Crane, Sandhill: spectacular overflight along the Front Range (1)123.

Crane, Whooping: first time since early in the century that the population has passed 100 in Texas (1)114.

Crossbills, Red: usefullness of differentiating between some of the North American "subspecies" (2)260.

Crow, Hawaiian: despite a large observational effort, the annual 'Alala survey failed to record *any* observation of the species this spring (3)492.

Cuckoos, Yellow-billed: California's troubled population receiving continued study. (5)1484.

Eagle, Golden: record high count in Ontario (1)81.

Eagle, Golden: steady increase in Appalachian Region (1)88.

egging: raccoon predation and egging by Vietnamese refugees took their toll on heron and egret nests in the South Texas Region (5)1459.

falcon: an immature bird, possibly a Hobby (Falco subbuteo), seen by skilled observers (1)56.

Falcons, Peregrine: efforts to establish nesting pairs in the Hudson-Delaware Region (5)1415.

Falcons, Peregrine: staging a remarkable comeback in the Western Great Lakes Region (3)434.

Finch, House: western expansion in the plains states (5)1455.

Flycatcher, Hammond's: second record for the Region and 3rd for the northeast (2)262.

Gallinule, Azure: season's most unusual and controversial visitor found dead in Long Island (2)262.

Gallinules, Purple: considering their erratic, often-suicidal wanderings in winter (2)254.

Geese, Hawaiian: five banded members of a captive flock found 11 kilometers away. (1)148.

Godwit, Hudsonian: first state record for Hawaii (5)1490.

Goldeneye, Barrow's: 21+ reports were unprecedented (2)276.

Goose, Ross': presence of a blue morph at Cap Tourmente one of the outstanding events of the season. (1)62

grebes, *Aechmophorus*: observers should redouble efforts to make reliable identification of Clark's and Western grebes (1)128.

Grebe, Clark's: winter distribution is becoming clearer, but observers should continue to report their counts (2)322.

Greenfinch, Oriental: first for the contiguous United States (2)327.

Hawks, Broad-winged: rarely found here in winter, six were seen on three Cameron, Louisiana, CBCs (2)291.

Hawks, Swainson's: criticisms directed at observers who report this species may not always be justified, especially in the Prairie Provinces, where it is the most common nesting raptor in grassland areas (3)451).

Hummingbird, Magnificent: second record for Nevada (1)123.

Hummingbird, Ruby-throated: controversial bird sighted at Plantation Key was originally thought to be a Bahama Woodstar, but later proved to be a featherworn Ruby-throated (1)79.

Jackdaw, Eurasian: ship invaded by hundreds of jackdaws while lost at sea off southern England (1)63.

owls: 104 banded in Cape May, including Common Barn, Eastern Screech, Great Horned, Barred, Long-eared, and Saw-whet (1)66.

Owls, (Hawaiian) Short-eared: shrinking habitat has reduced this species to the point of endangerment on O'ahu (2)334.

Owls, Snowy: staged one of their biggest invasions in many years in the Northeastern Maritimes Region (2)256.

passerines: a heavy snowfall swept across the Appalachian Region in early April causing killing many Purple Martins, Eastern Bluebirds, Eastern Phoebes, Vesper Sparrows, Savannah Sparrows, and Water Pipits (3)430.

Pelican, Brown: the population in Texas continues to recover (5)1459.

Plover, Mongolian: juvenile molting to first basic plumage collected at Rutherford Beach (1)100.

Plovers, Mountain, Piping, and Snowy: summer breeding success in the Prairie Provinces (5)1452.

Plover, Piping: survey of the nesting population (5)1412.

Redpoll, Greater: large brown redpoll identified in Quebec City (3)406.

Ruff: onslaught of sightings continued in Ontario with a record 12 (3)425.

Sandpipers, White-rumped: abundant in most of the region (1)57.

sapsuckers: with the splitting of Yellow-bellied and Red-naped sapsuckers, interest in identifying and reporting birds out of range has increased (1)145.

shearwaters: a serious identification problem concerning Manx and Audubon's shearwaters in North Carolina (3)416.

Shrike, Brown: California's 2nd Brown Shrike found near Olena Marsh, Marin County (2)323.

Siskins, Pine: two birds banded and photographed were first identified as Eurasian Siskins, later positively identified as Pine Siskins (2)326.

Sparrow, Eurasian Tree: may be the first "natural" occurrence in Canada (1)106. Stilts, Black-necked showed up in numerous places, often in high numbers, and made some giant strides northward (3)464.

Swallows, Cave: continued to expand south and east in the South Texas Region with new colonies (5)1461.

Terns, Caspian: analysis of tern movements north to south across the Santa Catalina Mountains (5)1483.

Tern, Least: status of Least and/or Little Tern in Hawaii becoming more and more of an enigma (1)150.

Tropicbird, Red-billed: adult appeared in Maine, and possibly same individual in Massachusetts (1)53.

Tropicbird, White-tailed: sub-adult at Hydrographer Canyon (1)53.

Vireos, Black-capped: need for a coordinated long-term strategy to conserve the species in the Austin area (5)1462.

Vireo, White-eyed: caught in mist-net at record late date at Braddock Bay (1)86.

wading birds: worst winter on record for nesting in south Florida (2)273.
