A useful piece of equipment sent to us for trial and appraisal is a gunstocktype mount for telescope or camera with telephoto lens. Its name is EZE-SCOPE, and we found it well-named: easy to assemble, mount, carry, and use. We found it comfortable against the shoulder, light in weight, and a great help in holding the camera (or scope) steady in situations where a tripod is not feasible, such as following rapidly moving birds, migrating raptors, etc. The EZESCOPE offers several accessories: travel case, field bag, carrying strap, etc. and prices seem reasonable. If you're looking for a compact, durable, portable shoulder mount for scope or camera, we think you might well find this product to your liking. We have—forever—it seems. pleaded with our Regional Editors to get their reports to us on time when due, to help our Changing Seasons authors complete their manuscripts promptly, and so help speed the publication of American Birds. Critical to this, they remind us, is the receipt of observations from the field, and for some R.E.'s, this is a major problem. We wonder why it would not be possible for all observers who send in reports to American Birds, to keep sheets with their significant observations and comments up to date day by day, so that they can be mailed the day after the season ends. Thus, your records for the spring migration season, which ends May 31, could be completed on May 31 and mailed June 1, even if it included records for May 31 itself. If everyone adopted this practice, it would help enormously in speeding American Birds to you by speeding the work all along the line. Try it.
