### WHSRN Network News

The Western Hemisphere Shorebird Reserve Network (WHSRN), a voluntary system of recognising sites important to migratory shorebirds, began in the early 1980s (see WSG Bulletin 49, Suppl.: 122-124. It is now a thriving network, with the number of reserves in the network increasing rapidly. We report on the dedication of one of these (Minas Basin in the Bay of Fundy in Canada) elsewhere in this Bulletin.

WHSRN now publishes Network News, and we have just received the November 1988 issue (Vol. 1 No. 2). This is 6 pages packed with reports about about WHSRN reserves, news of counting, catching and marking activities, and exciting sightings of marked birds. For example, Network News reports that Brian Harrington and the Manomet Bird Observatory staff sighted approximately 50 (!) blue-flagged Red Knots in Delaware Bay this spring. All these birds had been marked at Lagoa do Peixe in Brasil. To cap this success they saw also a flagged Knot from Punta Rasa, Argentina, and a Ruddy Turnstone and three Sanderlings from Brasil.

# SLENDER-BILLED CURLEWS: HELP NEEDED

The Slender-billed Curlew Numenius tenuirostris has suffered a drastic decline this century. It is now almost certainly the rarest migratory bird in the Western Palearctic, with perhaps only 100 individuals surviving. In order to investigate the reasons for this decline and to attempt to counter it, the International Council for Bird Preservation (ICBP) has launched a two-year project on the species. As the species has been recorded from over a dozen countries in the last decade, surveys of the species will necessitate a large cooperative effort between ornithologists throughout Europe.

Birdwatchers visiting areas where the Slender-billed Curlew has been recorded in recent years can contribute important information to ICBP's efforts to conserve the species. It must be emphasised that no funds are available from ICBP for such surveys. The countries in which the Slender-billed Curlew has been regularly recorded on passage include Turkey, Hungary, Yugoslavia (Vojvodina), Romania (Dobroudgea), Greece, Austria and Italy, although there have been also accidental records from most non-Scandinavian European





countries. The main wintering sites appear to be in Tunisia and Morocco with scattered records in the Middle East. Anyone willing to spend time surveying suitable wetlands for the species should contact the project coordinator for further details, specifying which country they will be visiting and at what time of year. Any confirmed Slender-billed Curlew records would also be gratefully received, preferably with descriptive details and any information recorded on habitat and behaviour.
