## NOTES AND NEWS

We are pleased to see the first pages of the long-awaited revision of the birdbanding manual, released by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Canadian Wildlife Service under date of June 30, 1961. Problems relating to the recent fire in the Patuxent punched-card records had delayed the printing of this first installment of the new manual. However, the North American Council of Bird-Banding Associations is actively working on material for further installments, and every effort will be made to release more pages in 1962.

The separate includes full details on materials and construction. This is one of the best automatic-door trap designs yet devised, and is likely to replace many of the older "Potter" type mechanisms.

Many college libraries would find it worthwhile. These prices include postage.

In recent months we have been able to ship all mist-net orders quite promptly. However, a high proportion of orders are bunched in the periods from late March through May, and from late July through August. Considering the difficulty in maintaining stocks sufficient to meet these peaks, and delays occasioned by business or vacation trips, we urge the ordering of nets somewhat in advance of the moment they are to be used, when possible.
