### Cormorant: Journal of African Seabird Group

Cormorant publishes papers concerned with the seabirds of the whole southern hemisphere. All back numbers (Vols 1-14; 1976-1987) are presently available at a price of South African Rands 12,00 per issue. However a full set of 20 numbers can be obtained for only SAR 150,00 (including postage). 1988 membership subscriptions for the ASG are SAR 15,00. ## Tauraco: Journal of Afrotropical Ornithology

Members with an interest in Afrotropical waders may care to note the announcement of the new journal Tauraco. The first issue was published in March 1988. Tauraco will publish original and review papers in English or French relating to Afrotropical birds, particularly field studies. It covers sub-Saharan Africa, SW Arabia, Madagascar and other Indian Ocean islands. Tauraco will appear twice a year, but the intention is to increase size and frequency of issues if there is sufficent interest and support.

# IWWRB International Symposium on Western Palearctic Geese.

Whilst concerned with geese, attention is drawn to the forthcoming IWWRB Symposium to be held between 31 January - 5 February 1989 in the Federal Republic of Germany. The Symposium is being held in co-operation with a number of other national and international bodies. Major themes for the Symposium will cover goose population status and dynamics; breeding biology; behaviour and migration; habitat management and interactions with agriculture; impact of shooting, and international co-operation for conservation. Many of these themes will no doubt also interest wader

workers, in particular the important areas of habitat management and conservation.
