acters, especially the leg color, eliminates all other gulls.


THE ONLY RACE OF L. fuscus col-L lected in North America is graellsii (American Ornithologists' Union Check-list, 1957) and the mantle color of the Panamanian bird agrees with the color of that race rather than the darker mantled L. f. fuscus of Scandinavia. In recent years there have been numerous sightings of Lesser Black-backed Gulls from Canada, the Atlantic coast of North America to Florida, Texas and California (Binford, 1978). This species may be following the trend shown by the Black-headed Gull (Larus ridibundus) and the Little Gull (L. minutus) which, after years of repeated sightings, were finally found to be breeding in North America. At the present, the Lesser Black-backed Gull breeds no closer to North America than Greenland (Vaurie, 1965). In the Old World, this species regularly winters in tropical Africa.

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


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
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
