the print to indicate cropping. If a given figure contains separate portions, these should be composed by the author and identified by letters. Composite photographs should be mounted touching one another and be squared on all sides. Letters and arrows are best applied by pressure sensitive materials. Avoid large and heavy letters.

Authors and illustrators should carefully examine the engraver's proofs against copies of the originals in their possession. Isolated numbers or symbols can be accidentally removed during engraving.

Experience has taught us that over half of the illustrations must be repaired and many are barely minimal. Costs of alterations may be passed on to the author.

Publications particularly helpful on the problems of preparing illustrations are the American Standard Illustrations for Publication and Projection (ASA Y15.1—1959, American Society of Mechanical Engineers, 345 East 47th, New York, N. Y. 10017) and the A.I.B.S. style manual.

References. A terminal list of references should be given for articles containing more than five literature citations. Authors should use forms and abbreviations of serial publication titles stipulated by the A.I.B.S. style manual. For bibliographic citations in texts not having a terminal list of references, authors should conform with these examples: Crowell (Auk 85:265, 1968), or (Crowell, Auk 85:265, 1968). In-text citations of publications by three or more authors should in all cases be in the form "Jones et al." Consult current issues of the journal for additional details. Check the accuracy of citations against original sources.

Proof and Reprints. Proofs will ordinarily be sent to the senior author. Please inform the Editor well in advance of any change in address or mechanism for handling proofs. Since changes in proof are expensive, authors should not make major revisions at this stage and will be charged \$0.75 per revision line for excessive alterations. Proofs should be checked carefully against typescript, and both returned promptly to the Editor.

Reprints must be ordered from Allen Press on blanks sent with the proof and are to be paid for by the author. It is the policy of The Condor to charge, at current rate, for any pages in excess of 16 printed pages per article.
