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INFORMATION FOR CONTRIBUTORS

PLEASE HEED

The Condor publishes research reports and short articles that contain new information relevant to the biology of wild species of birds. The journal also publishes occasional review articles. Submit manuscripts for publication to the Editor, The Condor, Meriden Road, Lebanon, New Hampshire 03766.

Manuscripts. Submit the original plus two copies of the text, tables, and illustrations for the use of reviewers. Type the text, tables, legends and literature-cited section *double-spaced* on one side of standard (8½ × 11 inch), good quality bond paper, with at least one-inch margins. Do not use erasable, light weight, or mimeo bond. Put the author's name in the upper right-hand corner of every page. Number pages through the list of references; include tables and legends for figures on separate unnumbered pages. Avoid footnotes. Provide a concise, definitive title, and where necessary, subheadings within the text (no more than three levels). Give a factual summary for longer papers. Tables (unruled) should be kept at a minimum and should not duplicate material in either the text or graphs. Mathematical formulas should be written on one line, where possible.

Scientific names should always be given at first mention of a species. Scientific and English names for birds should follow the usage of the A.O.U. Check-list of North American Birds (Fifth ed., 1957; 32nd Suppl., Auk 90:411; 33rd Suppl., Auk 93:875) or an appropriate equivalent. When both the English and the scientific names are given as a paragraph heading (e.g., in regional lists of species), put the scientific name first.

Metric units are strongly favored in all measurements. Abbreviations of statistical terms and mensural units should conform with the Council of Biology Editors' (CBE) Style Manual (Fourth ed., 1978. American Institute of Biological Sciences, 1401 Wilson Blvd., Arlington VA 22209) except for temperatures, where the degree sign is to be retained. Designate clock time in the 24-hour system and write it as 08:00 or 17:25 (not 0800 hours, or 1725 hours). Use the military system of calendar notation (e.g., 1 January 1976). In many other matters of form the CBE style manual will be helpful.

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Address. Give your present address at the end of the article. If you are no longer at the institution where you did the work, and you wish to credit that institution, you may mention it first.

Publication. Papers in *The Condor* are ordinarily published in order of receipt of the original manuscript in the editorial office. (This is not the same as the date of acceptance, given at the end of every article.)
