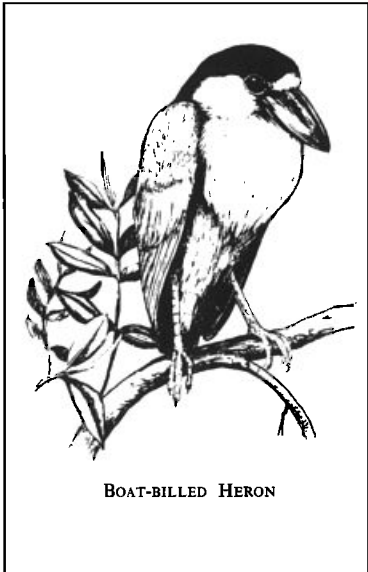

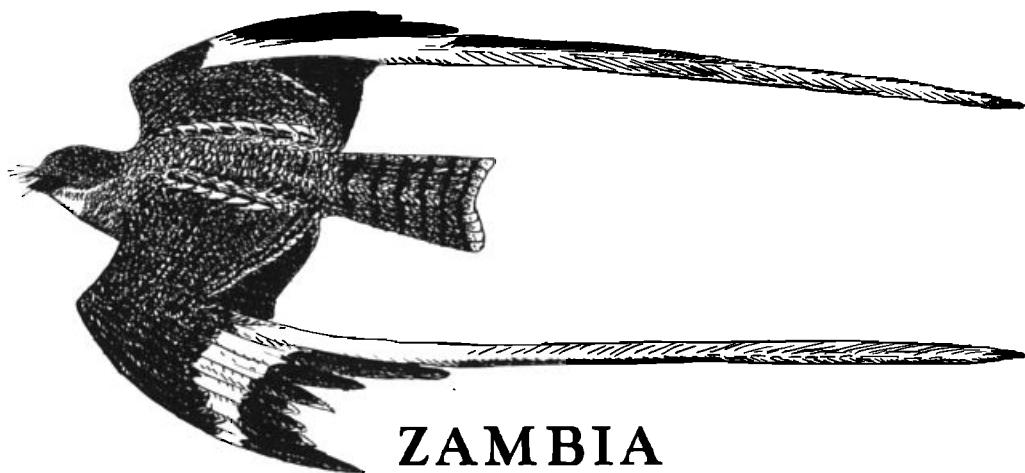

BIRD BONANZAS 1977 TOUR OF THE YEAR

Our Tour-of-the-Year is known for showing enthusiastic birders great numbers of birds. Our 1976 Tour-of-the-Year to Peru recorded about 775 species of birds. Our tour that visited Africa (including Zambia) in 1976 recorded about 611 species. It is safe to predict that our 1977 tour to Zambia will find more species in a comparable time than any other tour to Africa in 1977.

In addition to birds, mammals are spectacular. In one day in the Luangwa Valley we saw 21 species of mammals. 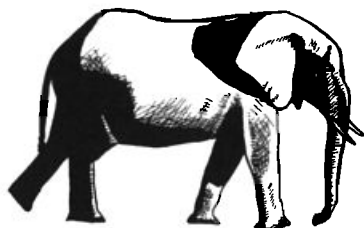

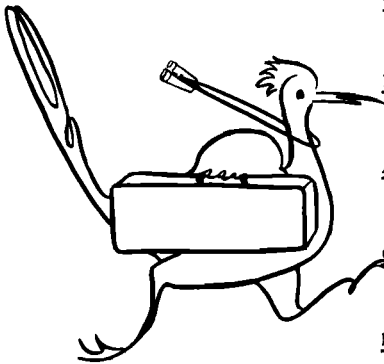

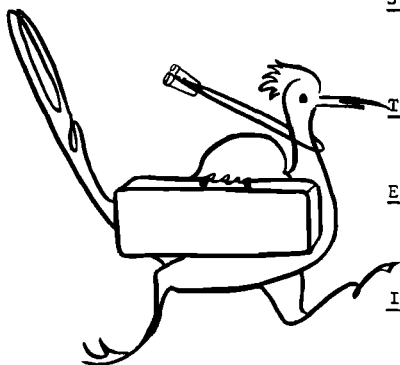
