RELATION OF BIRDS TO ARTHROPOD-BORNE VIRUSES

Dr. Donald D. Stamm and Dr. Joseph J. Hickey have recently concluded 2-years of valuable service as members of the subcommittee regarding the Relation of Birds to Arthropod-borne Viruses (of the American Committee on Arthropod-borne Viruses). Dr. Stamm had served as Chairman of the sub-committee. The current membership includes: Dr. Richard O. Hayes (Chairman), Dr. David E. Davis, Dr. Robert J. Newman, Dr. Eugene P. Odum, Dr. Maurice W. Provost, and Dr. Brooke B. Worth.

The subcommittee was established to: 1) serve as a channel of information exchange between the various disciplines (virology, ornithology, ecology, etc.) involved in studies on wild birds and arthropod-borne viruses (arbo-viruses); 2) to develop into a focus for consultation on wild bird-arbovirus research problems; and 3) to stimulate and coordinate needs research on wild bird-arbovirus problems.

The subcommittee does not consider itself a closed group and participation is open to all interested persons. The continuing activities of the subcommittee will be contingent upon the services requested of it.

NOTES AND NEWS

Our January, 1961 issue described a new trap designed with unusually sensitive triggers ("The Chickadee Trap", by Franklin McCamey, Bird-Banding, 32: 51-55). A limited supply is now available commercially, from Mr. Don Payne, R4, Box 159A, Eugene, Oregon, at \$6.00 each, with o without wire bottoms, including postage within the U.S. The trap is well-built, with trigger approaching the original McCamey traps in sensitivity. It includes two improvements: (1) a larger and deeper bait pan on the bottomless traps; (2) a lever at the end of the trigger axle, outside the trap mesh, for easier resetting with a bird in one hand or while wearing gloves.

Copies of a reprint of the McCamey paper are still available from the author (current address: Box 214, R. F. D. 1, Orwigsburg, Penna.), including detailed instructions on how to build it. It is only fair to add that to build a workable trap takes a little experience in simple metalworking, while to build one with triggers as precise and delicate as the traps built by either McCamey or Payne takes a fair amount of skill.

As this issue goes to press, the list of mist nets and prices in our July, 1963 issue (34: 175-176) is still uptodate, except that type B nets are out of stock and will not be available before July of this year. While we have good stocks of the other six types of nets stocked by NEBBA, early orders may avoid delay when you are ready to start netting.
