OFFICER'S REPORTS FOR 1986

Chairman's report

The publication of Breeding Waders in Europe by WSG in 1986 was one of the most important events in the history of the Group. This supplement to Bulletin 48 was compiled by Theunis Piersma from data collected through correspondence with ornithologists all over Europe, from personal contacts and from the literature. The publication is the first attempt to quantify in broad terms the populations of waders breeding in Europe. I think the stimulus to carry out the work came from work in Scotland. During our efforts to census the breeding waders of the Hebrides in the face of the Integrated Development Programme and the changes in agriculture which it might bring about, we were constantly asked for comparative material from elsewhere. It was impossible to obtain. Now some information is readily available. Many thanks to Theunis for his splendid work on behalf of the group.

Otherwise there is little else to say. Business as usual; many projects in hand; financial situation good; membership holding up. A success story? Perhaps, but apologies for the late Bulletins! The Editor had a very difficult year and he has accomplished wonders especially with the aid of new assistants Judy and David Stroud.

Treasurer's report

It is encouraging to report a continuing healthy surplus for the year but the accumulated fund is now harbouring some hefty items that are ear-marked for future expenditure and it seems likely that a small subscription increase may be necessary in 1988. The reserves include:

- 1) The Hebrides Accounts which shows income 1983-1986 inclusive £8500

 Leaving an amount in reserve
 for report publications etc. £2377
- The Colour Marking account now shows a surplus of £242, the stock of dye purchased in 1985 remains in store.
- 3) The Cannon Net Fund amounts to £524 now and may be earmarked for a specific project in the next year.

The only item of note during the years is a very hefty increase in editorial costs reflecting the changed personal circumstances, and proliferation of our editorial volunteers—an additional computer was about to be purchased at the end of the year to enable text to be more easily edited by several people. The postage costs include the postage for the Breeding Waders in Europe publication which went out with Bulletin 48 but all the costs and sales income relating to this publication will be shown in the 1987 accounts. At the moment the net cost to the Group is £920 but this should be recovered slowly as sales are made. A small increase in the subscription rate in 1988 will ensure that the financial situation within the group remains sound for several years to come.

Editor's Report

1986 has been a year of changes in many parts of the Bulletin production system, some of them obvious to readers, others less so. Early in 1986 I moved job to the Nature Conservancy Council in Peterborough. Thus the production base of the Bulletin left Durham, where it had been since 1973. This shift of base, combined with the demands of my new post, and changes in housing and personal circumstances conspired to stretch time and resources beyond the limit: Bulletin 46 appeared very late, for which my apologies are due. It has been apparent for some time that the time and effort needed to produce a Bulletin to an increasingly high standard have been steadily rising. To cope with this, and the heavy work demands of the Editors, we have taken a number of actions during 1986.

Firstly I have appointed Judy and David Stroud as Assistant Editors, alongside Mike Moser. This has two advantages. Firstly it widens the editorial base, so that problems of other commitments occuring at awkward times for Bulletin production can be minimised. Secondly, as Judy and David are based in Peterborough, the final preparation and paste-up of camera-ready copy for the Bulletin is now a team effort. This has already saved us a geat deal of time and effort.

To further spread the load of editing, towards the end of 1986 we purchased a second BBC microcomputer and disc drive for the Group. This is now installed in Judy and David's home, and is helping to ease the load of editing and correcting texts. Since we are receiving an increasing number of contributions in machine-readable form (on floppy discs), this extra equipment has been already especially helpful.

We are happy to receive copy on floppy discs in the future, but we must again urge authors to consult with us first, to ensure that their texts are compatible with our systems and format. Several contributions received in 1986 ended up taking us longer to deal with because of disc and software incompatibilities, than if we had entered the texts ourselves!

Altogether the 1986 Bulletins comprised 126 pages, and we included a gratifyingly wide range of material. However the one serious concern has been the diminution of material for the New World Section: we urge New World authors to send us material of all kinds for inclusion in the Bulletin, and we are seeking ways of further encouraging such contributions.

We are also establishing closer links with other wader organisations such as the Australian Wader Studies Group and Interwader, with a view to ensuring that WSG members are kept fully aware of the work and findings of these groups. We would be pleased to make firmer contact with other groups involved with wader studies.

During 1986 we changed the style of *Bulletin* binding to saddle-stitching, which we feel both neatens the appearance of the issues, and makes them easier to read.

Not content with struggling to produce 3 Bulletins in 1986, we also completed the first ever Bulletin Supplement, Theunis Piersma's huge undertaking of compiling Breeding Waders in Europe. This was published as a supplement

to the December 1986 Bulletin, and proved to be by far the largest WSG document ever produced, at 116 pages. We are not sure whether the compiler or the editors were more startled at this! Through the generous financial assistance of the Nature Conservancy Council (Great Britain) and the Ministerie van Landbouw en Visserij (The Netherlands) in the costs of printing and publication, we were able to substantially improve the quality of the finished product. In particular, we hired a high-quality dot matrix printer to produce the camera-ready copy, resulting in a more readable print-face. We have been concerned for some time to find a way to improve the print-face of Bulletins, and intend to extend use of this better printer to cll Bulletins in 1987.

Besides completing production of the first ever Bulletin Supplement, we began the substantial editorial work needed to produce the second. This is the proceedings of the workshop held at the 1986 Annual Meeting in Scotland, on The Conservation of International Flyway Populations of Waders. It is being published as a Supplement to Bulletin 49, in April 1987, as a joint publication with the International Waterfowl Research Bureau, and will be even larger than Breeding Waders in Europe.

The Bulletin is the main medium through which keeps its members informed about its own and others' activities. We hope that it serves this purpose well, but we are always keen to continue to make improvements, and to hear from members about what they would like to see appear in future Bulletins. The Bulletin is for you as members, and we depend on you to continue to write the material that makes the Bulletin so interesting.

Finally, my thanks to all those kind or fool-hardy people, acknowledged in individual Bulletins, who have helped in the production and editorial work during the year. In particular I would like to thank our typist, Ann Perry, who has managed to type in a great deal of Bulletin material during the year, and at the same time cope with large amounts of indecipherable editorial scribblings. Her help has been invaluable.

1986 was the second year that many wader spring migration research projects along the seaboards of both Europe and west Africa co-operated under the umbrella of the WSG 'International wader migrations along the East Atlantic Flyway' - project. The preliminary results from the 1985 season were of great help in preparing a review of the East Atlantic wader flyway system, presented at the Workshop in Edinburgh, and now in press. In 1986 a start was made with the detailed analyses, in international contexts, of the migration data, and some informal working parties on specific topics were established.

During the year the Advisory Panel (for aims and composition see *Bulletin* 40:6 (1984)) was not approached for advice. Three new members agreed to join the panel, representing a widening of the geographical spread in WSG involvement.
