Private Grants for Field Research

Proposals will be considered from scholars of any nationality, covering any geographical region.

All funds are derived from the contributions of participating volunteers selected from the Earthwatch membership; therefore, non-specialist volunteers must be integrated into the research design.

Preliminary proposals can be made by telephone or by a detailed letter to the Center. Upon favorable review, full proposals will be invited to be submitted 12 months before the proposed fielding date of the project.

XX International Ornithological Congress Meeting

The XX International Ornithological Congress will take place in Christchurch, New Zealand, on December 2–9, 1990. The congress program will include seven plenary lectures, 48 symposia, contributed papers (spoken and poster), workshops, round-table discussions and films. There will be a mid-Congress excursion day. Longer tours are planned to interesting ornithological sites in New Zealand before and after the congress, including the post congress cruises to sub-antarctic islands.

The Second and Final Circular of the congress will be available from October 1, 1989 and will include the registration papers and forms for submitting papers. In late 1990, New Zealand will also host the 20th World Conference of the International Council for Bird Preservation in Hamilton on November 21–27, 1990 and a Pacific Festival of Nature Films in Dunedin on November 27 to December 1, 1990.
